# **Big Carbon Awards for Hendreds Environment Group**

Hendreds Environment Group (HEG) and their Carbon Conversations group have done well in the Oxfordshire Big Carbon Challenge competition, winning one category and coming runners up in another.

At the prize giving ceremony, held in Oxford on the 13<sup>th</sup> June, HEG won '*The group demonstrating the most inspiring community engagement strategy*' and were second placed in '*The group that cut its carbon footprint the most*'.



A treasured possession of East Hendred is the 19<sup>th</sup> century fire pump which was purchased by the Parish Overseers in 1831 after several serious fires in the village. The overseers had their own fire brigade with a captain and an engineer. It is horse drawn with shafts for one horse. It has four wheels (wooden with metal tyres) and designed to pass through a domestic doorway. The pump is worked by hand from both sides with a pumping team of at least two. Suction and delivery hoses are fabricated from leather with copper rivets. Although there are several other old fire pumps in existence the East Hendred pump is unusual in that not only being old, it has retained much of the associated equipment, e.g. copper hose lance, wooden raking tools and several leather buckets.

The prizes were:

The group demonstrating the most inspiring community engagement strategy: Hendreds Environment Group-£450

The group that cut its carbon footprint the most: The second placed group: Hendreds Environment Group - 5.2 tonnes total cut: £250

The carbon footprint reduction achieved by Hendreds Environment Group was the impressive collective effort of their first Carbon Conversations group. Carbon Conversations is a series of six friendly, practical meetings to help people understand and reduce their carbon footprints. HEG will be running the next local Carbon Conversations course from September. As this award shows, small groups of people can get together and make a difference.



In the past the fire pump has had many homes in the village. However in 2004 it was moved to a new home in the grounds of Snells Hall.

East Hendred Heritage Trust played a major part in restoring the pump and organised the building in the Snells Hall grounds and has since been responsible for its upkeep. The Trust no longer has the financial resources to maintain the fire pump. In particular it is thought that a new building (central in the village) is required which would enable both more people to see the pump and give it more protection from the weather. Following a meeting between the Council and the Trust it is suggested that a new organisation be set up to manage the fire pump. Anyone interested in being involved please contact John Sharp (Parish Council) and Sonia Roberts (Hendred Trust). We believe that it is important that the fire pump has continuing support from the village.

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## Parish Council News

# chair

This year four members of the Parish Council have retired. I would like to thank all of them for their contributions to Council business over the last few years. Particular thanks, however, to Sue Roberts, one of our longest serving Councillors, first elected in 1981 – thirty years serving the village is quite an achievement. As well as being an active member of several Working Groups she also managed the adverts for the Bulletins, which now provide over 50% of the Bulletin costs. She was appointed Deputy Chair of the Council in 2010. Edward Eyston resigned due to pressures of work, but has said that he will continue to liaise with the Council over issues affecting the Hendred Estate. He was also the Council representative on NAG (Neighbourhood Action Group) and we hope he will continue in this role. Margaret Pill was a very active member of the Amenities Group, being responsible for managing the lengthman's time, but has had to resign due to ill health. Tony Ford resigned as he is due to leave the village shortly having sold his house. We have also lost Terry Fraser who represented the Hendred Ward for many years as a District Councillor. Many thanks to them all. We welcome our new Parish and **District Councillors and look** forward to their contributions to Council business.

We hear more and more about the Localism Bill but its details will not be fully known until later this year when it goes through Parliament. It is expected to get Royal Assent early in 2012. New responsibilities are promised for Parish Councils but we will see what these involve and whether the funds to make them happen will be available. The development of a neighbourhood plan could have several benefits for this village and we are watching the requirements and timescale closely. Congratulations to two village activities this time. We are pleased to see the Hendred Vineyard getting top prizes for its 2010 wines, beating off strong competition from other UK producers. The Hendreds Environment Group has also done very well in the recent Carbon Challenge Competition organised by the ORCC. It was the winning group in demonstrating the most inspiring community engagement strategy and runner-up for the group that cut its carbon footprint the most, with an impressive cut of 5.2 tonnes total (only 0.2 tonnes behind the winner). The addition of new pieces of adult exercise equipment in the Penney Playpark is very welcome, particularly as they are to benefit the older members of the village (but I expect the younger ones will use them as well). Many thanks to Mary Thomas who succeeded in getting the funding for this equipment. John Sharp

# A Skate Park for East Hendred?



Skateboards, scooters, BMX bikes and in-line roller blades provide a lot of exercise and fun (and some bruises!) Proper skate parks shaped into curved slopes and ramps provide challenge and excitement that goes far beyond what can be done on roads and pavements, which are the only places where people in East Hendred can ride today. Recently a group of young lads went round the village with a petition for a skate park in East Hendred and collected over 100 signatures supporting the idea. They also contacted Maverick Industries, which has built many skateboard parks around the UK, and Maverick provided the Parish Council with a preliminary design and (gulp!) a quote.

Some towns have huge skate parks; ours would have to be smaller because of the cost. A proper skate park, built of concrete to last many years, providing low noise with minimum maintenance, costs a lot of money. The quote for the park illustrated (called a "Mini Ramp" and measuring about 9.5 x 7.5 metres) is £38,000.

The PC would seek grants to cover as much of the cost as possible, but a project of that size can only be undertaken with the wholehearted support of the community. Enclosed with this Bulletin is a questionnaire to find out the level of support that this idea has among local residents and to gauge how much we could expect a skate park to be used. # **Bus Updates**

The X32 to Didcot and Oxford now operates hourly on Sunday. This serves Rowstock and the Harwell Campus, but not East Hendred village. It is in addition to the existing Sunday 32A between Abingdon/Didcot and Wantage/Grove which does serve East Hendred. The contracts for the subsidised bus services (the 32 and 32A; other services are not subsidised) are currently under review and the parish council is campaigning to maintain the existing level of service, in particular to ensure that villagers can still reach their Health Centre in Wantage directly as well as local jobs and shops 7 days a week. Thames Travel were recently bought out by the Go-Ahead Group, who also own the Oxford Bus Company, but this will not impact on our local bus services.

The Plusbus scheme has been extended to Didcot. This allows rail ticket holders to purchase a Plusbus ticket giving one day's unlimited travel within a certain area using participating bus operators. For Didcot, this area extends as far as West Hendred and can be used on the 32 and X32, but not the 32A, 34 or X36. It costs £2 (£1.30 with a railcard) and can currently only be purchased from a ticket office but will also be available for phone and online sales from August. Unfortunately, it cannot be bought on the bus.

# **East Hendred Community Centre**

Rob and Hayley, our present Wardens, are giving up this position at the end of July. The Management Committee is advertising the vacancy locally and nationally (replies have been received even from overseas!) and has interviewed several interested applicants already and is in process of reviewing several more. We hope to make new appointments in the next few weeks.

We have now received the promise of grants from the Vale of White Horse District Council, to supplement those from East Hendred Entertains and East Hendred Parish Council, towards the projected improvements to toilet facilities at the Hall. Applications are also being made to Oxfordshire County Council via Oxfordshire Rural Community Council and WREN for funds. If these are successful it may be possible to start the renovation before the end of this year.

The Hall's regular income has been set back by the unfortunate closure of the Brownies and the Youth Club together with the pantomime sabbatical by Springline this year. There was also a significant increase in electricity charges from May 1st. Unless we are able to stimulate more weekend bookings in the future, it will almost certainly be necessary to increase charges for all users by at least 10%. We are seeking additional bookings and would welcome further ideas for improving the situation.



# **New Councillors**

This May there were elections across the country for new Parish Councillors. For East Hendred there were only 8 candidates standing for 9 places so there was no election. The candidates included Bogdan Nedelkoff, Mark Beddow and Sarah James, who all became Councillors for the first time in May. They joined the five members who were already Councillors. Of these only two, John Sharp and Charles Pappenheim, stood for the previous election in 2007.

Bogdan is an architect who has lived in the village since 1985, with a practice in Wantage. He has been involved in several village projects, including as the architect of the Millennium extension to Snells Hall. Sarah is the main driving force behind the East Hendred Environment Group; she has a young family and works at the Rutherford Appleton Laboratory. Mark is also a long time village resident, coming to the village in 1980. He is an electrical engineer and also a trustee of Snells Hall.

As required the remaining seat on the Council was advertised and there were two applicants, both residents of West Rowstock. As reported in the last Bulletin, West Rowstock became part of East Hendred parish this year. Felicity Jones was elected to fill the vacancy at the June Parish Council meeting. Felicity organized the petition that led to the boundary change bringing West Rowstock from Milton parish to East Hendred. She will provide valuable input to the Council, particularly on the issues that affect this new part of our parish.

We have a new District Councillor as well – welcome to Bill Jones who was elected in May together with Mike Murray as the two Councillors covering this ward. Bill has been attending recent Council meetings and we look forward to working with him over the coming years.

At the May meeting of the Parish Council John Sharp was re-elected as Chairman and Charles Pappenheim as Deputy Chairman.

# **Terry Fraser**

Terry Fraser lost his seat at the May election having been our District Councillor for many years. He was a regular attender at Parish Council meetings and a strong supporter of many village activities, for example helping to get grants from the District Council and other bodies. We would like to thank him for all his work and effort on behalf of the village.

# **Message From District Councillor Mike Murray**

Railway news this month. At the end of a rather soggy open gardens afternoon, I was delighted to be spontaneously (and unofficially) invited to inspect the signal box in Steventon, accompanied by four small, excited children. Readers may or may not be aware that the level crossings at Steventon are due to become unmanned, and the signalling moved to Swindon, and then Didcot. This will mean that the Steventon crossing box will close, and is due to be demolished in December 2011. Apparently there will some road closures prior to this, more news as it becomes available.

Bins (of course) - still some problems with the reconciliation of the list of who has paid for brown bins at the council, and who gets collected, again if you suffer from this please let me know. Another issue has arisen relating to bin lorries ac-



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cessing private roads. This is becoming an increasing problem across the country, as contractors' insurance policies make it increasingly difficult (apparently) for them to travel onto private roads to collect rubbish or to empty wheelie bins. The solution for this is for the residents that are responsible for / use the private road to indemnify the Council, and contractors, as to damage or loss caused by virtue of the road not being adopted. This currently takes the form of an (in my view) unacceptably onerous indemnification letter to be signed by all resident of the road in question. My splendid colleague Reg Waite is working hard on this far from perfect situation, and we are hopeful that a better solution will be found soon. In the interim it should be noted that the contractor's record of which roads are adopted and which are not, is fortunately incomplete ....

# **Awards For Hendred Vineyard**



Steve and Viviane Callaghan moved into Hendred Vineyard in April 2007. Some say they were mad, most knew they were. Four vintages later the vineyard has significantly modernised both planting and wine making methods but many of the original features and characteristics have also been retained. The UK Vineyards Association competition is the annual benchmark for the UK's 400 odd vineyards. In the Callaghans' first year they were awarded a 'Highly commended' certificate for their signature Dry White Wine

'Furlong'. The following year saw them rewarded with a Bronze medal with Furlong and Burydown received awards at a regional competition. This year

has seen their best result ever with three medals from the UKVA competition which was held in early june; Furlong 2010 won Silver, as did Hendred Brut, their traditional method sparkling wine 2008 vintage, and the new Rockpit Rose made from the new Pinot Noir plantings was awarded a Bronze medal. There are regular free tastings at the vineyard, the next one being from 2-4 pm on Saturday 30th July. Your local vineyard needs you. Come along!

Through the hard work of volunteers from both villages 21 bags of rubbish were collected, of which 12 could be recycled. ### **Cycle Route**

The Science Vale Cycle Network is a proposed network of cycle routes linking towns, villages and workplaces in the area. Of particular interest to East Hendred and Rowstock is Hubble Way: Wantage to Milton Park. This would link Grove and Wantage to Ardington, West Hendred, East Hendred and Rowstock, and then on to Milton Park via Hungerford track. At Hungerford track it would also meet Hawking Way: Abingdon to Harwell Campus. Hendreds Environment Group has heard the comment many times: "What we need is a cycle route." Most often this is in reference to getting between West Hendred and Ardington, a real sticking point locally for bikes and pushchairs with obstacles on all direct routes. So recently Hendreds Environment Group started asking people if they would support a campaign to link our villages with a direct cycle route and we've had a great response already. Even more recently we learnt that Oxfordshire County Council have included the Science Vale Cycle Network in a bid to the Government's Sustainable Travel Fund, making it all the more important that we show local support for a cycle route at this time. # London to Brighton

Martin Johnson of Hendred Stores cycled from London to Brighton on Sunday 19<sup>th</sup> June to raise funds for British Heart Foundation.

Sunday started with an alarm call at 4-30am, and it was a quick splash of cold water to the face, (I didn't fancy the shower), my breakfast of cold pasta, and off on the bike to catch my coach to Clapham. I must say, running a newsagent's for a couple of years prepares you for the early start! The coach eventually dropped us off at the designated dropping off point, about three miles from Clapham Common, so we had a nice warm up before the start. Top marks to the B.H.F. for organisation – there were marshalls at every junction, so it was impossible to get lost.

I eventually got away at 8-41am, and immediately got into trouble. Several thousand bikes had been funnelled through the starting gate by the time I got there, and the grass had been chewed up into a lovely clinging patch of mud. I got stuck. Along with many more, I started the event by carrying my bike off the common until we hit the tarmac.

No amount of road training around sleepy East Hendred could have prepared me for what the mean streets of London threw my way. I was in a group of probably two hundred, and everyone was desperately trying to beat the next set of lights, which seemed to be only yards apart. Into the fray enter buses – they all seemed to be driven by wide eyed individuals who in my opinion were either half blind, half drunk, or half crazy. They seemed to take delight in revving their engines, creating clouds of black diesel fumes. Fortunately, after a few hair-raising miles, we were out of it, and into the open countryside. This was more like it.

The ride up to now had been fairly easy, any hills had been gentle and not too long, but then I had my first real test, a long, steep hill. I was determined that I would stay on, but by the time I had reached the top I was ready for oxygen. Luckily, the route isn't too unkind, and following every ascent there is a descent, so for the next couple of minutes I freewheeled and had a chance to get my breath back. The next few miles, despite having a few ups and downs, were fairly straightforward, and cycling was a real joy, with pretty villages, open common land, isolated pubs, and lots of goodhearted banter among the riders. The next test was Turners Hill, a really long and fairly steep ascent, but with a beautiful little village by the same name at the top. The village had decided to make it a carnival type affair, with stalls, barbeques, brass bands etc, and I was almost tempted to "bide a while". Instead I ate my banana during the descent.

Knowing I was over half way there at this point seemed to give me second wind, and the next fifteen miles or so passed very quickly, and easily. But then, where there had been chat and banter, laughter and even singing, there was now silence. Ahead of us, so tall it hurt my neck to look at the top, stood the beast that is... Ditchling Beacon. She rises from 90 metres above sea level to over 248, in just over a mile. The narrow lane we were on had several twists and turns so you couldn't even get a run at it. I knew that I wouldn't pedal the whole thing, and my training schedule had included power-walking uphill, but I was determined to give it my best shot. I went at it like a man possessed. After 300 metres I was standing on the pedals, but still going. My respiration rate had risen dramatically. And then I saw the sign that told me "Ditchling Beacon starts in 200 metres".

Like almost everybody else, I dismounted and walked to the top. From here the views are breathtaking: to the north the beautiful Wealds, and to the south over Brighton and the English Channel. Time for a quick call to my support team who were waiting in Brighton, and then began the descent, almost five miles totally downhill, getting up to almost 40 mph (and being overtaken by the serious cyclists who were still pedalling). The last mile or so levelled out, and I was suddenly confronted by thousands, cheering, clapping, waving flags. All through the ride I had been thinking about my finish – it was to be a real stand up, lean forward sprint – I was going to milk this. I cruised down the Drive, one hand on the handle bars, the other waving regally to the crowds. The whole thing had been fantastic, but the last two minutes were absolutely amazing.
