New Fishing Licence Procedure

All types of fishing licences will continue to be sold through the Post Office. For 1 day and 8 day Rod Fishing Licences the receipt issued by the Post Office will be the Rod Fishing Licence, which you will need to carry with you when fishing. A receipt will also be issued at the time of purchase for a Yearly Rod Fishing Licence, this can be used in the same way as the licence, until you receive the proper Rod Fishing licence directly from the Environment Agency through the post. To make sure the name and address are entered correctly onto a licence it would be helpful if you could provide something with the angler's name and address printed on it.

Pay Station

A Post Office Pay Station is now available, which allows top-ups to electricity keys, Quantum gas cards and mobile phones.

A cash point for most banks is also available at the Post Office during normal open hours.



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Parish Council News



2026 seems a long way away but as can be seen from other articles in this Bulletin the Vale District Council is already seeking views on its forward plans for the local area as far ahead as this date. These plans include significant new housing developments at Grove, Wantage and Didcot and many new jobs at both Milton Park and the Harwell Science and Innovation Centre. In many ways these developments close to this village are good news, such as more demand for local housing (and higher prices!).

However we need to take account of the likely shortcomings such as considerably increased traffic and ever more difficulties in getting out of the village onto the A417. An increased need for affordable housing is also a requirement. The Council took the initiative to set up a meeting for villagers to explain the plans and seek views from those attending. The Council has now put together a response to the Vale Council taking account of these points and we will continue to monitor the proposals as they develop further.

Several of us attended the first birthday party for "East Hendred Entertains" in

Snells Hall. The award of grants to several deserving village organisations was very welcome (see separate piece in this Bulletin) and I had the opportunity to congratulate the organisers on a very successful year, both in raising funds and in contributing to village life through the film shows, the scarecrow competition and the weekly Thrift Shop social sessions in the "Tin Hut". Long may it continue and we appreciate the hard work by a limited number of key people that goes into organising the activities and events. (Since drafting this piece we have heard of the sudden death of Barbara Riley, one of the leading members of the Hendred Entertains team. We are

very sorry and send our sympathies to her family for their unexpected loss).

Since the last Bulletin we are pleased that a new couple has taken over the running of the village shop. We welcome Martin and Louise Johnson to the village and hope they enjoy becoming part of East Hendred. We also offer our best wishes and thanks to John and Sue Dunkerlev for their hard work in running the shop so successfully and for the introduction of wine tasting sessions in Snells Hall. We wish them all the best for their new life in France.

Allotments

Now the weather is warming up there will be much activity at the allotments. Since 1894 there have been allotments on land called Bowling Alley. There are 28 allotments on a site of just over I acre, the majority are 5 poles (half an allotment). The rent is due on the 29th of September (Michaelmas Day), the day on which agricultural rents have traditionally been paid. Unfortunately at present all the allotments are taken. Should you wish to be put on the waiting list please contact Susan Townley. We are still having a problem with dog fouling on the grass verges on the North and South along the footpaths. Would dog owners please clean up after their pets when exercising them along these footpaths.

Penney Playpark

Recently, the former flowerbeds in the play park were cleared of plants and covered with membrane and bark. Initially, it was planned to replant the flowerbeds. However, the extent of the space now available presents an opportunity to provide a more interesting play environment. The Parish Council has decided to seek external funding not only to upgrade the play park, but also make changes to the adjacent kick-about area now that the route of the school path through it has been defined. There are several grant -giving organisations that can be approached for funding, but most require the application to be supported by evidence that there has been consultation with representatives of those who use the playground (children and young people, and their parents and carers). Parish Councillors have set up a working group to do this, by contacting children and parents, through village organisations, such as schools and children's and youth groups. The deadline for the first application is 23rd March, so any contributions have to be with the Parish Council by 15th March. Thank you in advance to all those who give their ideas and views. Given the time and effort available, it will not be possible to consult with everybody who uses the playground. If you have not been asked for your views by March 15th, but have constructive ideas or comments about the play park you would like to contribute, please contact Val Bacon (833403) before the 19th March .

Village Design Statement

Two meeting have now been held with four Parish Councillors and Bogdan Nedelkoff to develop a Village Design Statement (VDS), which will be supplementary to the published Parish Plan. A VDS provides useful guidance on the special features of the village which can be used to comment on new planning applications and help to maintain these features in future years. Typical sections in a VDS include: history and settlement pattern, village setting, landmarks and special features, open spaces, characteristics of buildings and their details, and proposed guidance. Villagers who wish to contribute are welcome to do so and should contact John Sharp (J.V.Sharp@btinternet.com).

Vale District Council Core Strategy

The District Council is preparing its Local Development Framework which will replace the Local Plan (due to finish in 2011) and guide development in the Vale to 2026. It is important in that future planning applications will be determined in accordance with it. The Local Development Framework consists of a Core Strategy, a Managing Development document, together with supplementary planning documents and a document on Sustainable Community Strategy "Working together for a better Vale", prepared by the Vale Partnership. The Core Strategy will establish a clear approach for locating new developments and sets out the broad locations for land use, including the identification of major sites for development. A Consultation Document has recently been issued, with a deadline for comments of Feb 27th. Three Councillors went to the meeting for local councillors held in Wantage on 22nd January. In view of its importance to this village a special meeting was held in Snells Hall on Feb 8th to explain the detailed plans for growth in both housing and employment close to East Hendred. Comments were invited from those attending this meeting and these together with comments from Councillors have been collated and sent into the Vale District Council.

The essential features of the draft core strategy are:

- New developments will be mainly in towns in the Vale, because of their better services than those available in
 rural areas. These sites are more easily accessed by cycling, walking and public transport, reducing the need to
 travel by car.
- Land is still needed to be allocated for 4470 homes over the period.
- The proposal is that: 2,300 homes are built west of Didcot, 250 homes are built on the edge of Wantage & Grove, 420 homes are built on the south of Park Road at Faringdon and 1,500 homes are built either south west of Abingdon or north east of Wantage.
- New businesses will be promoted within Milton Park and the Harwell Science and Innovation Centre, with up to 12,000 new jobs to be created on these sites.
- Limited development will be allowed in rural areas, mainly the larger villages of which East Hendred is one.
- Regarding the transport proposals; these are: to improve cycling, walking and public transport; a separate study called SCOTS (Southern Central Oxfordshire Transport Study has identified the need for new roads, which include: NE of Wantage, West of Didcot, Bypass around Rowstock and possible upgrade of Featherbed Lane, with a new round-about on the A417.
- In rural areas individual schemes of up to 15 houses will be possible in the 20 larger villages (East Hendred being one of them). These villages have a better range of services and facilities.
- Affordable homes; 40% of each development will be allocated for new affordable homes in schemes of at least 5 houses.
- Specialist accommodation for the elderly within the larger villages will be promoted.

It can be seen that the proposed strategy has significant implications for this village, which is the reason that the Parish Council set up a special meeting on Feb.8th to present the proposals to the village. The Council's comments (together with those from villagers attending the meeting) on the draft core strategy are as follows:

- The Council supports that new developments should be mainly in the towns.
- The availability of individual schemes of up to 15 houses for this village is considered sufficient, with 40% of housing on sites (with more than 5 houses) being affordable. The Council has a strong preference for affordable housing, given the high property prices in the village. The requirement for schemes of 5 houses or more to have 40% of affordable houses is seen as a step in the direction of achieving more affordable housing in the village, but it is expected that use will have to made of exception sites to achieve significant progress in this target.
- The Council strongly supports the proposed development of housing for the elderly in the larger villages, such as East Hendred. We see this as very important given the increasing number of elderly people; this development would enable the elderly to continue living in the same community where they have built up support from neighbours and relatives.
- The Council accepts that new jobs will mainly be at Milton Park and at the Harwell Science and Innovation Centre.

The main effects on this village are likely to be due to increased transport problems, with a much higher density of traffic on the A417, with many more people travelling from Wantage/Grove to their employment at Milton Park or the Harwell Science and Innovation.

New Councillor

Following Jimmy Francis's resignation a notice was placed in the village notice Board advising of the procedure for replacing him. As a result of there being no call for an election the Council has been able to propose a replacement Councillor at its last meeting. Tony Ford has been selected; Tony was a Councillor until the last election and narrowly missed being elected then. We welcome him back to the Council.

Message From District Councillor Mike Murray

A very short contribution this time to update on various Vale-related matters.

The merger of senior officer posts with South Oxfordshire District Council has now happened (we now share a chief executive for example) and it is hoped that this merger of services will bring about long term cost savings to both Councils, and greater efficiencies. It is too early to tell how successful the initiative is, and there will undoubtedly be some teething troubles, however so far so good. A new budget has just been produced by the Council, and unfortunately due to the economic downturn, and the resultant drop in fee income from planning applications etc there have had to be some job cuts. These are on top of the planned staff reductions brought about by the merger of senior posts with SODC. The new contract for rubbish collection has now been agreed, which will start in Oct 2010. SODC are on the same contract but they will get the new arrangements in June next year, so we will be able to let them sort out any problems that emerge first! It looks like we will get wheelie bins with microchips installed; (Brown?) for garden, cardboard etc (Green?) for plastics, metal glass etc and a smaller (Black?) for normal bin bags all collected fortnightly. Once a week there will be a collection for a (25?) litre food waste caddy. This is all supposed to encourage us to recycle more and throw away less, and hopefully it will. A reminder if you, or someone you know, is infirm, it is possible to arrange for the Vale's waste contractor to collect from the back door rather than the kerb. The process is to ring the council (01235 520202) and arrange for a Technical Officer to come and visit to see where bins can be collected from etc, and "assess need". There is also a clinical waste collection service if you need that- same procedure to be followed.

The Local Development Framework Core Strategy Preferred Options Paper (it used to be just called the Local Plan) has now been published. This sets out where and what development will happen in the Vale in the period from now until 2026. It is available to view on the website www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk or at the council offices. There have also been a series of public exhibitions. The Plan sets out a lot of potential infrastructure works (Drayton slips to A34 for example) but most contentiously identifies areas for new housing to be built. These include 2300 homes west of Didcot which is well known, together with 250 at Grove, but in addition 1500 homes either south west of Abingdon or north east of Wantage. These housing numbers have been dictated to us by the Government through the South East Plan, although if Cameron gets in next time his planning chap says that all the regional plan housing numbers will be looked at again... for the Hendreds the most serious potential impact is the possible increase in traffic on the A417.

East Hendred Community Centre

Our thanks to East Hendred Entertains for generously awarding a grant which will enable us to go ahead with redecorating the Committee Room, probably during March.

The Cupola has been removed and now is being restored by Michael Jacques at Forge Ahead Ironworks. This will involve some repairs and then recladding it with copper sheeting which will stand out as a feature when the Cupola is returned to its position on the roof we believe it has held since about 1860.

We are continuing our efforts to improve the energy use efficiency of the Hall. As part of this effort we have recently converted the uplighters from using 200 watt halogen lamps to 18 watt low energy ones. For the eleven uplighters in the Main Hall this will produce a saving of about 30 pence per hour! However, our use of electric heating generally is very costly and the bill for December to March this year is expected to be about £1500, i.e. an average of about £17 each day. One problem still is the cold air entering the Main Hall via the Stage. We are proposing to insulate the Stage ceiling and to close off the openings at each gable end to try to reduce this effect. We would also ask users not to leave the entrance door wide open and if you have to cancel a meeting, please let the Warden know so that heating is not left on unnecessarily.

Thames Water's proposed reservoir

A re-scheduled Local panel meeting to hear Thames Water's response to the Environment Agency's questions is to be held at Steventon Village Hall (large hall) on Tuesday 17th March 2009, 7.00 p.m.

Remember Thames Water's draft Water Resources Management Plan from last May? The consultation ended in August. The Environment Agency (EA), as statutory consultees to DEFRA, published their initial responses last September which included attending a meeting of the Local Panel of residents. Subsequently, DEFRA agreed a date for publication of Thames Water's responses to the EA's questions of 4th February 2009. Thames Water (TW) have delayed this now until 27th February (last possible date). The details should appear on TW's website on that date.

This re-scheduled meeting (originally planned for 18th February) will be an opportunity for local people (rather than those invited by Thames Water) to hear TW speakers giving their update on the situation.

This is a public meeting and questions from the floor will be welcome.

Bus Shelter

The bus shelter on the east side of White Road was vandalised last year. Because the shelter is somewhat corroded and worn, the Parish Council decided to replace it entirely, rather than repairing it. Replacement also gives us the opportunity to improve wheelchair access to the shelter. In a very welcome contribution to the community, East Hendred Entertains has provided a grant of £600 towards the new shelter! The new model, which will match the shelter on the west side of White Road, is due to be installed in April.

Transport Issues

The Parish Transport Representative, Susan Townley, carries out periodic checks on the buses and asks regular users about the service. It appears that everything is running well, but if anyone has any issues please contact her. Work will start in July/August on the forecourt of Didcot Parkway station; once the work is completed in 2010 it will make a huge difference to all users.

Springline productions- Cinderella!

Springline Amateur Dramatic Society staged their second production at Snell Hall of Cinderella in January 2009. The traditional fairytale was performed to sell out audiences over four night in January, receiving rave reviews including: "Frankly, it's brill", "What a sensation- I nearly fell off my chair laughing", "I've been to the Oxford panto and it is not a patch on yours" and "Where do I get tickets for next year?!"

Tickets went on sale on the 6th December at the Xmas Bazaar and a few hours later, Friday and Saturday nights were sold out. News quickly spread around the village and within a few weeks of the New Year the rest of the seats had been booked. The audiences were not disappointed with a Transformation Scene that left you spell bound and the "piece d' resistance" came at the end of the final performance with the cast, crew and the whole audience on their feet singing and dancing to the Time Warp.

Rehearsal had started in early September and with a more complicated script, sophisticated sets, costumes, props and special effects the players and supporting team had increased to over 70 villagers putting in 19 weeks of hard work. Hunter, Marshall, the Oxford-based Chartered Accountants, continued their sponsorship and was supported again by local business and organisation including St Amand's school and Snells Hall for rehearsals and Hendred Stores, Q Gardens and Ardington Stores all kindly agreeing to sell tickets. Oxford Spires Scaffolding rigged the poles for the lighting and the Eyston Arms provided their piano for the main event.

Thanks to the success of the show, Springline has been able to raise £8,000 which will be donated to Snells Hall to install a new public address system with internal communication to the hall and ancillary rooms. As thanks for St Amand's school's help in providing rehearsal space for the sell-out 2009 production of Cinderella, Springline Productions donated £100 to the school in February. The cheque was gratefully received by headmaster John Laverty who said, "This has come at just the right time. One of our teachers, Mrs Anne North, is going to Uganda at Easter to help train teachers there. This cheque will fund ten per cent of the funds Mrs North needs to complete her mission." No doubt the pupils at St Amand's will benefit from hearing about Mrs North's trip and learn about the positive reward of sharing. During the first week of March, the children ran stalls during break and after school selling delicious smoothies and biscuits to further boost Mrs North's Uganda fund. Fingers crossed, additional funds of £13,000 are being raised to repair and upgrade the stage and curtain system at Snells Hall.

Specifically the gifts made in Church went to the Reserve at Otmoor just outside Oxford for

improving a waterfowl habitat. So where do the Owls come in? Many village residents will know of being called Hendred Owls by other local villages and the Hendred's School uses an Owl for their school badge. Gone are the days of the massive Elm trees that were so prolific here in the village even though some have been replaced by other trees they are yet to reach the hundreds of years of age that our elms were. For 25 years Pauline had been Administrator for the boat club at Thrupp where we kept a narrow boat just on the edge of a copse. It is there that the club, knowing of her Owl interest, has erected a box at the top of a telegraph pole with a suitable plaque commemorating her service to the Club. Eagerly we all now wait to see if Owls take up residence before the squirrels!

Message from Ed Vaizey

I had a useful up-date with the chief constable from Thames Valley Police, Sara Thornton, on the issues our local Police force. Let me begin by saying that we live in one of the safest areas of the country, with a very low crime rate. While there are always problems, such as occasional hot-spots of anti-social behaviour, and the occasional wrongful arrest (an 85 year old nicked for chopping down a tree in his garden springs to mind!), I have few complaints and a lot of praise for the hard work our officers do.

The biggest problem we face is our proximity to London. Because of London weighting, Police officers in London get paid £4500 more than Police Officers in Oxfordshire. And if you live in Oxfordshire but work in London, you get free travel. So it is not surprising that many officers who train and get experience here end up working in London. Across the Thames Valley, we lost 79 officers to the Met in 2008, and we have the second highest proportion of young officers in the country. Thames Valley MPs are now going to lobby the Government to reduce the differential in pay between London and the Thames Valley, as well as asking for a protocol to be put in place to limit the number of officers that can be poached. Overall, Thames Valley Police is still understaffed. On a like-for-like basis, comparing us to similar counties, we are down some 436 police officers, 100 community support officers and 350 specials. I am delighted that the force is planning to recruit more specials, and we should be up to 400 by the end of the year.

Population growth is also a factor. While all new development is on hold because of the credit crunch, housing expansion puts a huge strain on resources. Because of the way the funding formula works, we are unlikely to get the necessary increase in police numbers to match housing growth. Bizarrely, because of the huge geographic spread of Thames Valley, our policing resources are affected by the growth of towns like Milton Keynes. I am trying to get the Government to change the formula.

At the beginning of every parliamentary session a ballot is held in the House of Commons. MPs that win the ballot are given the opportunity to propose a piece of legislation of their own, known as a Private Member's Bill. These Bills are then debated on one of 13 special Fridays that are set aside specifically for this purpose.

However, making one of these Bills an actual law is far from easy. For these Bills to get through the Westminster process, they must bear a pummelling far worse than the usual scrutiny to which Government business is subject. These Bills, for example, are not whipped, so MPs are actually free to voice their own opinion. There is no in-built Government majority to se them through. At least 100 MPs have to back the Bill. Also, Westminster on Fridays is like a ghost town, as MPs usually go to their constituencies. Only the armed policemen and chiming of Big Ben interrupts the eerie silence. But despite all this every session about one of these Bills does gain the support needed to make it through.

This time I'm hoping it will be the Autism Bill. On Friday the 27th February one of the ballot winners, Cheryl Gillan MP, will bring forward a Bill originally brought forward last year by Angela Browning, when it did indeed fail. The two of them have been working non-stop with the National Autistic Society to make a useful piece of legislation and the first ever one about autism. The bill aims to 'recognise the numbers of people with autism, to provide effective transition from child to adult services, and to ensure appropriate support and services thereafter' and I have been answering a torrent of emails from the good people of this constituency asking me to support it. The provisions for integration of child and adult services is the most important part of this bill because all the evidence tells us that autistic children need routine and familiarity, so such a substantial change of people and routine can often cause massive setbacks in the progress of a child into adult-hood. The bill also aims to strengthen information about autism cases in local areas. Though this doesn't seem like an important step it will bring the whole problem to the surface meaning governments (local and national) will know the numbers and needs of those with this condition and be forced to take action. More than 4 in 5 local councils say that such information would help them with long term planning.

So, on the 27th I shall be doing my best to be in the House to support it before I race back to Didcot for my evening surgery.

The Heart of Hendreds Project: HOHP

On January 31st a group of over twenty volunteers gathered at the Penney Playpark to start the work of clearing the way for the new footpath through to Fordy Lane. Sian Mitchell had already removed a few of the overhanging branches and chopped them into logs. These were carefully stacked into a log pile and covered with brash to provide a habitat for wildlife. Charles Pappenheim wielded a brush cutter and, with the help of Bruno's shredder, the vicious brambles were reduced to a small pile of chippings. Rubbish was collected and disposed of and an intrepid James Nicoll climbed a ladder to install two bat boxes and three bird boxes high up in the trees. Undergrowth was raked away to reveal swathes of snow drops and wild garlic. We even spotted the leaves of wood anemones at the foot of a tree. A well earned break with tea and cake in Snells Hall ended the afternoon, and just two days later the whole area was shrouded in snow. Now we are waiting for visits from three contractors who will be quoting for the construction of the timber boardwalk. Work should begin in the spring with a view to having the whole project completed in time for children returning to school in September.

Cycling- A happy green thing to do!



I love commuting. Sometimes work is a bit dull, or not dull enough. But my commute always gives me real pleasure in my day. This is because I cycle to work.

As in many jobs, I sit still a lot at work, so my bike ride gets me exercising in the fresh air. And because it's how I get there, I just do it. I don't think 'I'm too busy for that' or 'I don't feel very energetic today'. I just go, same as I would if I was driving. East Hendred is lucky to be just a few hundred metres from route 44 of the National Cycle Network which goes between Didcot and Wantage on traffic free ways and quiet back roads.

Of course your bike ride doesn't have to be your commute. Any necessary journey within your cycle range could be giving you fresh air, exercise and enjoyment. On my way to work, I pass a Post Office, shop, bank, hairdressers and dentists. They are all on Curie Avenue at Harwell Campus, about two miles from East

Hendred via the National Cycle Network. If you normally travel by road, you may not realise how close these facilities are to the village. They're quite a bit further by road. Carrying on east past Harwell Campus, route 44 takes you into Didcot via a disused railway line from Upton. Going the other way route 44 uses the private farm track to Ginge and then follows the road to Lockinge, with a traffic free link through to Lark Hill in Wantage. These are lovely rides for their own sake, and quiet enough for family riding.

Hendreds Twinning Group Visit to France, July 3rd-6th

Our plans are to leave East Hendred (Plough) early evening on Friday July 3rd and then travel on an overnight ferry to arrive in Caen very early on Saturday morning. The programme from arrival has been arranged by Sarcaux, it includes a formal meal in the evening. Sunday is a more relaxed day, with a planned visit to a Medieval Street Fair at Bayeaux, followed by host family hospitality. On Monday 6th we plan to leave Sarceaux after breakfast, returning to East Hendred in the late evening.

The costs are £100 per adult, free for an accompanied school age child (up to ten places avaiilable) and cabin berths as requested. (2 berth inside cabin £52, 2 berth outside £62, 4 berth inside cabin £73, 4 berth porthole cabin £83; 2 lower berths used only in a 4 berth cabin, £63 or £73.)

Annual General Meeting

Monday April 6th, 7.30pm, Snells Hall Gallery.

Nominations are urgently needed for several vacancies on the committee for the year 2009 –2010, since several longstanding members are either taking a lower profile or standing down because of other commitments. Here is an opportunity to become more involved in developing our twinning activities, particularly as we are currently building up our links between local schools and those in Sarceaux.

Farming Focus

Apart from finishing off our winter wheat planting during the frosty weather early in the New Year, the last few months have been spent on machinery maintenance and groundwork preparation for a new grain store/general purpose building that we are erecting at Top Buildings. At present all of our crops are delivered to the grain store at Top Buildings where they are dried and cleaned before being put into the stores. Unfortunately we cannot fit all of our crops in the Top Building stores so up to 1000t has to be double handled each year after drying and taken to a store at Aldfield Farm. The new building will allow us to store all or our crops at Top Buildings as well as giving us more overall covered space which will allow us flexibility to take advantage of cheap out of season deals on seeds and fertilisers.

Wintertime is also a period for planning the season ahead and carrying out machinery re-investment. This year we are seriously moving into the 21st Century with some of our high tech new machines.

Our new fertiliser spreader can be controlled by GPS receiver which varies the rate of fertiliser applied to the crop according to the amount of Biomass in the field. The Biomass is measured by satellite based infra-red photography which is converted into a leaf area index map of the filed. Software is then used to either apply more fertiliser to thin areas of crop in the hope of making them yield more (the 'Robin Hood' approach) or applying more fertiliser to the thicker areas in the belief that they will yield more that the thin areas so it is worth spending more money on them, (the 'King John' approach). We are trialling the system on a small area this spring using the 'Robin Hood' technique.

The new combine that we have purchased for this harvest is also bristling with high- tech gadgetry. As well as selfsteering and GPS controlled yield monitoring, which allows us to print out yield contour maps of every field, it also has a new technology called 'Telematics' which allows it to continuously upload details stored on its central computer to the internet regarding its operating efficiency, setting, fuel use etc. Neil can upload onto his screen at any time details of every other similar combine working throughout the country and compare his work rate, settings etc with theirs to help (theoretically) improve efficiency. It is also a bit of a 'spy in the cab' because it e-mails me every morning with a pie chart showing the previous days combining and how much time was spent cutting, standing still, travelling between fields etc (the only way Neil will now be able to have a crafty after lunch snooze will be to pull the fuse! Whoops, I shouldn't give him ideas...)

Village Heritage

Hendred Heritage From the Village Archives



As you can see Hendred Stores has changed very little in the last hundred years or so, apart from the enormous sycamore tree that was felled (which apparently caused controversy within the village), even if the shopkeepers have! We all welcome Martin & Louise Johnson, who are the latest in a history of at least 300 years of shopkeepers to trade from these premises. Looking at the photos you can see that Hendred Stores has always been a hub of village life, none more so than during the recent snow when Martin & Louise had a wide spread of villagers popping in for milk & bread!

The post office might seem a modern addition to the facilities in this building, but it has been there at least once before, indeed it has had many homes- including a short time at Snells Hall. The post office's last official home (before this) was in the Spar Shop in Portway, which was pulled down in the 1980's and the small terrace of Dennis's Row was built.

Before that it lived in the building to the left of the Eyston Arms, which is now a house. Do you remember the well worn steps? Left to the groceries and right to the post office... I can still remember the sound of Violet Goddard stamping documents & receipts with her lovely round post office date stamp! Do you remember the bubble gum machines outside?

There were several more locations, including one of the cottages opposite the telephone box and for a time the Post Office was in Cat Street, you can still see the post box on the brick gate post and the house next door is now called 'Penney Green' after the postage stamp of the Victorian time. Lark Rise we may not be, or even Candleford, but East Hendred has had its own Post Office for over 100 years- in various guises!

Back to Hendred Stores, you may pop in for your daily paper, milk, bread or tobacco- but when was the last time you looked at the building? Have you ever noticed the distinguished looking brickwork? Wysteria House and Hendred Stores, to give it the correct name, is a fine example of a medieval timber framed house. It was originally constructed with wattle & daub, which still exists in some places. During Elizabethan times the wattle & daub was replaced with unusual 'herring bone' brickwork, probably to strengthen the building by a wealthy wool merchant using the unusual brickwork as a flourish to show his wealth.

At one time the London Stage Coach called here on a regular basis.

This is a fine example of how 'History is All Around You', it may not all be ancient, but every building in East Hendred has a story to tell. East Hendred Heritage Trust is hoping to recruit more Friends of the Museum to help us on small projects, and the history of houses in the village is one of them. We would like to put together a portfolio of each house to support our magnificent archives and to pull together the history of places with that of the people. Planning Matters

EHE/18806/1, Oak Barn, Old Road: (Ground and first floor extension). The Parish Council offered no objection to this proposal.

EHE/2765/13, Plough Farm, Old Road: (Erection of rear extension and front porch). The Parish Council offered no objection to this application. This application has subsequently been permitted by Vale of White Horse District Council.

EHE/1965/20 & 21-A, Greensands, Reading Road: (Retrospective application for change of use from dwelling to guesthouse with advertising signage and retention of vehicular access road). Following recent resubmission of this application the Parish Council submitted detailed objections to this proposal covering concerns about lack of clarity on use of out-buildings, inadequate vehicular access and unsuitable signage. Subsequently, this latest application has been rejected by Vale of White Horse District Council.

EHE/16146/3-E, Mather House, White Road: (Building operations completed without planning permission). An enforcement notice was issued and then withdrawn because the District Council felt that it required modification.

APP/V3120/A/09/2093648, The Cottage, Chapel Square: (Appeal against refusal of planning permission for erection of two storey rear extension, provision of vehicular access and associated parking). The Parish Council objected to the original application and, in regard to this appeal, has submitted to the Planning Inspectorate a detailed exposition of their grounds for objection. These cover such aspects as negative impact on the amenity of Chapel House, degradation of the unique character of the locality, inadequacies in access and concerns about parking.

EHE/20690, 1 The Spinney, Ford Lane: (Proposal for a two storey rear extension). The Parish Council did not object to this application but noted some overlooking of a neighbouring property and asked that consideration be given during construction to avoid blocking by builders' vehicles of the narrow entrance at the Hendreds School and elsewhere nearby.
