Oxfordshire Best Kept Village Competition 2004

Judges' Report: East Hendred — Second, Medium Village Class



Situated off the busy A417, this village is very attractive with fairly quiet roads and many old buildings. Many of the older properties are of chalkstone and thatched. There is a great deal of colour, mainly coming from the new rose beds throughout the village. These

were almost all very well kept except for the beds by the main road, which were rather weedy.

The two churches, St Augustine's CE and St Mary's RC, are very fine buildings and well looked after, as were their churchyards. Near St Mary's is the new RC school, which

was very tidy with a well kept playground. The older school is used for offices. The C of E primary school is near Snells Hall and is also in good condition, with an attractive bed of wild flowers by the playing field. Snells Hall itself, which was the old school — and is now the Village Hall — is an imposing building with excellent parking. A walk through Snells, a pleasant green open area, passes by the Penney Playpark. This is an excellent new play area for children with fine, safe equipment. The seat endowed in memory of Roy Jenkins is very well sited. The cemetery nearby is in a peaceful setting, with many of the newer graves well tended. The older ones, however, tend to be somewhat overgrown

The main street is wide with grass verges and contains many features, including the shop/post office, which looked very well stocked and is clearly a great asset to the village. Nearby is the Eyston Arms, which, like The Plough and The Wheatsheaf, appeared very tidy and inviting. Champs Chapel, a building of historical significance and now a parish meeting place and museum,

has been well restored with an attractive colourful surround, and the nearby War Memorial.

There is another children's playground together with the sports centre in Mill Lane. The play equipment is in reasonable condition, but there was a great deal of litter outside the litter bin provided, and a few signs of vandalism. The sports field is in excellent condition, with a good pavilion. The tennis courts looked to be likewise, and almost free of litter.

Of the amenities, the allotments looked tidy and mainly productive while bus shelters, telephone kiosk and notice boards were all in reasonable condition.

The many attractive properties, mainly well looked after, and the colourful floral displays make this village a very pleasant one to visit and indicate that its residents make a great effort to maintain its standard, an impression which was strengthened by the excellent newsletter.

Note: the critical comment on the rose bed near the main road relates to the old bed, which, unfortunately, was not kept weed free. This bed has already been improved.

Diamond Light Source

A Light for Science

You may have seen the massive building works on the Rutherford-Appleton site. These are to house Diamond Light Source, a prestigious new synchrotron, currently being built and situated on the Chilton/Harwell science campus and one of the largest scientific projects in the UK for 30 years. This new science facility could be described as a "super microscope", housed in a building covering the size of five football pitches. Diamond will, ultimately, host more than 30 cutting-edge research stations, supporting the life, physical and environmental sciences.

Many of the everyday commodities we take for granted — from chocolate to cosmetics, and revolutionary drugs to surgical tools — have been developed using synchrotron light. University researchers are the core users of synchrotron light, but household companies through to high-tech start-ups have already benefited from research carried out using synchrotron light.

Biology and Medicine

The fight against illnesses, such as Parkinson's, Alzheimer's, osteoporosis and many cancers, will benefit from the new research techniques available at Diamond. Investigating the structures of the proteins involved in these and other diseases

will help scientists to understand them better, thus opening new avenues for treatment. For example, the "anti-Flu" drug Relenza, which was developed using information provided by synchrotron light, was a huge milestone in biomedical science. It illustrates the exciting potential of rational drug design and the vital role played by synchrotron in the fight against disease.

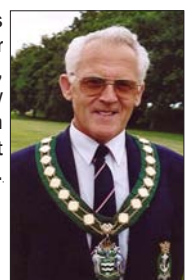
Environment and Earth Sciences

Pollution is one of the major problems facing environmental science today. Understanding how contaminants make their way into the environment and how to counteract them can be a real challenge. Some plants and micro-organisms have a natural ability to absorb toxic metals from contaminated land and deactivate them. Diamond will help researchers

to understand how this happens, and so open up cheap and effective ways for cleaning up polluted land.

"East Hendred residents make a great effort to maintain the standards of the village, an impression strengthened by the excellent newsletter". This statement, written by the judges for the *Oxfordshire Best Kept Village Competition*, is very welcome and our award of *Second Prize* in the medium-sized village category this year is a tribute to the hard work put in by many residents. The rose beds in the centre of the village were also particularly attractive this year, now that they are better established (thanks to Kate Nicol and her team for all their efforts)

and they were picked out as a special feature by the judges. Their report on the village appears elsewhere in the *Bulletin*.

Unfortunately, not all residents take the same attitude to the village and we have had several problems over the summer months with petty vandalism on the bus shelters and other village amenities. The Parish Council has recognised that the facilities for teenagers in this village are minimal and a meeting was held in June to explore what new facilities might be provided. We were very pleased with the high turnout at the meeting, with many youngsters attending with their parents. As a result, a small working party was set up to look at the need for a youth group and dedicated facilities, which the Parish Council is supporting (a report on the meeting

is below). In addition, the Council has been exploring the possibility of the 'Damascus' bus visiting the village on a regular basis to benefit teenagers (see page 4).

As discussed in the last issue of the *Bulletin*, the planning of the future of the village is increasingly important. Parish Councillors have been attending workshops on this topic and taking advice from various bodies on what can be done. Some background on the preparation of a "village design statement" is on page 4 and the Council will explore how this could be implemented. Input from interested residents would be very welcome (contact John Sharp, 833367).

East Hendred is one of the few local villages with its own website (www.hendred.org). Much of the development work on this

has been done by David and Sam Pentin, who are leaving the village shortly. We would like to thank them for all their hard work and wish them all the best in their new life in France. We are very pleased that Alex Birkhead (our *Bulletin* editor) has agreed to take on the role of webmaster. The Parish Council is also keen to explore the opportunity of widening the scope of the website and has recently set up a small group to explore this with Alex.

Congratulations to Terry Fraser, our District Councillor for many years, who has recently been elected as Chairman of the Vale District Council. Terry is a regular attendee at our Parish Council meetings and a strong supporter of this and neighbouring villages.

Cycle route around Hendred – Sustrans 44

This year, the *Sustrans Route 44* has been officially opened, providing a cycle route from Wantage to Didcot. The route from Didcot follows the edge of the Harwell site, along the Icknield Way, joining with the village road to the Downs and then taking the metalled path across to Ginge and then along the back roads to Wantage, via Ardington.

Village Teenagers' Meeting

Working group set up to progress improved facilities for teenagers

On Wednesday June 30th, over 30 (teenagers and their parents) attended a meeting with the Parish

Council to explore improved facilities for this age group. There are frequent complaints that there are no suitable recreational facilities in the village for this particular age group, as both play parks cater mainly for under-eleven year-olds.

Sarah Merritt, who is working with the Police as a Crime Reduction Officer, came along and provided very useful input on grants available and the mechanism for obtaining these. A working party was set up to

progress this area and the members consist of:

We look forward to progress in improving village recreational facilities for teenagers.

Progress with Harwell site restoration

A number of pits contaminated with chemicals are being cleaned up on the Western edge of the site, close to our Parish boundary. The Parish Council has been kept in close touch with activities there,

including their safety plans. The latest news is that ten of the pits have now been cleared, with the remainder to be completed by next March. Three emergencies have arisen during the work, all of which were managed safely with the extensive safety arrangements in place.

Damascus Bus

Youngsters in five local villages now have a new opportunity to meet and socialize, since the *Damascus* double-decker bus has been launched. A member of the management committee came along to the July Parish Council meeting to explain the project.

It is part of a youth project based in five rural communities, including Drayton and Steventon, and supported by grants from the Lottery Commission and several other organisations. The bus arrives in each village on a designated evening and parks in an agreed place. As well as being an information point for young people, it is an

opportunity for other activities, such as drama workshops, photography, motorbike maintenance etc. It is supported by adults in each village, who give up their time for the evening when the bus visits.

We have asked if East Hendred can be added to the villages that the bus regularly visits and are awaiting a response. If yes, we will be looking for adult volunteers to support the project. Hopefully, it can be linked to the initiative reported elsewhere in the *Bulletin* to improve facilities for teenagers in this village. (The name "*Damascus*" comes from the initials of the five villages involved).

New Clerk needed in 2005

Ann Taylor, the current Clerk to the Council, is planning to retire next April. The Council will be advertising for a new Clerk in the near future, to allow for a period of overlap.

Much of the Council business is now done electronically, so the new Clerk will need to be conversant with computer skills, although some training can be provided. It is also intended that the new Clerk will train for award of the *AQA Certificate in Local Administration*, the costs of which will be borne by the Council. A Clerk trained to this level is necessary for our Council to achieve the award of *Quality Status*.

New local Bobby

We understand that PC Darren James will be covering this area from the end of September. This is a welcome move, since we lost PC Jon Penrith some time ago. We have asked if he can attend occasional Parish Council meetings to improve the liaison with the village.

Slow down, please...

A reminder, too, that the entire village from the entrances at White Road and Allins Lane to the top of Newbury Road is within the 30mph speed limit. Problems with the speed of traffic passing from White Road into High Street at the bend (by Duke's Orchard), and vice-versa, has prompted the Council to ask the County Council Highways to consider a "*Slow*" sign at this junction.

Please cut back overhanging plants

Taking a leaf out of the Wantage Town Council's note in the *What's On*, may the Council remind residents to check that their plants, hedges, trees and hollyhocks (!) do not overhang footpaths causing problems for passing pedestrians. Please check your vegetation and take any necessary action to trim problem plants.

Take Charge of Waste

As part of the *Take Charge of Waste* initiative, the Vale of White Horse District Council is calling for volunteers to help it tackle litter. The Council is offering equipment (litter pickers, high-visibility vests, gloves and sacks) and has published a related booklet, *The Guidance on Voluntary Litter Picking*.

Green Boxes and packing rubbish

Please note that the Green Box collection will not take cardboard of any sort, nor *Yellow Pages*, phone books, yoghurt, fruit juice or cream cartons. At present, the *Yellow Pages* books contain the wrong sort of paper for recycling.

Please ensure that your rubbish is well packed so that it cannot be opened by animals taking their evening strolls and then spread all over the footpath.

East Hendred — Managing Change

The village continues to evolve and new buildings and extensions appear at a fairly rapid rate. The Parish Council would like the village to be more proactive in managing this change, and one way is to prepare a village design statement, which is described below: If you are interested in helping with its preparation, please contact John Sharp (833367 or J.V.Sharp@btinternet.com).

Village Design Statements — what are they?

A *Village Design Statement* (VDS) sets out clear and simple guidance for the design of all development in a village, based on its character. It is an advisory document produced by the village community, not by the planning authority. It will not stop change from happening, but it can help effect how any new building fits in to the village. VDSs are intended to influence the operation of the statutory planning system, so that new development is in harmony with its setting and makes a positive contribution to the immediate environment.

Local communities have a unique appreciation and understanding of their own place, and a VDS is based on this knowledge. It describes the qualities that residents value in their village and its surroundings. Around 200 English communities have completed *Design Statements* to date.

What does a VDS cover?

- It describes the distinctive character of a village and its surrounding countryside.
- It shows how character can be identified at three levels:
 - ▣ the landscape setting of the village;
 - ▣ the shape of the settlement;
 - ▣ and, the nature of the buildings themselves.
- A VDS sets down design principles based on the distinctive local character.

- Production of a *Statement* fosters working in partnership with the local authority, engenders understanding of current planning policies, and offers the chance to influence future policies.

Design Statements have been completed by villages in all parts of England and they are of value to residents, planners, designers and developers. There should be broad involvement of local interests, so that the finished *Design Statement* is a representative document, and one that presents ideas for stimulating and sustaining community involvement in planning issues. It is important that the Parish Council, plus planning authority, councilors and officers are drawn in to the VDS preparation process. Preparing a *Village Design Statement* does not demand design or planning knowledge — the only requirement is an interest in the future well-being of your village.

An effective *Village Design Statement*:

- Is developed, researched, written and edited by local people.
- Reflects the representative views of a community.
- Involves a wide cross-section of residents in its production.
- Describes the visual character of the village.
- Demonstrates how local character and distinctiveness can be protected and enhanced in new development.
- Is compatible with the statutory planning system and its local application.
- Should be accepted as supplementary planning guidance (and thereby influence developers and decisions on individual planning applications).
- Is relevant to all forms and scale of development.
- Is about managing change in the village, not preventing it.

But our location has never proved a barrier to finding clients and, funnily enough, once they have made the trip out from London or wherever they are based — and have lunched at one of the local pubs — they seem strangely keen to visit us again!

So what do we do? On the design side, we produce everything from exhibition stands to annual reports, websites to corporate identity, and newsletters to online quizzes and games. Clients range from accountants to holiday companies, and opticians to police forces.

Sheard, tea, and the village painting

Did you know the Sheard family had a shop in the High at Oxford, between 1700 and 1890? Among other things, they were tea merchants until the site was taken over by Shepherd the Tailors.

Good news — the refurbished Sheard painting should be back in April.

24 years ago... in August 1970, East Hendred suffered what was described as its worst flooding at least that century, when, according to the *Oxford Mail*, "a freak storm lashed monsoon-like rain down on the [then-] Berkshire village and gave residents an 'incredible' and 'terrifying' ordeal". The 6.30pm storm apparently lasted just half an hour, but cut-off the power and phones, flooded houses, and forced motorists to abandon their cars. Large rats were flushed from the drains and then washed away. According to one unnamed villager, "The sky was so black, it was just like night".

Next year's exhibition plans

Our exhibition plans for 2005 are not yet set in tablets of stone, but look most likely to be on the theme of 60 years on from the upheaval caused by world war two.

Changes to our way of life brought about by WWII

The emphasis would be on the overall changes brought about to our way of life as a result of that experience, whether due to military service at home and overseas, or changes brought about by rationing, shared homes and schools or unexpected occupations.

We need your memories and mementoes to put on such a show. There are also opportunities for grant assistance through the Big Lottery Fund, to help record historical change as it affected you.

The heritage group Chapel exhibition in 2005 will probably be staged more flexibly than usual, so that we can actually be on show after the formal anniversaries of the events — although August 1945 was the end-of-hostilities date for many, some surrenders in Burma did not actually take place until September.

Then, getting back to normal — well, the following few years were pretty eventful, and who remembers the date for the end of Rationing?

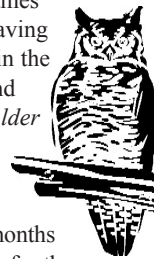

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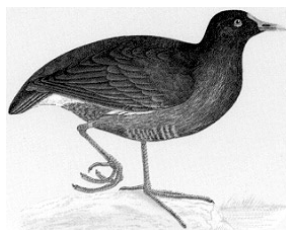
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Planning Matters

The Vale Planning Department has asked the Parish Council to comment on the following planning applications received since the last *Bulletin*. It should be pointed out that, although the Council makes its views known to the Planning Department on how a proposal would affect the village and the surrounding houses and that these do carry some weight with the Department, the final decision does lie with the District Planners.

An application for a single storey extension to **Wells Head** was received in **April**, together with internal repair work. As most residents will appreciate, this is a listed grade-two building in the village conservation area, and it was understood that the owners had discussed the matter with Grant Audley-Miller, the local Conservation Officer. Permission to go ahead with the internal repair work was given.

Also in April, permission was received for an extension at **6 Couplings Close**, internal alterations in **King's Manor** barn and alterations and extension to **Allwinds** at The Lynch, but a refusal for permission to build two houses in the grounds of **Fordybrook** and an extension to the existing house was made, and the Council understands that this latter application has gone to an *Appeal Hearing* in March 2005.

In **May**, an extra Parish Council meeting was held to discuss the demolition of nine garages **behind the Eyston Arms** (which have since received permission and have now been demolished), the erection of a pair of semi-detached cottages on a site **adjacent to St. Amand's School** and an *Appeal* against the decision to build two houses in the **garden of Sheard Studio**. The plans for the houses on the site adjacent to St. Amand's School had been first shown to the Council in the Autumn 2003 and neighbouring residents had shown concern then. These plans had now been modified, but were still causing concern because of possible problems from overdevelopment of the site, of flooding from a nearby spring, and from several mature chestnut trees close to the boundary of the site, inaccuracy of the plans, significant changes in height planned requiring excavation, and the problem of parking (some of which was presently being used by parents delivering and collecting their children from school). It was felt, too, that the site was inappropriate as there were others more suited to this purpose. Tony Ford presented the Council's view at the Vale Planning Meeting and a decision was made to defer a decision until more information was available on the proposed levels.

When the Vale Planners had objected to the two houses in the garden of **Sheard's Studio**, it was on the grounds that *"the layout of the proposed dwellings on the site and their relationship to the road are contrary in form and appearance to the prevailing character of this edge of the village location. Given the position of the site within the Conservation Area and the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty, the proposal would therefore result in a form of development at odds with and harmful to the loose-knit character of the area"*. The Planners went on to add that it was contrary to the Vale of White Horse *Adopted Local Plan*. Several neighbouring residents had expressed their objections and the Council confirmed its objections. The Council waits to receive a date for the appeal.

Also discussed was a rear extension and conversion of the garage to a games room at **Lavender House, Newbury Road** and the Vale Planners later gave their consent.

The **Hendred Estate** applied to change the use of garage and outbuildings (where the original office was situated) to form storage space for garden machinery and general storage and this has now received approval.

Councillors made a site visit to view plans for an extension to the existing office space at the **Trout Farm** and had no objections. The Vale comments are still awaited.

In **June**, approval was sought for **new signage for The Wheatsheaf** by Greene King and this was given. The **Hendreds' School** requested a further extension to the five-years given for its temporary prefab building and this was agreed by the District Planners.

In **July**, the Council discussed a proposed extension to **2 Woods Farm Road** (which has now received permission), storage units at **UKAEA**, a first floor extra bedroom at **11 Couplings Close** (permission granted) and a two-storey extension at **Cobbler's Cottage in Cat Street**. A site meeting was held at Cobbler's Cottage and councillors were concerned by the scale, design, form and materials of the extension proposed and considered them to be unsympathetic to the character of this rural cottage, which is a listed building and, as a result, objected to application. There is no response from the Vale, as yet.

An controversial proposal to add **three new antennae** to the existing mast at the **Rowstock Telephone Exchange** was strongly objected to by residents close to the exchange. It should be noted that East Hendred's Parish includes Rowstock Corner House, two bungalows close to the Hungerford Road (*"The Golden Mile"*) and two houses on the road to the Harwell site, together with the telephone exchange. The old Acorn Garage and the previous *"Japanese Connection"* and the houses along the Wantage Road on that side are all in the Milton Parish. Usually, Parishes adjacent to a planning application receive plans for their comments but, in this particular case, there was confusion and none of the residents knew of the proposals through Milton Parish Council. In fact, when O2 UK Ltd first considered the application, they wrote to Harwell PC earlier in the year and stated that the nearest schools (at Great Milton and Tetsworth) were out of range of the mast — both schools being on the A40! The Council felt that the information had been poorly presented and were concerned about the health of the local residents from additional antennae and objected to this application. We await the Vale Planners comments.
