#### The Jubilee Beacon

The Hendreds' Jubilee beacon was one of a chain of more than 4200, stretching around the world on Monday 4<sup>th</sup> June 2012.

The procession started at Snells Hall, East Hendred and walked via West Hendred through Ginge, where 100 wax



torches were lit and the lead was taken in great style by piper John West, up the track to Knob Hill. Those who couldn't face the final steep climb were carried in trailers driven by Gordon Pill and Julian Gold. Others parked at Scutchamer's Knob and walked along the Ridgeway. About 400 people watched the beacon being lit at 10:15pm by the chairmen of East and West Hendred, and with huge flames leaping up and a full moon, it was a magnificent sight.

The beacon was organised by Richard Evans, who inspired the rest of the team with his enthusiasm, and delivered a safe, suc-

cessful event. Many thanks to Gordon Pill, who allowed the beacon to be built on his land – a wonderful location with a view over much of Oxfordshire – and also assisted with building the beacon. Also to Richard Tingley, whose fire lighting skills ensured the beacon flared into life despite the previous day's downpour. And thanks to everyone who offered wood for the fire; you were so generous that we couldn't take it all!
