# East Hendred chosen to be a 'Rose Village'

You may have heard that East Hendred has been chosen by the Royal National Rose Society as a "Rose Village" to mark the Queen's Golden Jubilee, following a bid from the Parish Council. This means that we have been given up to 200 rose bushes to plant within the village, both in public spaces and in villagers' front gardens. Kate Nicoll has kindly agreed to supervise the project.

Several sites have been picked around the village; these are listed below.

 Area between the Eyston Arms and the village shop -two long beds within the level grass.
These will be yellow roses of three different kinds: Yellow Floorshow, a ground cover rose; Arthur Bell, a floribunda bush

### rose, and Canary Bird, a small flowered species shrub rose. This should combine to make an attractive informal display to suit its rural setting.

- 2) Millennium Notice Board a narrow bed underneath this. This is currently rough grass and stones. It will be planted with a mass of the historic Rosamundi rose. # Vale local plan looks 10 years ahead

### Draft Vale of White Horse Local Plan

The Parish Council has just received for comment the first deposit draft of the new Local Plan, covering the period to 2011. This plan when finally accepted will provide an up-to-date framework for the future development of the Vale district over a ten year period. The plan will go through several stages, including a second deposit plan, a local plan inquiry and finally adoption of the plan as modified by the earlier stages.

It is in two main parts, the background and general strategy and a second part which consists of chapters dealing with environmental, social and economical issues respectively. These latter items include the historic and natural environment, housing, leisure, economy, shopping and tourism.

An important topic for the Parish Council is the proposed policy on housing for villages like East Hendred. Development in the larger villages (e.g East Hendred), will be limited to infilling and minor development of up to 9 houses, with a number of provisos, associated with using land which is not important to keep open, either because it contributes to the local character of the either side of the entrance to the village. This will need to be kept low to ensure visibility.

With autumn now upon us the time is right to prepare the ground and start planting. Given that we want to ensure that the rose beds remain as weed free as possible without the use of herbicides, we will be planting through a landscape fabric and mulching deeply with composted bark. You will soon start seeing the landscape fabric being laid over the grass and pinned down in place. This is to start the process of killing the grass before it is rotavated in to provide nourishment for the roses.

Clearly the planting and maintenance of these roses will require quite a lot of effort within the village. The Parish Council is provid-

ing the budget for a number of items including the landscaping fabric. That still leaves the planting and the maintenance (pruning, edging and weeding). We need to set up a rota within the village of interested people who would like to help throughout the year. In return they will receive a number of rose plants free for their own gardens. We could even introduce a competitive element for the most perfect golden jubilee rose for next year's Hendred Family Show. Watch out for notices around the village about the planting day, and in the meantime please sign up for the rota.

village or because it provides valuable recreational space. One change from the previous local plan is that 'rounding off' outside the existing built up limits of these larger villages will not be permitted. As in the previous plan there is provision for small scale affordable housing schemes on the edges of villages on sites which would not otherwise be acceptable. However there are some important requirements for such schemes, in that they must meet a clearly established local need for this type of housing. In addition for developments on sites which are capable of accommodating four or more dwellings 50% of

the houses should be affordable to local people who are unable to rent or buy a house on the open market. This is an important new and welcome requirement, which will change the nature of local developments which have in the past tended to be for larger houses only. However what constitutes 'affordable' may need some clarification.

The Council will review the Draft Local Plan at its next meeting and prepare its comments on this first draft. Input from villagers would be welcome. Copies of the plan are held in the One-Stop Shop in Wantage for consultation.

## **Planning Matters**

There have not been a great many PlanningApplications since the previous bulletin. Perhaps with the approach of winter, residents are not prepared for the upheaval the building of an extension. However, the Parish Council have commented on the following plans, before the Vale Planners have their final say.

The Hendred Estate requested permission for window alterations to Hollyhock Cottage in Cat Street. Neither the Parish Council nor the Vale objected. The Estate has since asked to move the present door to the centre of the building, facing the cemetery and we await approval from the Vale.

Permission was granted for a Telecom Hub House at UKAEA

Extensions to Lowood in Cat Street and a conservatory at Mutley Cottage, Horn Lane were approved to.

Internal alterations and remodelling of windows at Acacia House, Old Road were accepted.

Greene King requested permission for internal alterations to be made inside the Wheatsheaf, in order to enlarge the dining facilities and add an extra window in the section overlooking Chapel Square. The Parish Councillors visited the site to see for themselves what work would be carried out and although members were quite happy to support the application, they were concerned that provision should be made for extra car parking at the rear of the public house.

An application for the erection of a house on land (the builder's site) between Towersev and the new Berkelev Homes at Ridgeway Lodge Hotel for Mrs.McDowell has been received and Councillors took the opportunity to visit the site to see for themselves what impact, if any, such an extra dwelling would make. The Councillors would have been concerned if more than one house had been proposed, but felt that one house of similar size to those already being finished would greatly improve the present site, although they requested that all cars, including visitors, should be parked on site and not on the road, which is very narrow.

A second refusal by the Vale for the erection of a dwelling on land adjacent to 1 Home Farm Close asan 'undesirable extension of the built up area of the village, which is not considered as infilling or rounding off due to the open nature of the site and its surroundings.' This was also refused earlier in the year when it was presented the first time

House name changes - from time to time the Council is advised by the Vale of the change of name of houses in the village. Perhaps new residents do not feel that the name of the house they have bought is of their liking and any change of that name should be advised to the Vale District Council for their records, and they in turn tell us. If the name of your house is of historic interest to the village, please do think twice before you decide to change its name. If it is an older property (over 50 years), the Hendred Heritage Group will only be too happy to enlighten you on the history behind the name of your house

A reminder - please do check with the Vale Planners if your intended Conservatory, garden shed, garage or even a fence needs planning permission. If you have had planning permission for an extension, the addition of a conservatory, might also need it.

We are nearly at the end of the Year of the Queen's Jubilee. East Hendred can be proud of its celebrations to mark this special event. Above all this created an opportunity for all the village to work and play together, which was much appreciated. We should take advantage of other opportunities in the future.

Parish Councils are now being required through Government reg-

ulations to produce formal responses to a number of issues. Recently these have included crime prevention and freedom of information, and others are in the pipeline. These requirements place an increasing burden on Parish Councils, since most of the effort provided is on a voluntary basis. This more formal role of Parish Councils in local government is beginning to be recognised, and it is expected that these Councils will have a greater say in decision making. It is hoped also that it will result in more funding being available for local activities

# Should tourism be encouraged in Hendred?

The South East England Regional Assembly has recently published a draft planning strategy for tourism, seeking consultation. It notes that tourism together with related industries make a major contribution to the economy of the South East and are forecast to be high growth areas.

East Hendred is an attractive village, with a number of listed buildings, a conservation area and has been the winner in its class for the Oxfordshire Best Kept Village competition on several occasions. We already have a number of visitors, but at present there is no active encouragement.

The benefits of encouraging more visitors to the village are: more trade for the pubs, the village shop and existing businesses (such as the vinevards and the trout farm), the possibility of new businesses setting up and a higher profile in the area for Tourism.

Local voluntary organisations can potentially benefit from more visitors to their events and exhibitions

On the negative side the most obvious problem would be with more cars, and the resultant problems with more parking on village roads. One possible solution would be to create a central village car park for visitors.

There was a question in a survev distributed around the village in the mid 1990's about village attitudes to tourism. The response at that time was twothirds against any increase in tourism, and the key issues highlighted were the need for better roads and car parking.

These grants may be small but serve to demonstrate the support of the Council and hence can help recipient organisations obtain grants from other sources. Over the last few years East Hendred has benefited to the tune of over £200,000 from grant aid, all of which was triggered from initial Parish Council support. As a result we have an excellent preschool building, a top quality village hall, a new playpark and one of the best sports grounds in the area

# Renewable energy and conservation in our community

The South East England Regional Assembly has just published a draft strategy for energy efficiency and renewable energies in this area, with climate change and global warming in mind. One of the consequences of global warming is more erratic and extreme weather and local flooding. Cutting emissions of carbon dioxide is a recognised target; more efficient use of energy can make a significant contribution towards this target. The Government has also set a national target of 10% of electricity to be generated from renewable sources by 2010. At present only a very small part of

our local electricity is generated from renewable sources, amounting to only 0.65% of the total. Most of this is from the combustion of landfill gas. The most likely contributors to renewable electricity generation in the next 10 years are biomass. wind and solar energy. On a longer timescale emerging technologies such as fuel cells, wave and tidal energy are possible.

It is not clear how we can contribute to this target in a small village like East Hendred, however discussions on this topic would be welcome. Please contact John Sharp: tel: 833367: J.V.Sharp@btinternet.com

# Sewage system improvements planned

We have been having discussions with Thames Water for more than a year about the need to upgrade our village sewage system. On several recent occasions following heavy rain flooding has occurred in parts of the village. This has caused the sewage system to be overloaded and overflow, contaminating areas of the village and in some cases individual houses. This is

clearly not acceptable and Thames Water is now planning to upgrade part of the sewage system which has too narrow a pipe for the capacity required. It is hoped that this can be undertaken and completed in the early part of next year. We should like to thank our MP. Robert Jackson, for his help in encouraging Thames Water to fund these works.

A great deal of time and money is spent on preparing the ground for the long season, particularly in reseeding and weeding both goal mouths and the centre of the pitch. Hence the reason why the goal mouths are roped off after every game in order to preserve the grass as long as possible.

Villagers co-operation in refraining form kicking around in the goal mouths is greatly appreciated.

The Club have 2 adult teams playing in The North Berks League on a Saturday, 1st Team in Division 1 and our second string in Division 3. We also have a Sunday adult

team playing in Division 1 of The 'Autotype' Upper Thames Valley League. Saturday afternoon games kick off normally at 2.30pm and Sunday morning games at 10.30am.

The Club have been very successful over the last few years and one of our teams at least has managed to win some silverware for the last 6-7 years. Our most notable achievements recently have been winning The North Berks Cup in 2000 and The Devenney Cup on a Sunday in 2001.

The first team won consecutive championships over 4 years to gain promotion the top flight and our reserve team have emulated that by winning back to back promotions over the last two years.

Sponsorship is also a key ingredi-



# Heritage negotiates new lease

The Public Meeting in Snells Hall on October 11th fully supported the work carried out by the Trust, with a recommendation that continued use of the Chapel at least at the present level is essential.

Several new volunteers expressed interest in helping with many stages of future projects that had been outlined. The Trust were asked to present a precisely defined plan to gain increased public support from village residents of all ages. Such a plan should indicate the alternatives of a 'yes' or 'no' answer to each of the major options. A specific time table for when projects might start or be concluded would be needed and a very precise description of the type of work opportunities for volunteers

A full Action plan will take time and resources to prepare since those plans must be realistically prepared and assessed.

Any attempt to increase physical village resources with the help of Grant Aid requires ongoing resources to maintain their sustainability.

The Management group and the Trustees have met and set up a short term plan with priority on negotiating a new Chapel lease to continue present use, to progress the proposal for a display area in Snells Hall Garden for the Fire Pump, and for a practical winter project to complete the work already started on our large photo-

graph collection.

With limited volunteer time available, we will seek to keep all matters on move

Heritage will always be seeking help of one kind or another, but we thank all those that provided many hours of service during the course of this season and look forward to your enthusiastic help to assess new objectives.

One route to provide the revenues for extended projects is an increase in visitors. That means increased tourism. To service such a change would need input from many groups including the Parish Council, the Local Tourist Board as well as the co-operation of the village Residents. This would again call for more visitors, which in turn means more village trade as well as the need for hygiene facilities and parking.

Another item for the Trust's consideration is the desire to have more about Heritage on the village web site. It was felt in this way that village history might be more easily accessed.

# **Sherlock Holmes move over!**

The village web site www.hendred.org received an enquiry a few months ago. The question was is this the East Hendred, which was said to be in Oxfordshire, that once was in Berkshire?'

The enquirer about this particular piece of Hendred history told us that he had documents found in the loft space of a house called Schutchamore in Galashiels. Messages backwards and forwards confirmed the answer as ves and that this village was indeed the home for many generations of the Allin family.

Big family changes apparently came about in the late 1890's and the family moved out although subsequently several members of the family were buried here. The initial enquiry resulted in a number of documents and photographs being received in Hendred. Particularly photographs taken at that time by Tom Reveley of Wantage showing Downs House as it then was. Downs House was subsequently demolished after the Second World War. The only image in the village up till then was a painting left to the Hendred's Society by the then Secretary who lived at Brightwell House at the southern end of Woods Farm Lane. One F Vingoe had signed that painting. No further information was known at that time, male or female, amateur or professional Vingoe is an unusual name in these parts, but not in Cornwall the next source.

The web provided another easy link since a search for others of the same name, found a connection and also an advertisement showing a picture of a similar

style painting signed by Vingoe, on offer through an art dealer. They said Francis Vingoe had moved to Canada in 1921. Eventually another link was confirmed through the web site, that is given over to the 1901 census. Yes it is back working again after the too many users accessing problems early on this year. Vingoe, Francis lived in East Hendred with his wife and a daughter, who was born in Milton parish only a few months previously. So more indepth searching found out that Mr Vingoe,

described as an Artist, with his wife and daughter lived in Pound Lane, East Hendred, Where was that? Today we all know Pound Lane as that which runs alongside the Wheatsheaf to the High Street. But, as well as the now non-existent Pound Barn, the street running north from there to the junction with White and Old Road (another newer dedication) was also known as Pound Lane and there were at least two other cottages along it. Photographic evidence in the Chapel for those with only recent memories.

So which spot did our artist live? How did he come here? Was he a friend of the Sheard's of Monks Orchard, or the Billveald's of Kings Manor, or even the Lovd's of Downs House. One feels that some special circumstance brought him here from London and Essex.

# Lights cause complaints

Many homes in the village have installed security flood lights, activated by passive infra-red detectors, which can be quite helpful in dark areas. There are smaller wattage bulbs (e.g 150 watts) available, which give adequate light for the householder, with less effect on the neighbours.

# **Cycling** issues

What are you giving your children for Christmas? If your child cycles, please do give them a cycle helmet, if they have not got one already. We should like to quote from a recent Road Safety Report from the Oxfordshire County Council "Cycle training is available to all children aged 9 years and over and is mostly organised through primary schools. The course is carried out on public roads and the majority of training is carried out by adult volunteers. The children are required to wear cycle helmets during training and it is hoped that this will encourage them to continue using helmets into adult life." Children may not think that wearing such a helmet is cool, but think of the consequences of not doing so! Please also remind your children that cyclists, when riding in groups, should keep in pairs on the left hand side of the road, and not string their group all across the road ignoring the rest of the traffic and making it hazardous for other road users! One awful other fact in the Road Safety Report is contained in the table of age and gender of road casualties cycling in Oxfordshire, and that is the 10-15 male group is the highest for casualties in any of the groups - girls of the same

age are the highest amongst female cyclists, but there are only half as many as the boys. It is a matter of reminding the children that training given during the cycling session does not cease once the lesson is over!

### Cvcle lights

Several young lads have been noticed cycling around the village in the early evening, quite oblivious to the fact that they do not have lights on their bikes. In the first place it is an offence for anyone of any age cycling in the dark without lights and it is no excuse for the lads to say 'they can't afford them.

Please make sure that you can be seen when you cycle and always make sure that you have lights and that they work and that your children have them too. Perhaps the lack of lights is reflected in the Road Casualty figures mentioned in the previous item

The Council is concerned that all residents are safe when passing through the village, which includes keeping to the 30 mph speed limit and thoughtfulness for all road users, be they pedestrians, on two wheels, three wheels or four and even skate boards!

# Lighting up our streets

As most residents are aware the Parish Council has a Courtesy Lighting system in the village and at present there are 23 such lights in operation. Most of these lights are attached to houses in various locations, but there are three lights fixed to 'lamp-posts,' which were kindly supplied by UKAEA a few years ago when they no longer found use for the posts. These are located in White Road (in the garden of no.13) Orchard Close (in the garden of Glendale) and to the rear of 53 Coulings Close, so that it throws light on to the garages. All other lights on poles around the village (i.e in Orchard Lane, White Road, Coulings Close, Mill Lane and junction of Ford Lane with Horn

Lane) are maintained by Oxfordshire County Council and hence their property. Should any of these particular lights prove faulty, please telephone the County Council on their street light telephone number, which is freephone 0800 317802, quoting the name of the village, the road name and (if possible) the light number and telling them what the fault is

It is often far quicker for the resident living by the pole to contact the County Council than to pass the message round to Parish Councillors, who then have to waste time checking on the light in question.

You may find that when you ring there is an answerphone message, but do not despair!
