One Of Britain's Best Villages

East Hendred was selected as one of Britain's 12 best villages in the Sunday Times dated March 13th. It was one of three in the group identified as "Best Connected". Comments on the village said "East Hendred is particularly attractive, with a community shop, a gastropub and a local vineyard with a drinkable white. Best of all, the main road is a no-through road and peters out on the Ridgeway. The average price for a property in this peaceful haven is £407,281 according to estate agent's research." The BBC has picked up on this accolade and is planning filming in the village in the near future — so we shall get some more publicity. The other villages in "Best Connected" were Chew Magna in Somerset and Brenchley in Kent, along with nine other villages selected in three groups — "Best for Schools", "Best Getaway" and "Best on a Budget".

Welcome To West Rowstock

From April 5th residents in West Rowstock (including Tudor Walk) will become part of East Hendred parish. This transfer has taken some considerable time but is now about to happen. We welcome those living in the 38 houses involved and hope that they will soon form part of the East Hendred community, despite the small distance that separates them from the main core of the village. East Hendred Council has undertaken to maintain the services provided by Milton Parish Council, in the form of litter picking and grass cutting. The Bulletin will continue to be distributed to West Rowstock houses and we welcome any input to the Bulletin from those living there. There will also be the opportunity in May for the residents to vote in the Parish and District Council elections linked to this village.

On Thursday May 5th there will be elections held in the village to select both District Councillors and Parish Councillors. Do take the opportunity to cast your vote.

New "Affordable" Housing



In early March the three new houses in Coulings Close were completed by Sovereign Housing and made available for tenants with close associations with the village as planned. This follows on from the needs survey that was carried out by Oxfordshire Rural Community Council in 2008, which identified a requirement for up to 10 lower cost houses in the village. The building of three more houses partly satisfies this need but the Council is actively seeking other sites which will provide additional housing of this type.

The Council was sorry to hear of the death of Peter Mulford recently after a long illness. Peter was a Parish Councillor for over 23 years, joining in July 1967 and resigning in May 1991. He had particular interests in this Bulletin and often contributed drawings and cartoons to liven up articles. He was editor for many years and oversaw the transfer of the early editions of the Bulletin from typescript to a polished typeset layout which he edited. Peter was born in the village and attended St.Amand's school. After leaving school he joined AERE Harwell, eventually becoming head of the Design Studio, where he was able to put his artistic skills to good use. He will be remembered by many villagers,

supporting his parents as publicans of the Wheatsheaf which they ran for many years, and then eventually taking over as licensee with his wife. Peter also took on the task of restoring the old village fire pump, following its discovery in a shed at Pound Cottage. Helped by friends from the village and his design team at AERE it was returned to its former glory and given back to the village. It now resides behind Snells Hall in its own special enclosure. Later Peter became a foundation trustee of the Heritage Charitable Trust which now runs the Chapel Museum. He spent many hours preparing excellent presentations and exhibits of village life which were displayed in the Chapel. Peter moved to Didcot some years ago but continued to take a special interest in East Hendred. We would like to express our condolences to Peter's family and express our appreciation of his long period of service as a Councillor and to the village community.

Mrs Val Bacon

The Parish Council was saddened to hear of the recent death of Val Bacon. Val resigned from the Council in 2010 when she learned of her serious illness. She joined the Parish Council in 2004 and became its Deputy Chair in 2008. She contributed greatly to Council business, particularly on issues concerned with younger children and play schemes. She also managed successfully for many years the courtesy lighting system, which makes walking around the village at night so much easier. She was also an active member of the team developing the Parish Plan which was published in 2008. Val had a particular interest in the environmental activities and subsequently became a member of the Environment Group and provided a link between the Parish Council and this group. Val's profile as a Parish Councillor appeared in the Autumn 2008 Bulletin. In response to the question if she had unlimited funds to spend on a project for the village she said "Build an adventure playground, with exciting equipment for children of different

ages, trees to climb, places to build dens, and a cycle track. Playing is a great way for young people to learn lots of skills, whilst enjoying themselves- and I liked climbing trees and making dens when I was young." Although a start was made in this direction Val recognised that there was much more to do to help village youngsters. She also said that she would like to be remembered as "a brief candle flame". Val will be remembered as much more than that for all the good work she did for the village. The Council wishes to express it's condolences to Trevor and family over their loss.

Neighbourhood Policing Update

Here is the latest Wantage East neighbourhood update from Police Community Support Officer C9815 Tim Deane.

Rural Crime is still a priority concern for the Wantage East Neighbourhood Team. Hi-Visibility Patrols by Police and Police Community Support Officers (PCSO) are carried out at rural locations including outbuildings to prevent Burglaries and the theft of plant machinery and diesel.

The Wantage East Neighbourhood Team continues to patrol on our area to tackle the issues of Hare Coursing and Poaching Offences.

Anti Social Behaviour (ASB) and Speeding are also priority concerns for the Wantage East Neighbourhood Team. Persons acting in an Anti Social manner and/or causing Harassment, Alarm and Distress will be dealt with.

Locations have been identified where motorists regularly exceed speed limits causing concern amongst residents. The Police Community Support Officers (PCSO) carry out speed checks in the Wantage East villages with the Speed Indication Device (SID) and the Automatic Number Plate Recognition (ANPR) machine. Owners of vehicles found to be exceeding the speed limit will be contacted.

Incidents

Theft of diesel from Lockinge. Two days later the offending vehicle was seen working on a property in Wantage by a Neighbourhood Watch Co-ordinator who phoned the police. PC Steve Lynch attended and arrested two males for theft of diesel and possession of cannabis. They were both later cautioned for these offences. They were also arrested for fraud by false representation (rogue trader offences) and are currently on bail for this offence.

PC Steve Lynch carried out an ANPR operation on the A417 at Rowstock which resulted in numerous stop checks and one vehicle being seized for having no insurance.

The Wantage East and Wantage Neighbourhood team executed two drugs warrants in Wantage.

Doorstep Selling - Cold Calling - Rogue Traders


Many doorstop sellers are honest and genuine. However, some aren't – and they may use lines like these in order to get into your home: 'Congratulations! You've won a prize! If you could just sign here for it...' or 'I noticed you've got a few loose tiles on your roof...' Most legitimate market researchers carry an identity card, which you can ask to see. If you're in any doubt, call the Market Research Society on 0207 4904911. You can also check for an Approved Trader at www.buywithconfidence.gov.uk. Remember, doorstep sellers are trained to get people to buy. They can be extremely persuasive. Once you have let a doorstep seller into your home, they will be expecting a sale – and they won't give up easily.

Message From District Councillor Terry Fraser

I am pleased to have served this District of the Hendreds for the past 20 years. In that time I have seen many changes in how all the Parish Councils in the Hendreds ward are run, and I am proud of them. The District Council has gone through a very significant change in the last 4 years, going into shared services with South Oxfordshire District Council. County and District Councils across the Country are looking to follow our lead.

The Localism bill has the potential to deliver more control of many services to Parish Councils and other local bodies, but of course there is much more work to be done by Ministers, especially on how it will be financed. We must keep fully alert to this

To those who receive them, your new bus pass (issued by the Vale District Council on behalf of the County Council) should arrive very soon in the post. The new pass comes into force on 1st April 2011.

As Chairman of the Neighbourhood Action Group, for Wantage East (Police Committee) I wish to thank on your behalf P.C.Lynch and his excellent team of eight PCSOs for all the hard work on and off duty to keep the Hendreds a safe and peaceful place to live.

Message From District Councillor Mike Murray

Firstly a few cheers for the MP for Newbury (and Environment Minister) is decision to kick the reservoir into the long grass. In the current economic climate I think we can do without a massive and unnecessary infrastructure project paid for through increased utility bills for years to come.

On the subject of economic constraint, one of our cost centres is the Guildhall in Abingdon, an uncompetitive and tired facility in a well supplied Abingdon venue market, that has failed to pay its way for years. I think (being a "wicked property developer" I suppose I would) this would make a fabulous development site, and the listed rooms next to the registrar's office could be a really popular civic ceremony venue. The ruling group have decided however to instead give the building (valued at a couple of million in the books) to the Town Council for nothing, together with a "dowry" of c.£1.2m and unspecified contributions towards maintenance over the next few years. On a similar theme, a deal is being concluded to grant a valuable extension to the private leaseholders of the Abingdon shopping centre for a further 200 years, at a reduced rent. The value of this gift is just under £2m. In return the leaseholders have given assurances that they will refurbish the centre (which it is in their interest to do anyway as it will result in higher rents for them). I bleated that these deals did not give the ratepayers of the Vale best value for their assets, but my protests went unheeded. Readers will form their own view. My last contribution could hardly not include an item on bins – several villages have been experiencing damage from the large collection vehicles to grass verges, and my splendid shadow waste colleague (and member for neighbouring Harwell) Reg Waite has been taking the contractor to task over this. There have been discrepancies between the records of the contractor's collection visits and the incidents of damage, which has put officers in a difficult position. Bearing in mind the somewhat erratic collection patterns over the winter, this strikes me as hardly surprising, however if readers do see damage



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to their verges from the lorries, I would urge them to record the incident, ideally with a witness, as the contract manager has difficulty in taking the word of local residents over that of the contractor's operatives.

Finally to say I have very much enjoyed my tenure as your elected representative for the past few years, and I hope I have made a small contribution to both the proper running of the council (although this has been challenging, as an opposition member) and appropriately represented the ward. It will be an interesting election in May – our local vote is likely to reflect national issues as much as council matters I think.

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
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East Hendred Community Centre

A number of operations are in hand to restore and where possible improve the facilities at Snells Hall. These have involved redecoration of the Main Hall, including resurfacing both the stage and Gallery floors and repairing minor damages sustained during a wide range of activities. A minor but necessary change has been to replace the fragile dust covers over the warm air ducts in the Main Hall by specially prepared 5mm thick stainless steel grilles. These are designed to withstand the weight of an adult sitting on a chair placed directly over them, which previously had destroyed several covers and was a safety concern. The roof over the Committee Room also has needed attention (stripping down and retiling) to eliminate a recurring leak that was causing damage to the ceiling.

We are now concentrating our attention on attempting to renovate the Hall's rather outdated toilet facilities. This will involve installing new low level toilet suites in both the male and female W.Cs, exchanging the unsightly stainless steel male urinals for individual porcelain units, improving the wash basins and having hot air hand dryers in place of the present untidy paper towels. To meet the anticipated (high!) costs application has been made to several external grant making bodies to supplement the local support already received from EHE and the East Hendred Parish Council.

We were sorry to learn that the Brownie Pack ceased to meet this year due to the lack of girls of the relevant ages. The Youth Club also has been disbanded for the time being mainly because of the lack of trained leaders. We would like to emphasise and express our appreciation for all the dedicated hard work of those who have been involved with young people over many years.

Community First Responders

A successful first meeting of those interested in setting up a Community First Response Team in the village was held in Snells Hall on 26th January. Twelve individuals have shown an interest in taking the next steps to becoming fully qualified First Responders. The course will be held over a weekend and run by South Central Ambulance Service. The role of a First Responder is to go to an emergency in the local area, to offer assistance until the ambulance arrives. For someone having a heart attack or stroke time is of the essence and the sooner help arrives, the better the survival rate. The group would not be used for every emergency and certainly not for road traffic accidents. Once you have dialled 999 the ambulance services are immediately dispatched but if they are coming from Oxford that takes time. The emergency services would then call out a local first responder to go to the scene to help until the paramedics arrive. As well as those involved in the training we will need a team prepared to raise funds. Each kit, containing a defibrillator, costs nearly £2000.00. We will then have maintenance costs on top of that. We have been very fortunate in that we have already received some funding and other fund raising ideas are in the planning stage but others will be required, as we would like to end up with more than one kit. 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
A Nice, Safer Walk To School

Hendred Twinning Group

The next visit to Sarceaux in Normandy will be over the weekend of July 1st. – 4th., 2011. We leave by coach from the Plough, East Hendred, in early evening of the Friday, crossing to Le Havre on the overnight ferry and arriving at our destination about 10 a.m. All food, accommodation and entertainment in Sarceaux is organised and paid for by our hosts and their Twinning Association. We stay with French families in their own homes, and we know from previous experience that their hospitality is always very generous. The Oxfordshire Big Carbon Challenge

Following our runner's up prize in last year's OSCAs (Oxfordshire Sustainability and Conservation Awards), Hendreds Environment Group has decided to take on the Oxfordshire Big Carbon Challenge. We are pitting ourselves against similar groups from around Oxfordshire to reduce carbon emissions at an individual and a community level. We've only got till June to do it, and to show how we're going to keep it up in the future. Right now, as I write, we are into our first series of *Carbon Conversations* workshops. Twelve of us, led by Sarah James and Mhairi MacGillivray-Edwards, are committing to calculating how big our personal carbon footprints really are, and to making plans to reduce them significantly by looking at the areas of home energy use, travel and transport, food and water, and consumer goods and services. We will be running further *Carbon Conversations* courses in the future. We are also already working with Hendreds Pre-School to support its Eco Action Plan and we will be working with Hendreds Primary School to support sustainable travel to school. We now have a selection of resources available to lend to people. They include books about travel, energy efficient homes, water conservation and how to 'Carbon Detox', as well as smart meters to monitor electricity consumption in real time. News from the Churches

We're now in the season of **Lent**, and there have been **Discussion Groups** running at the Rectory on Tuesday evenings and Wednesday lunchtimes, and **Stations of the Cross** every Friday at 7:30pm at St Mary's church until 15th April - all Christians are welcome.

Holy Week and Easter are the busiest seasons in the Church year and this year is no exception. In preparation, the service at St Mary's on Sunday 10th April is a Quiet Mass, with no music, and on Saturday 16th April at 11:00am there's a **Lent Reconciliation Service** at St Mary's. **Palm Sunday** falls on 17th April, with our traditional procession through the village. Meet in front of Hendred House at 10:00am to collect your palm cross, then join the walk to St Mary's church, where the service will be shared by both congregations as a gesture of ecumenical solidarity.

There will be services across the Benefice throughout **Holy Week**, with Eucharists on **Monday** 18th April in St Augustine's at 7.30pm and on **Tuesday** 19th April at 7:30pm in Ardington. **Wednesday** 20th April, also at 7.30pm, will see the very atmospheric candlelit service of Tenebrae in Holy Trinity, West Hendred, recalling Jesus' hours of darkness in a service of short readings, prayers, music and silence. On **Maundy Thursday** (21st April) at 7:30pm in St Augustine's there will be the Eucharist of the Last Supper with footwashing and stripping of the altars. This is a moving re-enactment of Jesus' Last Supper before his arrest in the garden of Gethsemane, in which actions will speak more powerfully than words. At St Mary's, the Maundy Thursday service will be at 8:00pm.

On **Good Friday**, 22nd April, there'll be the traditional walk of witness across the whole Benefice for everybody who would like to join in - come for as much or as little as you can manage. The walk begins at 8.30am with Morning Prayer at West Hendred, followed by a child-friendly Family Service at 10:00am in Ardington, with hot cross buns and coffee in the Loyd Lindsay Rooms afterwards. 
WALKING GROUP
