## **Funding for Nature Trail**

#### **Stop Press!**

Hendreds Environment Group have just heard the good news. We have been awarded the full grant (over £9000 of lottery funding) for the "Heart of Hendreds Project", which will create a "Breathing Place" for wildlife and people, on Hendred Estate land near Snells.

If you've watched the BBC's Springwatch series in the last few weeks, you may have come across the BBC Breathing Places campaign which encourages communities to look after green spaces in their local area for their own pleasure and benefit, and to benefit local wildlife.

The Heart of Hendreds Project will, together with Oxfordshire County Council, fund a footpath alongside the stream next to Snells Hall, through the small wood behind the play park, which will link the hall and Fordy Lane. This will provide a safer route for children walking to Hendreds Primary School. Many people have worked on achieving this path for years; this lottery funding will fill the gap that has stopped action up till now.

We will be looking for volunteers to help us with the practical work of clearing the route for the path, and improving the wood for wildlife with planting and bird and bat boxes. In addition HOHP will be improving a neglected orchard area next to the footpath between Snells and the High Street and developing it as a Community Orchard with regular public openings. Again we'll be planting to create a good habitat for wildlife and we'll be involving everyone in this!

We hope that as many of you as possible will want to join us in creating this new Breathing Place for our village, and that all of you will enjoy it in the future. We are very excited about spending this grant! Many thanks to Hendred Estate, and everyone involved in planning the footpath and the rest of the project.

## **Report on Annual Parish Meeting- May 2008**

This was held in Snells Hall on May 9<sup>th</sup> and attended by Parish Councillors, District and County Councillors and members of the public.

The Chairman, John Sharp, reported on the Council activities over the last year. A new Council had been elected in May 2007. The main highlight of the year was the completion and publication of the Parish Plan, which had involved a considerable amount of effort but provides the village with an up-to-date Plan in line with other neighbouring villages. Both the District and County Councils had been very supportive in the preparation of the Plan. The Council had been very encouraged by the retention of the village Post Office. A Housing Needs survey had been undertaken by the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council highlighting the need for more affordable housing. Consultation on the proposed Thames Water reservoir continued and the Council was involved in this.

East Hendred had received a "highly commended" award for communication in last year's "Village of the Year" competition which was rewarding. This reflected the high quality of the Bulletins and also the village web site.

The precept for 2007/8 had been £16,000 which included expenditure on the village lengthman, clerk, courtesy lighting, bulletins, insurance and grants to local organisations totalling about £2500. The Council had commented on 20 planning applications during the year. The Council had also been involved in several appeals involving Greensands.

Four Bulletins had been produced during the last year and the distribution now included West Rowstock as well as the village. The village web site was kept up to date and minutes of the Parish Council meetings were now available on it.

The Council had been involved in a wide range of consultations during the year, which included the County Council review of Subsidised Bus Services and External Transport posts. In addition the Council had commented on the Regional Housing Strategy review, Vale DC's, Local Development Framework and Open Space, Sport and Recreational Provision in the District. As members of the Harwell-Chilton Local Stakeholder group the Council had commented on the draft Business Plan from the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority.

Contributions were also made by the County and District Councillors and spokespersons for each of the Council's Working Groups. Reports were also given on both village schools and from the village organisations which had received grants during the last year. The minutes of the meeting will be available from the village web site in due course.

### **Review of Conservation Area**

The Vale District Council has undertaken a review of the village Conservation Area (CA), as reported in the Winter 2007 Bulletin. Some extensions to the existing CA were proposed in line with the proposals from the recently published Village Plan.

The Vale District Council is expected to approve the revised Conservation Area at it's July meeting; details of the changes are available on the Council web site (www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk).

The main extensions are as follows:

- •Orchard Lane/High Street: Extension of the boundary on the north-east to include important junction of roads and lanes, the east section of Orchard Lane, historic garden plots, listed buildings and buildings of local interest which are considered to meet the criteria for inclusion within the conservation area.
- •Allin's Lane: This is an important historic access road into East Hendred. Amendment of the boundary is therefore proposed to draw the boundary in more closely to the built settlement, following clearly defined physical boundaries.
- •Church Street, Horn Lane: An extension to the boundary is proposed on the west to include the junction of Church Street with Fordy Lane, the south section of Fordy Lane and to bring the listed building Orchard End and buildings of local interest, Furlong Cottage and The Cottage within the conservation area boundary.
- •Newbury Road: The south boundary of the conservation area extends to the south of Monks Farm House, Newbury Road and includes parts of Tree Preservation orders C8 and C9. It is proposed to draw the boundary in more closely following clearly defined physical boundaries to the east of Downside.
- •St Mary's Road: The east boundary is extended to include the east section of St Mary's Road, Cow Road, Hill Farm Lane, an area of paddock to the north and east of Hill Farm and a section of the valley which includes the moat to Hendred House.

## **Village Design Statement**

A Village Design Statement is needed particularly to support the recently published Parish Plan and to assist in assessing and commenting on planning applications. A considerable amount of additional background information was obtained when the Vale District Council reviewed the Conservation Area and the Council have agreed that this is available for village use.

- •The main elements of a VDS are:
- •A description of the distinctive character of the village and surrounding countryside
- •An outline of the landscape setting of the village
- •Description of the shape of the settlement
- •Nature of the buildings in the parish
- •Preparation of design principles based on the distinctive local character, landscape setting and buildings.

It is proposed to develop a VDS with help from people in the village with the relevant expertise. More information on this will be available in the next Bulletin.

## **Survey on Housing Needs**

In February the Parish Council hand-delivered *Housing Needs Surveys* to every home in the village. The Survey was drawn up by the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council (ORCC) in order to investigate the housing need for local people and to gauge local opinion. Thank you to the 30% of villagers (130 households) who completed and returned their survey to the ORCC. The responses have been analysed and the following conclusions drawn:

69% of those who responded would support a small development of affordable homes for those with a genuine connection to the village. The ORCC recommended that any planned development of affordable homes should focus on one-bedroom and two-bedroom properties in order to meet the local need. The most favoured site for any such development by those responding was the Old Garages site in Coulings Close.

The Parish Council is continuing in its efforts to provide affordable housing for those with a proven connection to the village.

## **New Minute Secretary**

We are pleased to report that Diana Wheeker has agreed to take on the role of Minute Secretary to the Parish Council. This will relieve the load on the Clerk, who will continue to deal with planning issues, correspondence and the Council finances.

## **Message from District Councillor Mike Murray**

This time I really just wanted to write about the reservoir. This will be the biggest infrastructure project ever seen by the Vale, and the rationale and justification for it has now been published in the Thames Water water resources management plan. This document is open for public consultation until late August to give everyone a chance to have their say on it. It is an enormous document- some 900 pages, and highly technical and I think we are all relying on the Environment Agency to scrutinise the technical detail on our behalf. They are hoping to publicise their advice towards the end of July. It is however available now for everyone to view on Thames Water's website.

however the Vale is a major consultee. There will be a public meeting of the council to consider and resolve what the Vale's response should be on Wed 13th August- I would encourage as many people as possible to attend. On other matters I am sorry to report that my recent motion in council to retain weekly black bag bin collections was roundly rejected by the ruling party. As the bin collection contract is shortly up for renewal, we should expect from this news to see the end of weekly collections and the introduction of "alternate" (ie fortnightly) collections instead. For those like me with lots of small children this is not good news

## **Ed Vaisey**

This is the first time I have written for the Hendreds magazine. I write a monthly column for many parish magazines across the constituency, and try to make it as a political as possible. I use it to up-date people on what I have been doing locally.

the EA will be providing advice to the Secretary of State,

Three enduring themes seem to be ever present this yearwith both a local and a national impact.

The first is Post Offices. We heard recently that all 22 Post Offices earmarked for closure in Oxfordshire will indeed close. That includes five in the immediate area, including Ardington, which will have an impact on the quality of life of many people in the villages. Local people campaigned very hard to keep their services, and I worked closely with them. For one Post Office in particular, I received more than 150 letters, but to no avail. I think that as more and more services are withdrawn from the Post Office, more Post Offices will close in the future. We have not heard the last of this issue by any stretch.

The second issue is science. Problems with the science budget have seen voluntary redundancies at Harwell, and there has been huge concern in the physics community across the country about what is happening. I have been very involved with the campaign to try and restore some of the funding. Now the House of Commons' science and technology has weighed in and called for the funding to be restored and jobs to be saved. We will see what happens.

Third, flooding. Neighbouring MP David Cameron held a debate on the floods in the House of Commons at the beginning of May, and highlighted the need for more to be done to clear brooks and ditches to try and minimise the impact of future floods. I also participated, but did not get the chance, in the short debate, to raise concerns about the impact of local developments on flood risk.

On local issues, I have been contacted by many people worried about the future of the local GP dispensing service. This is because the Government is proposing to give chemists' greater powers to dispense drugs. I am firmly opposed to proposals to close down GP dispensaries, and will be fighting this all the way. At the moment it is only a proposal for consultation, and I will be keeping you informed of developments.

## **Thames Water- Water Resources Management Plan**

Water supply companies have a statutory obligation to prepare a "Water Resources Management plan". This sets out the framework for 25 years in terms of both demand and the need for new resources. It is expected that the final plan for Thames Water will include the new local reservoir.

The public consultations on the draft Plan opened on May 7th and runs though to August 27th. Our responses will help Thames Water decide on how to best manage water supplies in London and the Thames Valley in the future. Following the consultation Thames Water will publish in October 2008 a summary of responses to the consultation, which will explain how comments will be considered in the preparation of the final Water Resources Management Plan. The draft Plan is available on the Thames Water web site (www.thameswater.co.uk). Please take the opportunity to look at the draft Plan and send your comments in before the deadline. The Parish Council will also provide comments on the draft Plan.

## **East Hendred Community Centre**

Snells Hall A.G.M was held on April 24th, as advertised in the last Bulletin. The usual (small!) number of attendees heard encouraging reports about the Hall which provides a home for many village organisations, as well as a venue for a host of different events, activities and training courses. The Management Committee appointed to carry on the good work on behalf of the village includes John Sharp (Chairman), Charles Pappenheim (Deputy Chair), Ken Taylor (Hon.Treasurer) Mrs.Lesley Hunter (Minute Secretary) and Mark Beddow. About half of the 14 regular user organisations also are represented at the monthly meetings (First Tuesday each month at 7.45 p.m.).

The refurbished Kitchen will now be installed in the period from 11-24th August. Work on the new polycarbonated ceiling panels and secondary double glazing to the stage windows is well under way and should be completed by the time this Bulletin is published.

The Main Hall's sparkling colour scheme has received much general approval and further painting is planned for the foyer and the ladies' toilets.

Plans are afoot to restore the stage floor, and to improve the associated sound and lighting facilities. These proposals are being driven by the Springline Players, who are to perform 'Cinderella' in January 2009.

The film shows organised by Val Prior are receiving increasing support both from the village and visitors from elsewhere.

We have received expert opinion that unfortunately the beautiful chestnut tree probably has a further life of only 5 years. We are considering the possibility of replanting this area of the Hall grounds with species that will tolerate the waterlogged conditions.

The computers in the I.T. room are beginning to show their age and we are considering whether it is worthwhile perhaps to replace them with new laptops. Your views would be appreciated. Please contact Margaret Sharp or Charles Pappenheim.

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
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



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## **News from St Augustine's and St Mary's**

## **Farming Focus**

a damper on things!

Although the overall rainfall throughout late spring and early summer has been quite high we managed to carry out the bulk of the lambing during a fairly warm, dry spell in early May. When conditions are favourable the whole experience of outdoor lambing becomes much more pleasurable. With minimal losses from hypothermia and young lambs quicky growing during the first vulnerable days because much less energy needs to be devoted to maintaining body temperature.

Fat lamb prices have recovered to good levels after the disastrous lows of last autumn and I am optimistic that this spring's lamb crop will fetch a good price when they are sold in the autumn, what a difference a year makes! At the time of writing we are just about to vaccinate the cattle and sheep against 'bluetongue' which is an added cost and hassle which we have not had before. With the livestock enterprises it seems that whenever things look rosy and positive another horrendous disease appears to put

Things are not looking quite as rosy on the arable front. Since my last report in which I mentioned rapidly rising input costs taking the edge of the high prices we have been hit by steeply rising fuel prices and falling crop prices (apart from Oilseed rape which has been rising as the price of crude oil rises). The short period of euphoria since last harvest is certainly well and truly over and you may start to see whingeing farmers again soon! (Although the long term outlook is still a lot better than the situation pre 2007)

## **Hendred Heritage**

## **Champs Chapel & Heritage Update**

This summer, Champs Chapel museum is turning into quite an art gallery! In addition to the famous *Hendred Feast* oil painting by Professor WFM Sheard (now comprehensively restored and displayed in an environmentally controlled case), we are eagerly anticipating the hanging of two more restored works: one of the chapel itself, done around 1880, and the *Berkshire Wagon*, a 1905 oil painting showing the lower section of Newbury Road. These are part of a nationwide restoration project carried out under the auspices of the National Gallery and the Hendred works are to be included in a special volume of paintings held in the public domain.



Apart from these historic artworks, visitors can browse through our varied collection of photographs, manuscripts and artefacts illustrating the history of the community. We are also proud to present our 2008 exhibition on the life and work of Harry Colt, an internationally renowned golf course designer, who lived at St Amand's House (today the home of Dame Jennifer Jenkins). Other village artists featured in this summer's exhibition include Pauline Morris, Veroni Gilbert and Ann Cousins. Among the beautiful photographs on display are a gallery of village images by Robin Hine, vivid examples of wildlife in the surrounding fields by Ian Chambers, and a picture of the gorgeous *Hendred Blue* miniature iris, bred by Ron Watkins.

Finally, a word of thanks to those who supported the Concert for Five Voices in St Augustine's Church on April 19th, which raised very useful funds for our on-going conservation work. And don't forget the Gardens Open Day on Sunday June 29th. There will be garden tours at Hendred House and many other gardens throughout the village will be showing off their early summer blooms. Make a note in the diary!

Champs Chapel is open every Sunday from 2.30-4.30pm.

It is with great sadness that we record the death of Pauline Stevenson after a long illness, through which John nursed her unstintingly. Pauline often helped with the Museum exhibitions and supported the Hendred Trust through all the work and time that John devoted to it over the years. We miss her. Our sympathy and thoughts are with John and his family.

## From the Village Archives...

Mabel Kearvell (nee Swadling) when she left for New Zealand in 2007 gave to the museum a family heirloom of a large two man cross cut saw (Pit Saw) and recited the family tale that when her grandfather left Skeats Bush there was a midden pit at the bottom of the allotment garden land there and he dumped most of his old tools in it, at that time Skeats Bush was 3 cottages rather than the 2 at present.

The photograph shows William Goddard, stripping bark from timber at Cozen's Farm. A second saw pit was dug in the late 1890s to cope with the additional work providing beams for "Southernwood".

William Swadling's family had been journeymen Sawyers since the 1700s. He was the last to follow that trade.



## **Planning Matters**

The Cottage, Chapel Square: EHE 19314/1. Application for 2 story extension to existing dwelling, a 1 1/2 storey dwelling to land at the rear and a single storey double car port. The Parish Council objected to this application on several grounds, including that the siting of the proposed new dwelling does not conform to the historic pattern of development for this part of the Conservation Area, key features of this part of the Conservation Area would be detrimentally affected by the proposed developments and the new access to them and the proposed new dwelling is adjacent to a grade II listed building (Cobblers Cottage), adversely affecting it. There was also serious concern on the proposed access, as it is on a bend at the junction of Cat Street, a narrow road, with Chapel Square. The application has since been withdrawn.

3 Mill Lane: EHE/20475. Extension to rear; the Parish Council had no objection.

UKAEA Harwell- lay-out of car park: EHE20190/1. The Council had no comments.
