Parish Plan — why we need one

Your village needs you (everybody living and working in East Hendred) to contribute to a new *Parish Plan*.

The last *Plan* (1969) is now outdated, and a replacement is needed to respond to the changes occurring within and outside the village over the next 10–15 years.

Local changes

Changes to the built and natural environments of the village have occurred for centuries, but typically on a scale and pace that could be absorbed without serious detrimental effects to its appearance. Recently, the pace has accelerated, as people have wanted more living space, to own one or more car, and to enjoy better educational, leisure and workplace facilities.

Regional changes

In addition, new government policies are likely to have a considerable impact on this part of Oxfordshire. In particular:

- The South East England Regional Assembly (SEERA) 20-year Plan is consulting on whether to build a large number of houses per annum in its area, which stretches from Essex to Oxfordshire. Depending on which alternative is selected, central Oxfordshire (which includes East Hendred), is projected to have from 1,000 to over 2,000 additional houses each year.
- Large housing developments at Didcot and Grove are planned.
- A new reservoir is proposed close to Steventon.

All of these could have a significant impact on local infrastructure, including roads, educational, health, welfare, and leisure provision.

Valuable framework

Reconciling demands for change with ensuring that the character of our beautiful and historic village is not eroded is becoming more complex and challenging. A new *Plan* produced by village people will provide a framework to help the Parish, District and County Councils to respond to government initiatives and to consider planning applications from the village more effectively. In addition, such a *Plan* would provide guidelines for those planning developments in the village.

The local Planning Authority says that it takes account of Parish Plans in making its decisions, but our current plan is so out of date that it is no longer relevant. The Vale of White Horse District Council and Oxfordshire Rural Community Council are positively encouraging all local communities to prepare what are now being called Parish Plans. Many of our neighbouring villages (e.g. Steventon and Blewbury) have already developed Plans or are in the process of doing so. The Parish Council acknowledges the need for an up-to-date Plan and has now allocated resources so that it can be drawn up and published over the next 18 months. To ensure that the Parish Plan for East Hendred is a true reflection of the views of people living and working in the village, please take this opportunity to contribute to it. Future issues of the Bulletin will keep you informed of progress and other ways in which you can help.

Steering Group

The first two steps in the production of a new *Plan* are: Setting up a Steering Group The Parish Council has initiated the preparation of a *Parish Plan* but a Steering Group, separate from the Parish Council, is needed and will be responsible for gathering information and preparing the *Plan* for publication. The Steering Group will need to take account of the requirements not only of other published *Plans* (e.g. *Vale Local Plan*) developed over a long period with considerable scrutiny, that affect this and other local villages, but also the guidelines set up for the development of *Parish Plans*. In addition, it is anticipated that the Steering Group will send out another questionnaire focussing on more detailed issues.

The Steering Group should include a range of village representatives in addition to a small number of Parish Councillors. Volunteers are needed for this Group, either as individuals or as representatives of organisations. Village organisations will be asked if they wish to nominate representatives. We are keen that villagers who do not belong to a village organisation but are interested in being directly involved in the Plan should come forward, as we particularly want to widen the current small group that is leading this activity. Questionnaire to identify issues

It is crucial that the *Plan* reflects the views of as many residents and local businesses as possible.

A short questionnaire is included in this *Bulletin* to identify the main issues and concerns of those living or working in East Hendred. This questionnaire will also be sent to a wide range of village organisations for their consideration and response. The responses to this questionnaire will provide a starting point for the Steering Group's discussions. **Please take the time to fill in the questionnaire and return it to Hendred Stores or to any Parish Councillor.**

We have been discussing the need for an updated Parish Plan over several years. I am pleased that an initiative has now been taken by the Council to produce a new Plan (see front page of this Bulletin for details). Please take the time to complete the attached questionnaire, as it is very important that the group developing the Plan knows the main issues concerning residents and workers in this village. Parish Plans are increasingly being recognised for their importance in providing a formal voice for villages' concerns and needs. We are also inviting individuals, or representatives from

organisations, to come forward to be part of the Steering Group preparing the *Plan*.

Our Parish Council Annual General Meeting was held on April 26th in Snells Hall. It was an opportunity to find out what has happened to your village over the last year as well as an occasion to put forward your views on future activities. Unfortunately, few villagers seem to want to be involved. The Parish Council is the first point of call for outside bodies to contact when seeking views on future issues that could impact on this village. In addition, our District and County Councillors are regular attendees at our parish meetings and they report on activities within their own Councils. Thanks were given to our retiring Clerk, Ann Taylor, who has provided very good service to the Council for over eight years. We also

welcomed our new Clerk, Bill Falkenau, who took over from 1 May. We are looking forward to working with him and his wife.

New housing in this village remains an ongoing and controversial issue. Objections were raised by the Parish Council to two recent applications for development in the village Conservation Area. These were also rejected by the Vale Council Planning Committee but subsequently went to appeal. The first for two houses on a site off Newbury Road was accepted by the Appeal inspector, whilst the second for two houses on a site off Fordy Lane was rejected at appeal. The main ground for this rejection was their incursion into a zone of green space through the village, including Snells, the old sewage beds, the lower area of Fordy Lane and the Sports field. This aspect will be considered

in more depth by the Group developing the Parish Plan as a result of the comments from the Appeal inspector, defining areas where development will be discouraged in future for the benefit of the village.

The Hendreds were in a new division for the recent County Council elections (with the Hanneys, Marcham and Steventon). This meant that our previous County Councillor, Richard Farrell, did not stand for this ward. I should like to thank him for his diligent attention to the Hendreds over the last four years. He has attended most of our Parish Council meetings, keeping us informed of County Council activities, often coming along having been at other meetings all day. We look forward to working with our new County Councillor, Iain Brown.

1969 Village Plan

This *Plan* was developed with input from the Berkshire County Council Planning Office and Wantage Rural District Council. It contained several sections that included aspects such as the villages' regional and physical setting, communications, industry and employment, public services, and the old village. A village envelope was proposed, outside of which new development

would be discouraged, as well as identifying areas for future tree planting, a new children's play area and additional footpaths. It also included several specific proposals:

- Architectural and historic features should be maintained and their preservation secured for the village, such as the Jesus Chapel and cob and thatch walls.
- The village should be continued within its present village envelope and substantial new development refused.

- The newly-designated *Conservation Area* (agreed in 1967) should be supported and recognised that dwellings within its area would be subject to additional planning control.
- The landscape value of trees was recognised, and tree preservation orders were proposed on certain trees, together with plans for new planting in designated areas of the village.
- The village core should be reemphasised, for example, clearing and re-establishing Snells as a public space, and securing the old village school as a village hall (now Snells Hall).
- Improved traffic management scheme for village streets.
 Sites were indicated in the plan for car parking and lock-up garages behind the Eyston Arms, planned extension of the sewage works, and old people's bungalows fronting the High Street (opposite the Jesus chapel).

A look at these proposals shows that many (but not all) were implemented in the last 30+ years!

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council

Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) is the County focus for supporting rural communities. It provides support to parishes preparing *Parish Plans* and to the provision of affordable housing. ORCC also helps to support village shops and post offices, and promotes the provision and effective management of village halls. The Parish Council is a member of ORCC, as also is the Snells Hall Committee.

John Sharp (our Parish Council chairman) has recently been appointed to the Executive Board of ORCC.

New playground equipment

A new piece of playground equipment has recently been installed in the Mill Lane playground to replace the see-saw.


Vale of White Horse information

Vale Local Plan – 2011

An updated version of the Vale Council *Local Plan* is in draft form and is now the subject of a public inquiry. The Parish Council made a number of comments at the stage when requested and we have asked the inspector to take these on board in his scrutiny of the draft *Plan*. Our comments were mainly concerned with affordable housing, and increased traffic on the A417 when the Grove housing expansion takes place.



Parish Council AGM

The Parish Council Annual General Meeting was held on Tuesday 26 April in Snells Hall. This provided an opportunity to hear of Council activities over the past year, including reports from several Working Groups, as well as from our County and District Councillors and from our schools' Governors. We hope next year to see larger attendance the parish, as the AGM is an important community forum.

Speed limit on the A417

The Parish Council has been trying for several years to get the speed limit on the part of the A417 through our village reduced. The Oxfordshire Highways Authority has listened to our views, but felt that other areas in the County were a higher priority (accident wise!) and that a lower speed limit would be difficult to police. We, with the other local Parish Councils (West Hendred, Ardington-Lockinge), have recently written to the Highways Authority, to try once again to get a reduced speed limit.

We welcome the petition that is being put together by Robert Griffiths (*see elsewhere in this Bulletin*) and hope that this will help encourage the Highways Authority to change its mind.

Dog fouling – AGAIN!!

The Council has again received complaints from residents about dog mess around the village. There are now a number of signs pointing out that a penalty is in force for those who just cannot be bothered to clean up after their dog has performed. Always carry a plastic bag with you to clean up and either take it home or put it in the bins provided around the village. Apart from the mess, if accidentally trodden in, it can cause illness and worse, with young children especially at risk.

Moreover, our Lengthman does not wish to continually clean his mower after cutting grass which has "*hidden*" dog mess amongst it.

New footpath gate by allotments

With financial help from the County Council and the Parish Council, a new gate has been installed on the footpath close to the allotments. The Hendred Estate has also provided additional fencing, making it difficult for motor cycles to be taken onto the footpath. These have been a problem over the last year, making it unsafe for walkers to use the paths, as well as creating a noise problem. It is clearly marked as a footpath and should not be used by horses, motorcycles or bicycles.

New County election boundaries.

As a result of changes to county election boundaries, the Hendreds will be part of a different division, including Marcham, the Hanneys and Steventon. Previously, we were part of a ward that included Blewbury, Chilton and Harwell.

We objected to the change, at the time, as the Parish Council felt that we had more in common with Harwell and Chilton, but this was overruled. Elections for a new County Councillor for this area took place on 5 May, coinciding with the General Election. As a result of the change in boundaries, our previous County Councillor, Richard Farrell, was no longer able to stand for the Hendreds' ward. The new County Councillor for the Hanneys & Hendreds ward is Iain Brown.

South East England Regional Assembly

Most householders have received a document from South East England Regional Assembly (SEERA) seeking their views on future housing in the SE region, over the next twenty years.

The three options provided are 25,000, 28,000 or 32,000 houses per annum in the region.

Although many of these will be further east, central Oxfordshire is projected to add 1,000 to 2,000 of these additional houses every year.

This will put pressure on local facilities and on the road structure. Please take the opportunity to respond to this questionnaire, as it is our opportunity to have some say in what happens in this region.

Harwell Local Liaison Meeting

Our Parish Council has provided a representative to this *Liaison Meeting* for many years, which has provided an opportunity to influence the UKAEA management on items affecting this parish (e.g. Lydebank brook), as well as being a means of finding out information relevant to the village from activities on the Harwell and Rutherford-Appleton sites.

The Nuclear Decommissioning Agency (NDA), set up by the DTI, is taking over responsibility for decommissioning of radioactive waste across the country, including at the Harwell site. The NDA has been active in modifying the role of the *Local Liaison Committees*, for example, requiring that each Committee is open to the public and is chaired by an independent person. In the past, the chair has been taken by John Wilkins, head of the UKAEA site management.

Over the last few months, a small committee composed from representatives on the Harwell *Local Liaison Committee*, has been set up to oversee these changes, including drafting a new constitution. The Committee has included John Sharp and Terry Fraser (our District Councillor).

The meeting on 9 April appointed a new independent chairman (Terry Fraser), as well as adopting the new constitution for the group, which will in future be called the *Harwell-Chilton Campus Local Stakeholder Group.*

East Hendred Parish Council will continue to have a representative on this Group.

Shrubs, trees and greenery

If your garden has shrubs or trees planted just inside your boundary, but with new season's growth now overhanging footpaths and roadways, please cut back the extra growth to the edge of your property, both for the sake of passers-by and to keep sight lines clear for drivers emerging from side roads and driveways.

From the Local Beat Officer

In the coming months, the Police Exhibition van will be touring some of my Parishes.

It has already visited Lockinge and Ardington, with West Hendred set for Friday 20 May and the East Hendred fete for Saturday 21 May. I will be there on each date, as will our crime prevention adviser, Sarah Merritt. I hope to see a great many of you at each location.

This brings me to *Neighbourhood Watch*. I have done a great deal of work with NHW in East and West Hanney, and am keen to expand this to my other Parishes. I have arranged a meeting for Ardington & Lockinge NHW on Tuesday 26 April. This will be followed later in the year by a meeting for East & West Hendred NHW with a date still to be set for this, so watch this space.

Some of you may have noticed Police Civilian Support Officers (PCSO) out on patrol. Even if you haven't seen them, you should have heard of them as the government is pushing this initiative very hard at the moment, with the aim of improving high-visibility policing. We currently have two PCSOs based at Wantage, and probably more to come in the future. I am of course encouraging them to patrol my villages so, whether you support the idea of PCSOs or not, they are now a fact, so please make them feel welcome if you see them out and about.

Finally, the longer evenings and better weather are now on the way. Whilst this is great news for all, I do not want to find gangs of youths upsetting the elderly, and other residents. By all means, get out and enjoy yourself (after all, we all did!) but if I receive complaints of anti-social behaviour, this will be dealt with, and it will only be your summer ruined.


Repatterning Meetings are usually held in Snells Hall on the third Thursday of the month at 7.30pm, except where indicated otherwise.

East Hendred Community Centre

The car park extension is now finished, apart from the sowing of a mixture of meadow flowers seed on the slopes leading down to the Penney Play Park. It is expected that, in time, this will vastly improve the appearance of the banking. The total cost of the project, almost £15,000, has been met by grants from the Millennium Commission, Oxfordshire County Council, Vale of White Horse District Council and East Hendred Parish Council, with the balance from our own funds. We would wish to express our grateful thanks to all of these for their financial support. Praise and thanks are also very much due to Phil Hodgson and Nigel Long of Glanvilles, who provided a great deal of professional help with site surveys and advice about construction details of the overflow car park, which was originally designed by Bogdan Nedelkoff.

We are also indebted to Julian Gold and the Hendred Farm Partnership for all of their arduous efforts to initiate and complete this enterprise to such a high standard.

This facility is of considerable value to our larger bookings and the twice-daily use, during term time, by parents of children at The Hendreds School, by helping to prevent overspill onto nearby roads. A swing barrier has also been now installed, which will be used when safety or security are compromised.

Bookings at Snells Hall are almost at saturation level and this is making heavy demands on our efforts to clean and maintain the fabric of the buildings. A repair and renewal programme has been instigated and, following the repairs and replacements mentioned in the last Bulletin, Philip Amor of Downland Scapes has replaced a number of broken paving slabs in the patio and grouted the whole area. Meanwhile, John Darby and his team from Millbrook Property Services have conducted a major clean of windows inside and outside of the Hall and removed dust and cobwebs from difficult to reach places in the vaulted roof.

We are also planning to have the Main Hall and other rooms redecorated during the early Summer, when bookings permit.

Snells Hall is widely recognised and admired as an excellent village facility and we would ask all users to assist by leaving the premises in a clean and tidy condition after their events. It is often not possible to provide assistance before and after backto-back events.

A417...not a serious risk?

Speaking to local residents paints a clear picture: people are having to take risks when entering and leaving our village. The speed and volume of traffic along the A417 means that residents face great difficulty, especially when trying to join the A417 at the village entrance. At peak times, large queues of traffic build up along White Road. This is especially relevant in East Hendred, where many vehicles converge on the village at the same time to either deliver, or collect, their children at our primary schools. In these situations, motorists naturally become frustrated and take risks that they would otherwise avoid.

After speaking with residents living along the A417, an even more worrying picture emerges. Many residents feel that it is impossible to access their properties safely with cars moving at 50mph or faster. Several residents living along the A417 have young families and are deeply concerned that their children are put at risk by traffic speeding past their homes. This is not really surprising when you realize that residents have already had minor crashes with passing traffic whilst trying to exit their homes. One resident, incredibly, escaped injury when a vehicle overturned onto its roof and crashed into their garden. It seems likely that it is only a matter of time until minor incidents and near misses are overshadowed by

Mrs Anne Geach, who lives along the A417, has pursued this issue for some time through local Councillor, Mr Richard Farrell. Mr Farrell's support and consultation with the Highways Department has been invaluable but, unfortunately, it appears that we remain a non-priority case and will have to put up with this situation for some time to come.

The Parish Council has been playing its part in this issue and recently submitted a letter to the Highways Department (along with other near-by villages) regarding the road speed limit. In light of efforts to date, a petition has now been started. Hopefully, this will convey the strength of feeling held by local residents concerning the present speed limit past the village. Many villagers have already signed their support and we will endeavour to reach the rest of the village soon.

In addition to the petition, we will be forwarding a folder of personal experiences, views and letters from local residents to the Highways Department. Any contributions to the folder will be greatly appreciated.

East Hendred Heritage Trust: 10th anniversary celebrations

Snell's Hall, Saturday 30 April, was followed by an AGM East Hendred Heritage Trust is celebrating its tenth anniversary, having taken over the Chapel Museum in 1995.

There had previously been a Museum in the Chapel but, in 1995, the Parish Council decided it was no longer appropriate to retain the lease of Champs Chapel from the Hendred Estate, which under Mr T.M. Eyston had restored the building from dereliction, in 1974, and then leased it to the Council on a peppercorn rent for 21 years. However, times had changed, including the arrival of business rates as well as higher rentals, which placed an unjustifiable burden on the Council, who had run the building as a meeting place, village library and museum.

Fortunately, village Trustees were then found, enabling the continued existence of the Museum, a situation that has continued over the last ten years. Steady progress has been made to improve the access to village archives, and additions to the collection have meant an increasing workload and the need for additional volunteer helpers.

Something of that progress was shown prior to the AGM period, when the accounts and reports were presented.

Hendred's *"Home Front* 1939–45" Recall

New Chapel exhibition

now open. This year's new exhibition by Hendred Heritage commemorates the role of the Hendreds and its inhabitants during the immense challenges and changes caused by the second world war.

Hendred, at the outbreak of the war, was largely an agricultural community, but its residents quickly became very closely connected with air fields, munitions factories, and war work, as well as accommodating school children and office and laboratory workers evacuated from London.

Those changes set the scene for an even greater social upheaval when Harwell was converted overnight from an active airfield into a secret research establishment, at the end of 1945.

The Chapel Museum will be extending the exhibits throughout the year, and we hope to collect further personal stories from those who played a part, to complement static displays that commemorate specific Home Front events.

These *Oral History* recordings will provide a unique comment

on Berkshire life during a time of great change. The general knowledge of village happenings is there, as is much physical memorabilia; but if you were there or have think of him as a national sporting personality at the time?

Are there any Land Girls about who remember being billeted in the huts on Ludbridge Hill or on local



knowledge, we need your personal touch with a few specifics, such as jogging the memory about people and events. Few first-hand memories remain, so now is the time to collect the record for posterity.

A few examples... Does E MacDonald Bailey, who we now understand to be back in his West Indies home, remember his sojourn here with the RAF? How many of us remember him and his subsequent record-breaking achievements as a runner? Did we farms? Perhaps some then-visiting service personnel still keep in touch with present residents and remember the delights of the Plough. or the dances in the Village Hall?

For some service men, such memories might be better than those of actually returning to Harwell, after a raid, when dodging the trees on **the Ridgeway**. What about a Glider Pilot who landed up there in error during training?

Did you serve in or around the **MG Car Company** in Abingdon,

to help produce the tanks that were tested on our ancient prehistoric highway, the Ridgeway, where four-wheel drive motors were so recently banned to in winter?

At **Milton Hill**, the previous home of Sir Mortimer Singer and partly in our parish, an international oil company set up a wartime evacuation centre for its offices and laboratories from Central London. Do the words *"Anglo"* or even *"Pool Petrol"* mean special things to you?

At Didcot and Milton — now the home of a Power Station and Milton Park — **Army and Air Force Ordnance** Depots and Stores thrived, served from the Midlands and the West by the Great Western Railway.

Do you remember Orchard Stables being used for billets and the Oak Room as a **NAFI canteen**?

Like most villages, we know we have a story to record that will add a chapter to our past, so please help with our Museum project if you have memories or contacts. Norman Francis has already carried out some interviews, we need more. We are searching for voices, too — owners of voices who are prepared to capture their memories, in their own words, onto audio record, rather than the less-personal printed text.

The Sheard painting returns



The Sheard Painting, sometimes called the *Jumble Sale*, sometimes the *Village Feast*, is one of the village collection's special archives and it returned to the village on the weekend of 30 April after restoration work. It was briefly on show in the village school location (where it once hung over the Headmasters desk), later to return to the Chapel.

During its restoration work, a previous application of varnish proved truly difficult stuff to remove and our restorer is also

It is good to see the painting back in its new case in Champs Chapel and we continue gather together the true history of those who are illustrated so vividly, as well as details of Professor Sheard himself.



Fire Pump home nears completion

We are pleased to report that the new Fire Pump building at Snells Hall now has its final planning permission and the surrounds are almost complete.

Receipt of the grant donated by the Vale of White Horse District Council now releases funds for the final touches, which will collect together and display what we know of the chequered history of our Fire Pump, which was bought by the village overseers in 1831. The display is along the front of the building, so that visitors can learn more of its origins.

All that will then remain is to ensure that the Pump itself is maintained in working order and to give the building a second coat of paint.

Holiday essentials from your own Post Office

To access the health services of a European Union country, while on holiday, each member of your family needs to have with them a completed *E111* health form. These are quick and easy to fill in and are available free of charge from the village Post Office. We rarely know when we may need to see a doctor — so keep the form with your passport...just in case.

Don't forget that the Post Office now offers very competitive worldwide travel insurance. Pick up a leaflet at the village PO and give them a ring.

You may also obtain your foreign currency from the Post Office at very competitive rates and this can be obtained within 24 hours of order. The PO also offers a buyback service for any currency that you have not used and there is no commission on these services.

From the Post Office and Family Investments

To encourage the next generation to build up their savings, the government has introduced a new fund.

Every child born on or after 1 September 2002 will receive a voucher to invest in a *Special Child Trust Fund Account*. These vouchers are worth a minimum if £250 and are being sent out now. Only the child can withdraw the money when they are 18. Parents and others can invest up to £1,200 each year on behalf of the child. The Post Office has teamed with Family Investments to offer a *Child Trust Fund Account* — pick up a leaflet at the Post Office for more information.

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
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Planning Matters

Since the Winter *Bulletin*, the Parish Council has been asked to comment on the following Planning Applications from the Vale District Council:

Erection of a garden room/conservatory at The Old Post Office in The High Street. The Council did not object but hoped that materials used were suitable for a building in the Conservation Area, and the Vale Planning Department approved.

Erection of a **dwelling adjacent to** Green Meadows in Mill Lane. Councillors felt that this would be a large building and, in view of its prominent position on the edge of the village, requested that the roof line be kept low. The Vale Planners approved the application, bearing in mind comments that the Parish Council had made when the application was originally received, in respect of the closeness to the stream. The Vale has asked to see samples of the materials to be used. (NB: this is quite a normal procedure.)

Request for additional windows and a roof light on the new house being built in Cat Street (to the rear of Penney Green) received no objections, provided frosted glass was used, and approved by the Vale Planners.

Erection of a **three-car garage at Fordybrook Farm** has been sought and the Parish Council considered that a *Clause 106* requirement be placed on any permission to ensure that the garage was not used as a dwelling in the future. No response to this application has yet been received from the Vale.

The **Hendred Estate** received permission for amended fenestration to the centre section of the southern elevation of the barn being refurbished on its premises.

Construction of a **footpath from Fordy Lane, through Snells**, to the Snells Hall car park, for the benefit of pupils from The Hendreds School. This matter has been considered by School governors and councillors for some time, since the route from the car park to the school does not have a continuous footpath along Church Street, as it peters out by the Rectory. It was decided that the safer route would be via Fordy Lane, through Snells, which is owned by the Hendred Estate. Councillors were happy to find a safe solution for the children and the Vale Planners have agreed to a footpath, although the final route has yet to be agreed by all the parties involved, i.e. Hendred Estate, Snells Hall Committee, Parish Council and School Governors.

Councillors met on site to discuss proposals for an extension and a new garage at **Brightwell House**, off the Reading Road, and did not object, but requested that the Vale Planners considered a *Section 106* be placed on the new extension to prevent it being used as a dwelling in the future, and the Vale Planners have agreed to make such a ruling.

Permission was received for the extension at **The Sun Dial, Horn** Lane and, again, Vale Planners wished to see samples of materials to be used.

Extension and alterations to Cobbler's Cottage in Cat Street. Councillors discussed amended plans for these proposals at their January meeting, but objected, on the grounds that the new extension was out of keeping with the existing building and projected to the side in such a way that it intruded on the village scene. The Council understands that parking will be made deeper into the property, so that cars do not protrude on to the footpath.

A new set of plans **for Rowstock Cottage** were discussed and although Councillors were pleased to note that the original cottage would not be demolished, they felt that the new proposal would put a very large extension on a relatively small cottage in such a way that it destroyed the character of this very good and rare example of vernacular local architecture of a small, labourer's cottage of cob, brick and thatch.

Proposals for a **Mast for Orange** Communications on the southern edge of Aldfield Farm were considered. The Hendred Estate had proposed a site nearer to the Harwell Business Centre, and Orange had agreed to move the mast to the edge of the farm. The Parish Council did not object and the plans have since been passed. The Parish Council was asked to consider plans **for five houses on**

I ne rarish Council was asked to consider plans for five houses on the "Japanese Connection" site adjacent to the Acorn Garage. (East Hendred is a neighbour to the site, which is actually served by Milton Parish Council.) There were concerns that the extra new antenna, recently agreed to, on the BT tower were close to the site and the Council asked that these be taken into consideration, whilst observing that there could be over development of the site. (No comment from the Vale, as yet.)

A site meeting was held to view proposed rear extensions to 13 Newbury Road, but councillors considered that these would not be seen from the road and the roof level kept low.

The Parish Council often raises concerns with the District Planners on items for which no application has been received, to check work being undertaken on a property is in order. Not all alterations to properties need planning approval but, should residents have queries on what they intend to add to their homes, always talk to the District Planning Department first — even work on trees and hedges may need approval, particularly if you live in the Conservation Area.
