The forthcoming national election is gaining a lot of publicity. Most of us know that the new government will have to take harsh measures to manage the country's economy, with cost savings in many areas. Overall the village precept is a small addition to the Council tax and all of it is spent on this village.

# **Vale District Council Forward Strategy**

The Paris Council has considered closely the revised strategy which was presented in January with a deadline of mid-February for a response. The council commented on a number of issues which were:

# Siting 1500 dwellings NE of Wantage with new relief road.

This is a substantial increase on the proposal for 3500 houses in the Wantage/Grove in the January 2009 Core Strategy, which will have a major impact on infrastructure and services in the wider Wantage area, which includes East Hendred. The Parish Council considers that this proposed housing development NE of Wantage is not sustainable for several reasons listed below:-

### **Massive Traffic Growth on the A417:**

The present local road infrastructure cannot support the additional traffic that will be generated by the proposed housing development east of Wantage. To accommodate this traffic, it is essential that a plan for improving the A417 (including widening it at key points) and incorporating access to it from the villages, must be in place. The Council considers that current plans for the A417 are totally inadequate.

# Access from villages onto this stretch of the A417 has not been considered

Our particular concern is for our parish (with 450 houses), where access from the village onto the A417 (the only route out of the village) is already difficult. The Parish Council is already asking for traffic lights at the main access point to the village to the A417; these will become imperative if the additional housing is built in NE Wantage. Improving access to the A417 from the villages between Rowstock and Wantage will require traffic controls at each of the village junctions with the A417. These will be in addition to traffic controls to the two proposed new access roads to the A417, and the proposed traffic lights at the entrance to Featherbed Lane. This would mean a total of up to seven new roundabouts or sets of traffic lights on the stretch of road between Wantage and Rowstock Corner which would have major implications on traffic flow

# Route of the proposed Rowstock Western Link

The exact route of this is not clear but it may well be in East Hendred Parish (part of which is adjacent to the Rowstock Round-about). One concern is that houses between the A417, the proposed link and the A4185 will be totally surrounded and isolated by these roads. Another is that the junction of the link road and the A417 is likely to be very close to the existing junction with Featherbed Lane, resulting in traffic lights and/or roundabouts very close together.

### Local bus services

According to the Scots report buses serving this parish will not come into the village, but stop on the A417. This is of serious concern for safety reasons as crossing the A417 at this point is difficult and there is very little room on the north side for people to stand

# **Proposed 400 Houses on the Harwell Campus**

Building on this site (which is immediately adjacent to our parish) is generally welcomed because providing housing on the Campus where substantial employment is projected, will be convenient for residents working there, and result in the more efficient use of local roads

However, the proposed density (40 homes to the acre) is very high for an Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). This density is characteristic of an urban area. A lower density is preferred more appropriate for an AONB. The scheme should include sufficient education and leisure facilities, and other relevant services for a community of this size, including green space and play areas. If these facilities are not provided locally residents will need to access nearby facilities in Wantage/Didcot which would add considerably to pressure on local roads.

# Decision on level of precept for 2010/11

The Council after detailed discussion decided to precept for a sum of £22,000 which is a 10% increase on the previous year. In the previous Bulletin we had identified the problems of balancing the Council's budget having had to take funds out of reserves in several previous years. The Council has decided to limit expenditure on several items, including the lengthman and the cost of the Bulletin, whilst increasing the amount available to village organisations in the way of grants. However the size of grants to individual organisations will also be limited, bearing in mind the pressure on the grants budget in 2009/10. The Council's finance committee will continue to keep a close watch on the budget during the year.

# **BT red Telephone Box**

The Council has decided to take responsibility for the red phone box in the High Street, from BT. It was felt that it was a feature of the village and should be kept. The Council is open to suggestions on its future use, mini-library, art gallery etc etc. Send your ideas to the Clerk

# **Future Plans for the Harwell Campus site**

Two Parish Councillors attended a recent meeting called by the Goodman Group to discuss the future of the Harwell campus. A joint Venture has been set up between UKAEA, the Science and Facilities Research Council and the Goodman Group to develop the site as it is decommissioned. The Goodman Group are an integrated property group with international operations. They have extensive experience in working with organizations to develop and manage their sites. The meeting consisting of representatives of local Parish Councils will continue to get together on a quarterly basis. As part of this redevelopment there are plans for a large housing site on the campus -see article on Vale Strategy.

# **Emergency Response Plan**

Parishes are being encouraged by the County Council to develop their own Emergency Response Plans. These would be useful in the event of a local emergency such as a major gas leak, road accident, flu epidemic or similar incident. The Parish Council has developed a first draft of a Plan for the village and would welcome input from anyone who feels that they could contribute, particularly if they have skills or expertise that would be useful in an emergency. 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# Message from District Councillor Mike Murray

Shopping: we all do it, some hate it, some love it, but most people agree that having good quality shopping in a clean safe and well laid out centre with accessible public transport and sufficient car parking makes the experience a lot better. Readers may not be aware that the Vale council owns (as part of its investment portfolio) the shopping centre in Abingdon. Despite improvements to the square, the precinct itself remains rather tired, with empty units and a somewhat sad appearance. The long-leasehold interest in the centre is owned by the pension fund Scottish Widows, and it is they who are responsible for the management of the centre. In order to improve the vitality of Abingdon, and improve the Council's investment interest in the centre, the Council has been negotiation with Scottish Widows to enable them to develop better and more modern shop units that are of the size and layout that retailers want.

As part of this process, plans are being drawn up, and the public (that's you and me) are being consulted in the new local plan (or Local Development Framework as it is called) for a wider redevelopment, to incorporate Charter Place. The idea would be to provide a new town centre supermarket, re-house the library and doctors surgery, and reconfigure the car park. This would in theory result in people coming into Abingdon for their weekly shop at the supermarket, incorporating a visit to the library, and also to a revitalised shopping precinct bursting with healthily trading independent and national chain shops. It would also mean that the doctors would no longer be disturbed in their consulting rooms by the little darlings hanging around the shopping centre banging on their windows. It may however mean that the surgery, and library move to first floor level. Apparently a travelator, or similar means of access would be provided, but this remains to be shown in detail.

Plans will be emerging through the year, please do tell the council what you think!



# **East Hendred Community Centre**

### Riduna

The owner of Riduna (the property on land to the rear of Snells Hall) has recently obtained planning permission to construct a new 5-bedroomed house on the same site. The Management Committee is maintaining close liaison with the developer to minimise any potential disruption to hall users (particularly where children are involved) especially during the removal or delivery of construction materials.

### **Fencing**

It is understood that the owner is keen to be able to landscape the right of way to Riduna (which is part of the Snells Hall site) during this process and we are delaying the provision of new estate fencing on part of the Hall's boundary until we have seen the proposed plans and can see how the fencing styles could be matched..

### **Loft Insulation**

Thanks to the efforts of Jules Meneaugh and East Hendred Entertains (who generously granted £300 towards the project) the loft area over the stage and committee room is now insulated to the recommended standard and the openings in the gable ends sealed. We expect this treatment to make a real difference to the comfort in that part of the hall.

### **Vandalism**

At some point between the 12<sup>th</sup> and 14<sup>th</sup> of March damage was caused to the playhouse belonging to Hendreds Pre-School. The Thames Valley Police report that there is good likelihood that forensic evidence from the scene will lead them to the miscreants involved. # **Snells Tree Planting**

On Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> January Hendreds Environment Group volunteers planted 50 new hazel trees in the Snells woodland. About 10 people came along to help, enjoying the tree planting and the tea and flapjacks.

Trees were planted to provide screening and to enhance the woodland for wildlife. Hazel is well suited for screening as it can be planted densely and remain manageable through coppicing every seven or so years. It is a native tree, so attractive and useful to native wildlife, producing catkins in spring and nuts in autumn.



# **Native Trees and Coppicing**

Most native British trees will coppice. That is, if they are cut down more shoots will grow from the stump or the roots. For many hundreds of years most British woodlands were managed by coppicing to produce continuous supplies of wood for fuel, fencing and all manner of fixings and utensils. Hazel was traditionally used for pea sticks, plant stakes, bean rods, hurdles, barrel hoops, pheasant traps, withes (ties), rake handles, morris staves and more. It's still used in gardens and in thatching.



Our Rector Elizabeth calls this a roller-coaster journey: there is the Palm Sunday Procession through the village shared by the congregations of both churches (28th March), and a range of dramatic and exciting services throughout Holy Week including the high drama of Tenebrae at West Hendred on Wednesday 31st March at 7:30pm, and the Eucharist of the Last Supper at 7:30pm in St Augustine's on Maundy Thursday (1st April). At St Mary's the Maundy Thursday service is at 8pm and ends with a procession up to St Amand's chapel at Hendred House where a Watch is kept until midnight – the start of Good Friday. You may welcome the chance of a period of quiet and reflection.

Holy Week culminates in Good Friday (April 2nd). Join the congregation of St Augustine's for our traditional pilgrimage around the Benefice – come for as much or as little of the day as you can manage. We start at 8:30am with Morning Prayer in West Hendred; at 10am there is a Family Service at Ardington; at 11:30am, a time for Reflection at Lockinge; then after a picnic lunch at Betterton Farmhouse (bring your own), the day ends with Meditation and Veneration of the Cross at 2pm at St Augustine's. Dogs are welcome on the walk, and it's also allowed to travel by car. At St Mary's, the Good Friday service will be at 3.00pm, with an Easter Vigil Mass on Saturday 3rd April at 8.00pm.

In anticipation of Easter itself, there will be an Easter Vigil service for the whole of the Wantage Downs Benefice at Lockinge church on Easter Eve, Saturday 3<sup>rd</sup> April, at 8:30pm. As dusk falls we gather to hear readings from the Bible and we light the new fire of Easter from which all our Easter candles are lit. We celebrate the first Communion of Easter, greeting the risen Lord as Mary Magdalene did before the sun rose on that first Easter morning. Come and be part of this dramatic and powerful celebration of the Resurrection in Lockinge where it has been celebrated for over a thousand years!

Then comes Easter Sunday on 4th April, with services of great celebration (Mass in St Mary's at 9:30am, Easter Communion in St Augustine's at 10:30am). Both churches will be decorated for Easter, so do come in and enjoy the work of our flower arrangers.

Looking further ahead, St Augustine's annual parish meeting will be held in church after the morning service on Sunday 25th April. Everyone is invited to attend this meeting to hear reports from the past year and discuss plans for the next. Then from 2pm on Saturday 22 May, the Saturday closest to our patronal festival (St Augustine)

tine's day - 26 May), we invite all parishioners to visit their parish church and contribute to the considerable cost of its upkeep. We'll be serving cream teas, offering trips up the tower, and there'll be a children's trail through the church. Come and support your local church!

Please also note in your diary the date of St Augustine's Summer Fete: Saturday 5th June, from 2pm. This will be a traditional English garden fete in the beautiful gardens of Cowdray's, Cat Street, with tea and cakes, stalls and games for all the family. And as part of the East Hendred Festival and Open Gardens Day, St Augustine's will be welcoming visitors with organ music and tea and cake on Sunday 13th June from 2pm.

Finally, don't forget the coffee mornings in the south aisle of St Augustine's church on the last Wednesday of the month (that's March 31, April 28, May 26 and Jun 30), from 10:30am to 12 noon. There's tea, coffee and biscuits, and a small table for bring-and-buy. Everyone is welcome.


The club is now in a position to complete the construction of the new complex of practise facilities replacing the single net which had served for several years but became inadequate. With great energy, Dominic McKenna has raised funds from several sources to proceed and a major effort from club members on 20 March saw the spreading of two lorry-loads of special aggregate to form the bases. These nets will dramatically improve not only the practise of senior members but also the training of the junior members of the club.

Between 1984 and 2001, the club fielded a team in what has become the Charles Hoile Downs Cricket League. This provides Wednesday evening cricket, starting at 6.15 pm, (ie when the evenings are long). We withdrew in 2001 because of difficulties of raising a team, but now there are many players just over 15 who cannot play in junior league matches and so we will participate in the 2010 Downs League to provide match experience for them. There will be 10 fixtures between 5 May and 7 July, the first one away to Sunningwell. As before, junior players will be encouraged, with some selection priority, also to play in second XI and Sunday friendlies against opposition with similar team make-up.

As previously, there will be a full programme of Under 11, 13 and 15 league, cup and friendly matches from the beginning of May until the beginning of July. The Downs League and Junior fixtures will be included in the club fixture list.

A huge amount of help will be needed from the beginning of April to prepare the square, the outfield, the practice nets, the changing rooms and the other areas of the pavilion. # **Farming Focus**

Interesting weather extremes again have dominated recent farm work



The driest September for 12 years followed by a fairly dry October allowed us to plant our autumn crops in good conditions. Unfortunately the wettest November and December for about 7 years severely disrupted our black grass spraying programme. (Black grass is our No.1 weed problem. It s a very competitive yield robbing weed which over the years has become resistant to every herbicide developed to kill it. At present there is only one really effective herbicide left and this is best sprayed on small plants in the autumn when they are less able to breakdown the herbicide and survive treatment). The wet weather prevented us from getting onto the land to spray and subsequently the coldest winter for about 30 years further hampered spraying progress as plants need to be actively growing in soil temps about 6°C for the herbicide to work. At this rate we will not be able to control the weeds until early April whereas treatment would have been best in November. (At least I have an excuse if the fields look a bit weedier than usual this summer!)

The exceptionally cold winter and snow caused a few problems with the sheep, having to keep water troughs flowing and having to feed hay in the fields when the grass was snow covered.

We usually sell our lambs as 'stores' in the autumn for somebody else to fatten but because the fat lamb prices have been so high this winter we decided to finish them ourselves using purchased concentrate feed. We usually budget to get about £30- £35 per lamb when we sell them but this year we averaged nearly double this at about £67 per lamb. Which was a useful increase especially when crop prices are quite low at the moment.

An old farming adage is 'up horn down corn' (or vice versa) which indicates that when arable crop values are either high or low the livestock values are usually the opposite, hence the attraction of mixed farming rather than all ones eggs in the same basket.

The hard frosts were not all bad. We managed to plant spring beans directly in to frosted ground with little or no prior cultivation. (Normally in the spring the ground has to be moved a few times to dry out the soil to allow trafficking with the drill)

# **Planning Matters**

EHE/16688/1, Riduna, Church St (Demolition of existing bungalow and erection of replacement dwelling): The Parish Council objected to this application on the following basis: a) The proposed dwelling will be over dominant and will have a detrimental impact on the special rural character of Snells and on the surrounding conservation area, (b) The new house will overlook a neighbouring property resulting in loss of privacy and visual intrusion, (c) There are significant safety issues associated with access to the site during construction. The application was assessed by the Vale District Council Planning Committee and approved.

EHE/2100/4, Sports Ground, Mill Lane (Replacement of cricket pitches): The Parish Council fully supported this application which was subsequently approved

EHE/16146/4, Mather House, White Road (Retrospective planning application for extension and change of use from residential to bed and breakfast): The Parish Council did not object to the application but expressed its strong disappointment that the planning application was retrospective. The Parish Council noted that sewerage issues had been evident the area near Mather House and requested that the Council investigate the adequacy of the sewerage pipe work at Mather House and its impact on the local sewer network

EHE16671/1-LB, Godfrey's Farm, St Mary's Road (Repair and renovations to the structure of this listed building): The Parish Council fully supported this application and noted that they regarded it as a high quality proposal

EHE/21114, Health Protection Agency, Fermi Avenue, Harwell campus (Replacement of garage door): The Parish Council offered no objection

EHE/21116-LB, Chapel House, Chapel Square (Interior renovations around fireplace and replacement of exterior cement rendering with lime mortar): The Parish Council offered no objection

EHE/215/9, Monks Farm, Newbury Rd (Demolition and reconstruction of rear wall & roof, erection of conservatory & other amendments to the Tack Room): The Parish Council will develop their response after consideration of a recent site visit.

EHE/1043/4-X, (Land near Rowstock House, Rowstock): Erection of two small barn style dwellings to replace existing commercial buildings): This application was received recently.
