With the current economic crisis more and more families depend on local activities and entertainment. We are fortunate in this village in having good facilities, with many active organisations. However from time to time I hear that one or another organisation has significant problems in finding helpers and people to serve on committees. It is very important that we all recognise that such help is essential for these organisations to continue. Please try and allocate some of your time to support those organisations that are important for you and your family. It is not only a benefit to the organisation but also an opportunity to make new friends.

It is encouraging that recent news on the affordable housing front is positive and we hope that a second site in the village will be developed next year. Current house prices in this village, even with recent reductions, are still much too high for many young families to afford. The housing survey undertaken by the Oxfordshire Rural Community Council earlier this year demonstrated that we have a need for several "affordable" houses in this village, and the Parish

Council will be seeking new sites for further developments.

The Vale District Council is preparing a "Core Strategy" report as part of its development of a Local **Development Framework** document. The Core Strategy will be used to help determine future planning applications. It has identified Milton Park and the Harwell-Rutherford site (both of which are close to this village) as major areas for future growth in employment. The consequent transport requirements are likely to be of concern and it is something that the Parish Council will be taking a close interest in. The

Council will review the Core strategy when it is published and will prepare comments to be sent to the Vale Council. An exhibition on the strategy will take place on several sites in January/February. The one in Wantage will be held on February 12th and we are recommending that as many village people attend this as possible. We should like to hear your feedback before we prepare the Council's response to the Vale's invitation for comments on the Core Strategy.

### **Goodbye to Jimmy Francis**

Jimmy Francis has offered his resignation as a Councillor since he is leaving the village. We should like to thank Jimmy for his work for the Council over many years and wish him and Mavis well in their new house in Didcot. The procedure for replacing Jimmy on the Council will be announced shortly.

### Vale District Council 'Future Development in the Vale'

The first policy document that the Vale Distriuct Council is preparing as part of the Local Development Framework is the Core Strategy. This Framework will replace the Local Plan, and will set out the spatial vision, spatial objectives, policies and a monitoring and implementation framework for the Vale. The Core Strategy will be used to help determine future planning applications.

This document will be out for consultation from Jan 16<sup>th</sup> to Feb 27<sup>th</sup>. There will be a public exhibition at Wantage Civic Hall on Feb 12<sup>th</sup> from 3-7pm, with a workshop from 7-9pm.

It is important that as many people as possible make themselves aware of this core strategy as it will shape future development in the Vale. Several parts of it impact on this village and future planning.

The Parish Council will be reviewing the strategy and making a response next February.

### **Snells Nature Trail**

In the Summer Bulletin the Hendreds Environment Group were pleased to announce that the village had been awarded a grant of over £9000 to create a footpath to link Fordy Lane and the Snells footpath as a safer way for children to go to school. In addition the plan is to create a nature trail linked to the path, as well as developing a community orchard. Progress is continuing on this and the Parish Council is in the process of negotiating a lease with the Hendreds Estate for the land over which the path and nature trail will go. It is hoped work on the site can start early in the New Year.

### **White Road Bus Shelter**

The shelter on the east side was vandalised earlier in the year. The Council is exploring the possibility of obtaining a grant from the County Council to help with the cost of replacing shelter with a more modern one.

### **West Rowstock to join Parish?**

There has been discussion for some time on West Rowstock joining our parish. At present it is part of Milton parish and most of the residents felt that becoming part of East Hendred parish would have benefits, as many of the issues that affect West Rowstock also affect East Hendred (e.g. proximity to the A417 and to the Harwell/Rutherford site.). The actual arrangements are still being finalised but it will not be before the next election in 2011 that residents of West Rowstock can vote for the members of the Parish Council.

### **Changes to the Penney Playpark**

Passing the Penney Playground recently, you may have noticed some changes. In particular, most of the plants in the borders have been removed. This is the result of a decision by the parish council to review the provision in the playground. This was prompted by an annual playground inspection, carried out by an external organization, which indicated some plants were no longer considered suitable for the playground because they had berries on; in addition it was clear that several plants were overgrown. It was concluded that more space for play could be achieved if the area of planting was reduced. Initially, all the plants in one border were removed, as was the log which divided it from the play area. In this space, a new table with benches has been installed to replace the one that had been damaged, and there are plans to add at least one new piece of play equipment for pre-school children. The second step was to remove most of the plants in the front border of the playground, but retain the rose hedge. Again, this has opened up more space than expected, and decisions have to be made about how much of the planting to replace, and whether some of the space could be used differently, for example to provide an area near the gate to park prams/bicycles, and/or to add play equipment. Any changes made must take into account the fact that the playground is in the conservation area. The parish council will be consulting with the pre-school group, and other organizations which use the playground regularly, but comments/ideas from others who visit the playground are welcome. It is hoped to make the changes as soon as possible, but apologies for any inconvenience caused to playground users in the meantime.

Once the route of the new school path through the 'kick about area' adjacent to Penney Playground has been finalized, the parish council will consider the potential for providing more facilities for teenagers in that area.

### **East Hendred Community Centre**

For some time now any heavy rain (i.e. frequently!) has been penetrating the gully between the main hall roof and that over the stage area. This has damaged the ceiling to the right of the proscenium arch and caused localised staining of the newly decorated interior wall. There have been occasional problems also with water coming in via the corresponding gully next to Snells House and spilling down the interior wall beside the clock. These gullies have been repaired recently by Martin Cooper and it is expected that the restoration will eliminate recurrence of these particular problems for the time being.

The increased hall charges mentioned in the Autumn Bulletin were implemented on November 1<sup>st</sup>. Although hiring rates were last increased in April 2007, the hall's operating account has shown an average deficit of about £800 a year for the last two years, which has eaten into our reserves. Moreover, from September 2008 electricity unit charges were increased by 35.5% for standard and 39% for off peak usage. This means that, even assuming a mild winter, the estimated cost of heating and lighting will increase by about £900 during 2008-2009. The revised charges were designed to make up this shortfall but with special preferential rates for regular users, particularly those involving children or young people. To put the matter into context, we now need to have an average income of about £35 every day of the year to meet our anticipated regular expenditure. It is clear that the facilities provided by Snells Hall here are of vital importance to the community and must not be allowed to diminish. We believe that Snells Hall hiring rates remain very competitive despite the increases.

### **East Hendred Housing matters...**

Over recent years, property prices in rural Oxfordshire have spiraled out of the reach of the majority, notably affecting those trying to get a foot on the property ladder. Many local people are priced out of the housing market, and many people who work locally, and whose families have formed part of Oxfordshire's rural communities for generations are forced to move in to towns and cities further away. If villages are to be living, thriving places we need to make sure that the people who provide services and do local jobs can afford to buy homes where they grew up. Our villages will be mothballed if only retired people or second home owners can afford to buy houses there.

The most recent statistics show that the average price of a semi-detached house in East Hendred is over £310,000. The average for England and Wales at the same time was £192,790. East Hendred prices are more than 60% higher than the national average! To buy a property at this price you would be required to pay a minimum of a 10% deposit of over £30,000 and you would need a household income of about £55,000 per annum, if you can get a mortgage at all. This is way beyond the reach of many first time buyers, single people and couples/ families on low or moderate incomes.

Following the Housing Needs Survey in February 2008, the Parish Council, District Council, Sovereign Housing Group and the Rural Housing Enabler have been working hard to find a site for a small development of Affordable Housing to address the local need identified by the survey. It is expected that the derelict garage court in the corner of Coulings Close will be redeveloped to provide three new affordable homes. Although this garage site is not classed as an 'exception site', Sovereign Housing Group and the Vale of White Horse District Council have agreed that preference will be given to applicants, on the District Council's Housing Register, who have a Local Connection to East Hendred parish. All three homes will be for rent, not shared-ownership.

Plans will be available to comment on in the New Year. The Parish Council will let you know where you can view them.

### **Extra Care**

The Parish Council had a presentation at the October meeting from Nick Welsh and Nigel Holmes from the Oxfordshire County Council. One of the actions from the Parish Plan was to "support the building of sheltered housing accommodation". Extra Housing Care ensures 24/7 care including Personal care. There is also the provision available to include commercial kitchens (producing at least one main meal a day), community areas encouraging social meeting, eating etc. as well as rooms (units) adapted for the individual resident's needs. However these units tend to serve larger populations than East Hendred so any scheme would need to cover several local villages. The availability of a suitable site is also an issue. The Council has since been in touch with the Vale Housing Association to explore possible next steps.

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### **Message From District Councellor Mike Murray**

What an eventful year! The Vale Council has been particularly busy in 2008 on a range of unusual and in some cases highly controversial matters.

Infrastructure projects: two major projects have been considered by the Vale this year, namely the reservoir at Steventon and the Incinerator at Sutton Courtney. In neither case is the Vale the decision-making authority (being the Secretary of State and the County Council respectively) and both have excited huge interest locally from people concerned as to the likely or possible Environmental Impacts of the schemes. The Vale expressed grave reservations on both matters, and we await the outcome with interest.

Major developments at Milton Park: works have been carried out to the roundabout junction at Didcot, prior to constructing their new office/ ab blocks, which has caused some disruption, but will hopefully improve the junction. Secondly the proposed "eco-town" at Weston on the Green seems to have sailed into choppy waters- whilst this is well outside the Vale area there is real worry about how such a large development would affect the already heavily congested A34.

Rubbish collection: next year will probably see the announcement of the detail of our new rubbish collection regime- it is likely to be weekly food waste, with fortnightly (sorry, alternate weekly we are supposed to call it) collections for black bags. Green boxes and brown bins will probably continue as now.

Council matters: we now have a joint chief executive with South Oxfordshire District Council, and will soon be sharing more senior officers. This will hopefully save money, without reducing service quality, and if it does then we will all be pleased. We certainly need savings to cover the some £900,000 of your and my money lost in the Icelandic Banking black hole.

East Hendred conservation area: I was delighted to be able to support in a very modest way the parish's efforts in securing the re-adoption of the conservation area and also with regard to some recent development control items in the village where defence of the conservation area was a critical point. Next year sees the consultation phase for the section of the new local plan (Local Development Framework) dealing with housing allocations which I am sure will be read with interest by all.

These are held on the second Saturday of the month at 9am in Steventon village hall, but if there is demand I will happily alternate with an East Hendred Venue.

### **Thames Water Resources Management Plan**

The consultation has now closed. All comments have been sent to the Department of Food and Rural Affairs (Defra)

The public consultation generated a high level of interest, with over 300 responses received, many of those from residents in Oxfordshire. Thank you to those of you who responded. We will publish a Statement of Response to all representations made during the consultation in line with Defra timescales. The Statement of Response will be made available to all those who participated in the consultation. The Statement, together with the comments submitted, will be considered by the Secretary of State for Defra. He will decide whether to call for an inquiry or hearing on the draft Plan, or issue directions requiring changes to be made to the draft Plan before final publication.

We launched the Stage 2 consultation on the proposed reservoir in January 2007. This focused on the views of local people regarding landscape, conservation, recreation and design proposals. While the need for the reservoir is still being considered as part of the statutory draft Water Resources Management Plan, we want to respond to the outstanding issues relating to design, conservation and recreation. We are taking the opportunity to publish the report now so you can see how your comments have directly influenced the design, conservation and recreation aspects of the scheme. There has already been some delay to publishing this report because of the draft Plan process and it is important to note that Stage 2 work does not override the draft Plan process in any way.

### **Message from Ed Vaisey**

I have recently returned from a trip to Beijing. The good news is that the trip did not cost you, the British taxpayer, a penny. The bad news is that it was led by John Prescott. (Actually, that's a cheap shot, I quite like John Prescott and he is a lot more on the ball than his public image suggests.) You may wonder why my visit to Beijing is relevant to the Hendreds. Well, as everyone knows, China is the world's fastest growing economy, and overtook us a few years ago. Most of the world's electronic goods- photocopiers, mobile phones and so on- are made there. It also supplies the highest number of illegal immigrants to this country, as well as the largest number of overseas students. So China has a huge impact on us, directly and indirectly. The value of a trip like this is that you get to dispel a few myths. China is a closed society, and a one-party state. But there is certainly a great deal of freedom apparent in people's daily lives, and a certain level of free discussion about the future direction of the country. Also, China has the largest number of internet users in the world, so censorship is becoming more difficult. China is also taking the environment much more seriously than we might think, and is very conscious that it is in her own self-interest to tackle carbon emissions.

My four days in Beijing also gave me the chance to visit the British paralympic team, and bask in some of their reflected glory, especially as we were briefly top of the table when I was there!

I have had a busy start to the new parliamentary term. Despite the credit crunch- more of which later- there have been a number of debates on issues that fall within my portfolio. The very first session in Parliament was culture questions, and I raised the issue of world heritage sites. We have 27 in this country, and amazingly 7 are threatened with blacklisting by the international cultural organisation, UNESCO, including Westminster itself. Westminster and the Tower of London are at risk from a series of tall buildings that are planned for London, which would wreck London's historic skyline. I am pushing the Government to turn down these applications and have a proper policy in place to protect world heritage sites.

We also debated digital switchover recently. This is a huge scheme to covert all our television signals to digital, so that by 2012 you will have to have a digital television or a freeview box to watch telly. The scheme won't be coming to our part of the world for a while, but it is important to get it right as it is already underway. Finally we had a debate on the BBC licence fee. Every so often, an MP suggests it should be abolished, and this provides an opportunity to debate the whole BBC and have fun at its expense. As far as I am concerned, we need the BBC now more than ever, and provided the licence fee is kept at affordable levels, and the BBC does not overextend its remit, there is no reason why the BBC cannot continue in its present form.

Affordable is a word that is important these days. We are in the middle of the credit crunch, and a looming recession. I have already had constituents contact me concerning their savings in Icelandic banks, and am doing all I can to help. Our part of the world has a concentration of small hi-tech businesses, and I hope that their specialist nature means that they will be able to see through the recession as well as possible. ## Hendreds Environment Group- saving energy at home Part 1: Cavity Wall Insulation

Although aware of global warming, as two oldies we reckoned our contribution to this, in terms of our carbon footprint, was relatively small. In order to check this out, we decided to fill in a questionnaire to assess our energy use at home, which was then sent for analysis to the Thames Valley Energy Centre. It sent us a report which gave an assessment of the efficiency of our energy use (basically we could do better), and suggested how it could be improved. The most important recommendation was to have our cavity walls insulated. As energy prices were rising, we decided to investigate this and contacted TVEC. For households with a member aged over 70 years old, cavity insulation is free- we decided to go ahead, and arrangements were made for the work to take place a few weeks later. Putting in the insulation was done very efficiently by two young men in about half a day. A 25 year guarantee was provided. What impact this will have on our energy use and bills will be tested out this winter.

We are now wondering whether to replace our aged gas boiler with a combination boiler, and possibly install solar panels to heat our water. Any information from others about the pros and cons of these measures would be welcome. If you would like to find out about your energy use at home, a questionnaire can be obtained from Sarah James.

### **The Heart of Hendreds Project**

As National Apple Day is celebrated on October 21<sup>st</sup> every year, we chose the closest Saturday, the 18<sup>th</sup>, for our next workday at Abbey Manor Orchard. The first job was to coral the three pigs into a corner before the rest of the volunteers arrived. They had spent the previous six months digging through the undergrowth, eating nettle and bramble roots and generally clearing the way. Now it was up to the human members of Hendreds Environment Group to finish the job.

Sian Mitchell, chain saw in hand, felled the invasive elder trees that were threatening to shade out the apples. Sian has the required licence and equipment as well as the know-how after years of volunteering for the local Wildlife Trusts. Once the trees were safely on the ground the team moved in to haul the branches out of the orchard and pile up for a future bonfire. The larger logs were piled up in one corner to slowly rot down and create a habitat for insects. Sian also began the major pruning job on the apple trees by removing some dead wood. The remainder of the work will be carried out by hand over the winter. A reptile habitat was created by a hardworking father and son team who piled up all the rubble that the pigs had unearthed. This will hopefully be an inviting spot for lizards to hide, and when the weather warms up, to bask in summer sunshine. Other volunteers selected the best trees to hang up a selection of bird and bat boxes bought from the Wildlife Trust with funds donated by the local Boneshaker Duathlon Race.



Everyone's hard work was rewarded by a feast of apple cake and apple strudel made from cooking apples from the orchard. That was washed down with Hendred Press Apple Juice pressed the day before out of dessert apples from Plough Farm Orchard.

We have now ordered six more apple trees, all Oxfordshire and Berkshire varieties, to fill the spaces we have cleared. These will be planted in late winter before the ground is sown with grass and wild flower seed in the spring.



And what of the pigs? They are now transformed into joints of pork awaiting a garnish of home made apple sauce. The hams and bacon have been cured in apple juice and cider and are now smoking over orchard apple wood in the chimney of the Old Post Office. This was the village butcher's shop at one time and still has the original smoking bay above the inglenook fireplace.

We are planning a January work day to shake off some of the Christmas excesses and there might even be a bacon sandwich on offer as a reward!

# Hendreds Environment Group- saving energy at home Part 2: Installing solar water heating

We have recently had solar water heating installed- in light of the recent price increases in gas, Pauline's wish for a new kitchen was sacrificed for a pile of tubes on the roof. The installation was straightforward- the tubes are on a large framework, and are bolted through the roof. The pipe-work from the tubes came as a big flexible coil, which screwed in at each end. There were quite a few modifications in the airing cupboard- we needed a new tank and there are some snazzy temp in/out dials. There is even a solar powered pump- so I get hot water even in a power cut!

The guys doing the work were excellent, very professional and helpful- and I'm happy to pass on their details to anyone interested. You are also welcome to have a look at our installation. So the outcome? I have been amazed at the temperature of the incoming pipe work- around 55C on a sunny winters day- all helping to heat up my water for free. Our next project is the new kitchen...

Our Rector, Rita Ball, has just celebrated the 10<sup>th</sup> anniversary of her ordination as a priest. We were joined by parishioners from all four churches in the benefice for a service at St Augustine's on Advent Sunday, November 30<sup>th</sup>, and a party in Snells Hall. However, the celebrations were tinged with sadness as we now know that Rita will be leaving us in February to take up a new post based in Hermitage, where she will lead a team of three clergy caring for seven churches serving 10,000 people. We are very sorry to see Rita go after only five years in our parish, but wish her the very best in this challenging new position. This means that from February we will not have a Rector resident in the village, and we do not yet know when a new Rector will be appointed. However, St Augustine's will continue to serve East Hendred throughout the interregnum. Our Churchwardens Jackie Francis and Trevor Bacon, and our clergy Antonia Cretney, Jean Page, Sister Patricia Ann and Ron Foster, will work together to provide a

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### **Farming Focus**

It feels like a lot of water has gone under the bridge since the last article (literally!) The start of harvest in mid July was relatively straight forward and we managed to harvest very good yields of Oilseed Rape and Barley in fairly benign weather conditions. From then on we entered a period of horrendous weather which continued all through the summer and most of the autumn and which turned the bulk of the harvest and autumn drilling into a expensive, difficult slog.

A large portion of the wheat harvest was cut at moisture contents of 20% and above which then had to be dried down to below 15% moisture for sale. This necessitated burning large quantities of diesel in our grain dryer (during the peak harvest period were were burning up to £2000 a day of diesel through the dryer and harvesting machines!) During harvest the collapse of commodity prices gathered pace and wheat that could have been sold forward for £160/tonne in early spring was worth less than £90/tonne by early autumn.

Luckily we were saved by the most fantastic yields that we have ever seen which came somewhat as a surprise after the dismal weather during the growing season. It is often hard to fathom out why some seasons are higher yielding than others but with the benefit of hindsight I think that the cold damp conditions at the end of the crops life caused a delay in senescence. (Every extra day of functioning green leaf area pre-senescence has a large positive effect on total dry matter yield)

The autumn drilling period can be summed up with one word; SLUGS! Never have we seen so many of the slimy monsters trying to gobble up our newly emerging crops. Sam has been busy on the ATV slug pelleting the worst fields and hopefully now that colder weather has arrived they will move deeper into the soil where they cannot do any damage

Gaining Accreditation was a huge undertaking, by our Trustees, Committee and Volunteers, and we were therefore overjoyed to be successful, even more so as we are one among a very small group. We were therefore keen that momentum wasn't lost and the Museum moved forward, taking with it the knowledge and experiences that we gained along this arduous route. With this in mind the Trustees have decided to recruit the help of a Museum and Heritage Consultant to assist us to develop a Strategic Plan for the future with a clear Action Plan to ensure we deliver on all the changes required. We met with Hilary McGowan (www.hilarymcgowan.co.uk) who will assist us and we have been fortunate to receive full funding from MDO. Hilary is going to run a series of workshops for Trustees and Friends of the Museum and so more people we can encourage to attend, the greater the benefit from the process.
