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# chair

In the last Bulletin I commented on the new policies being introduced by the Coalition Government. However three months further on the consequences of the planned devolution of power to a more local level and the effects of the "Big Society" are still not clear. In many respects this village has many good examples of the "Big Society" in operation, with active participation by residents at many levels, including societies, the Churches, the Community Centre Committee, the Sports Club and many others. The fund raising events

run by Hendred Entertains are particularly good examples of what I think the government means in this respect, particularly as the funds raised go to provide better facilities and services at a local level in East Hendred.

As we know cost cutting is the main objective of both central government, the County Council and District Councils. Last year the Parish Council debated at length on the level to set its precept at, since in previous years expenditure had exceeded income. In the end after careful consideration it was decided to opt for a modest 10% increase in the precept. It was recognized that this would involve some

cost cutting ourselves and limiting expenditure in several areas. Given the tightening financial situation generally the Council will need to think very carefully when setting its next precept which will be required in January 2011. It also needs to be recognised that grants to village organizations from external bodies are likely to be very limited in the near future. Overall it is useful to remind ourselves that all the local precept is spent very locally to benefit the village.

We are sorry to be losing Susan Townley as a Councillor, due to ill health. She has been a valuable member of the Council since being elected in 2007. Since the last election we have had four members of the Council resign, most due to ill health or moving out of the village. The Council welcomes new members but is also very dependent on its more experienced members to provide the required continuity and history. At present Sue Roberts and myself are the longest serving members of the Council.

It is good news that the Environment Group collected an award at the "Oxfordshire Sustainability and Conservation Awards" – it is encouraging to see positive efforts at the local level to mitigate the effects of climate change.

At the Parish Council meeting on Tuesday Sept. 14<sup>th</sup> Stephen Webb was appointed as a new Councillor to fill the vacancy from Val Bacon's resignation. There were two candidates and after a secret vote Stephen was appointed to serve on the Council. We look forward to his involvement as a Councillor. Stephen is a research scientist at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory, having moved into the village in 2009. He has previous experience with community organisations and has recently taken over responsibility for village transport issues with the County Council.

# **Traditional Christmas Bazaar**

The traditional Christmas Bazaar will be held in Snells Hall on Saturday Dec.4<sup>th</sup>. There will be the usual attractions, including Father Christmas, the Grand Draw, children's competitions and many stalls. It is hoped that the village hand bell ringers will be able to perform as they did last year. Do come along and support this village event.

# **Teenage Shelter**

Our Police Community Support Officer (Catherine Johnson) took the initiative with Parish Council support to find a site for a teenage shelter. A site was identified in Coulings Close, adjacent to the A417. As the land belonged to the Vale Housing Association they undertook a survey of many local householders on the proposed site. The overwhelming response was support for the idea of a shelter but negative on the proposed location. It is hoped that another location can be found as it is well recognised that village teenagers needs a place to meet.

# **Neighbourhood Policing Update**

Here is the latest Wantage East neighbourhood update from Police Community Support officer Tim Deane.



Hello to everyone this is my first update so I will try to make it as interesting as possible.

The Wantage East Neighbourhood Consultation indicated dog fouling is a priority issue in local areas. The Wantage East Neighbourhood Team continue to tackle this issue. Dog owners please note that it is in fact an offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 where a person who is in charge of a dog must clean up after it when it fouls any footpath, highway, verge or other open space to which the public have access. By allowing your dog to do this, you could face a fixed penalty of £50; if the case is prosecuted in court a fine of up to £1000 may be incurred. While on the subject of dogs; many dogs are lost every year, some as a result of theft, even the most reliable and well-cared for dog can get lost or stolen. Dog theft has been attributed to two broad motives - breeding and ransom.

Make sure that your dog wears a collar and identification (ID) tag. Include your surname, telephone number, address and full postcode – if there's room put 'microchipped' on the tag if your dog has a chip. Microchip your dog so that it is permanently identifiable should the collar and ID tag be removed. For more information visit Thames Valley Police Dog Theft Website. Speeding was also indicated to be a priority concern in this area. The Police Community Support Officers (PCSO) continue to carry out speed checks in the Wantage East villages with the SID (Speed Indication Device) and the ANPR (Automatic Number Plate Recognition) Machine. Owners of vehicles found to be exceeding the speed limit will be contacted.

Parking is an issue that takes up a lot of our time. In most cases common sense by the driver of the vehicle could prevent a lot of the problems. Under Section 22 of the Road Traffic Act 1988, you **MUST NOT** leave your vehicle in a dangerous position or where it causes any unnecessary obstruction of the road. Think before you park and lock your vehicle or if you are committing an offence by parking there. Just take that moment to look around to see if you are obstructing anyone or anything; you could prevent that fine. Also bear in mind, if your vehicle is causing an obstruction it may be removed in your absence.

### Incidents

Two people arrested for Burglary non dwelling in Harwell, both bailed. Enquires are ongoing.

One person arrested for public order offence – charged from Wantage. There has been a spate of lead thefts across our area where Houses, Schools, Churches and Village Halls have been targeted.

PCSO's Gary Kirby and Denise Clements were directly involved in the detention and subsequent arrest of three males caught Hare Coursing near Harwell.

PCSO Larry Gardner attended Harwell Archery open day on Saturday 21 August. Larry is a qualified archer himself and spent the day instructing local young people.



# Message from District Councillor Mike Murray

Readers will recall from previous reports that the Vale is a pretty safe place to live when compared with much of the rest of the country. We do have our own aggravations and difficulties however, and recent incidences of theft of roofing lead from buildings such as the Steventon school, and Hare Coursing on the Downs near Harwell are examples. One of the more frequent annoyances expressed by residents relate to dog fouling, and our Policemen have reminded us of the offence under the Dogs (Fouling of Land) Act 1996 "where a person who is in charge of a dog must clean up after it when it fouls any footpath, highway, verge or other open space to which the public have access". We are served by the Wantage East neighbourhood team of police from Thames Valley Police Force, and they can be contacted on **0845 8 505 505**. There is an ability to report less urgent problems such as potholes, graffiti, abandoned Tesco trolleys etc at **www.fixmystreet.com**.

Residents that suffer from our cold winters, and make use of an electric blanket, will be pleased to know that the Vale, in conjunction with a selection of partners, is offering a free service of electric blanket testing. Apparently blankets should be tested for annually to guard against the possibility electric shock, which can, we are told, be dangerous for people with heart problems (one would have thought it would be more than alarming even for people without a heart condition?), and / or electrical burns or fire. The local testing date is Friday 8th October at Abingdon Fire Station, and anyone who would like to book an appointment for this service should call Julie Brain on 01865 815607.

For those whose interests lie elsewhere, Oxfordshire's "Drugs and Alcohol Action Team" have produced a series of short videos demonstrating the effects of various drugs, and the mixing of drugs and alcohol, on a cartoon porcupine. # Permit scheme at Household Waste Recycling Centres



It's an annual sponsored church crawl in which half the money raised goes to the Trust and half to your chosen local church. Churches of all denominations all over the county were open for the day, including all three of our village churches (St Augustine's, St Mary's and St Amand's chapel in Hendred House). This year 10 people from St Augustine's church had a very happy time 'striding' around 8 churches in Abingdon. They were very different in character, from the very old to the modern. The team were welcomed in every one and if they had accepted all the tea and biscuits offered they would have spent much of the day running to the loo! So they resisted and spent some happy minutes looking around the churches instead. They had lunch on a bench (though the men retired to the pub for a quick half) and eventually finished about 2.30pm.

I hope this will reach you in time for you to come to the *concert* 'The West Gallery Story', at 8.00pm on Friday 1<sup>st</sup> October in St Augustine's church. Christminster Singers of Oxford, directed by Dave Townsend, will recreate the sounds that would have been heard in churches 200 years ago, until ideas of how people should behave in church changed and the music was found to be too lively and irreverent. It largely died out, except for many traditional tunes for carols that are sung to this day. Tickets £6, available on the door.

Harvest Festival will be celebrated in St Augustine's at 10:30am on Sunday 3<sup>rd</sup> October, followed by Harvest Lunch for the whole village in Snells Hall at 12.30pm. Everyone is invited to this delicious home-cooked 2-course lunch to celebrate the harvest, but you do need to book in advance (even if only very slightly in advance!) – tickets (£5 adults, £3 children) from Jackie Francis. And do call in to the parish church in the first half of October to look at the beautiful harvest decorations.

The ninth series of the popular *Penney Memorial Lectures* starts on Thursday 14th October when Henry Vialou Clark (a civil engineer and former soldier) and Anne Smyth (a retired Hampshire primary school head teacher) are coming to talk about how they are 'Giving Kenyan Children a Start in Life'. Next year they will be opening their 14<sup>th</sup> primary school in rural Kenya, bringing relief from poverty and a brighter future for numerous Kenyan

children. As with all Penney Memorial Lectures, it starts at 7:30pm in St Augustine's church. Tickets cost £6, in aid of the church, and after the talk there's the chance to talk with the speakers over a glass of wine (for which we ask for a small donation.)

On *Remembrance Sunday*, 14<sup>th</sup> November, the service at St Augustine's will start earlier than normal, at 9:30am, so we are able to join with the rest of the village for the Act of Remembrance at the War Memorial just before 11am.

Don't forget the *coffee mornings* in St Augustine's church on the last Wednesday of each month – that's 29<sup>th</sup> September, 27<sup>th</sup> October and 24<sup>th</sup> November – from 10:30am to 12 noon. There's tea, coffee and biscuits, and a small table for bringand-buy. Everyone is welcome.

Details of Christmas events will be available nearer the time. Meanwhile, information about all our services and events are on the noticeboards outside both churches and on the websites (you can reach them through the 'Churches' tab at www.hendred.org).

The Parish Council have objected to this for a number of reasons, namely excessive overdevelopment of the area, boxing in a listed building and increased road traffic on a narrow lane used by school children. Application Refused.

EHE/2680/3, Mafrag, Mill Lane, East Hendred. Errection of a single story side extension to provide ground floor WC and bootroom/utility room. The Parish Council had no objections. Application Granted

EHE/215/12-CA & EHE/215/11 Monks Farm Newbury Road, East Hendred. Demolition and reconstruction of existing roof, erection of new garden retaining wall and other minor amendments (The Tackroom). The Parish Council had no objections. Applications granted

EHE21204 Hill View, Horn Lane, East Hendred. Proposed two storey rear extension, removal of dormer windows and roof alterations. The Parish Council objected due to loss of day light and privacy to neighbour's property. Also the increased in size to the property was in contrary to DC9. Application Refused.

EHE/21150 3 Orchard Lane, East Hendred. Extension. The Parish Council did not object but requested that consideration of "overlooking" to neighbouring properties was given consideration. Application Granted.

EHE/3936/35 Chestnut Cottage, Horn Lane, East Hendred. Demolition of existing garage. Erection of a two storey rear extension. The Parish Council objected on a number of levels. Application Withdrawn.
