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### Parish Council News

# chair

Planning remains a key topic for the Parish Council, as can be seen from later items in this Bulletin. We spoke recently at the Oxfordshire County Council Planning meeting on the planned new store for radioactive waste at Harwell, but failed to get future imported waste from Winfrith excluded. We have also commented on the plan to build 120 houses on the Harwell campus, adjacent to our parish. We are receiving 3-4 planning applications each month affecting the village, requiring comment. The Council has also recently revisited the action plans concerning housing from the 2008 Parish Plan. Although these plans have generally been adhered to it was felt at the last Council meeting that we should

draw up a check list against which all new planning applications would be tested. Of particular note was an action plan to concentrate on encouraging smaller houses in the village. Most applications tend to include larger houses as it is one way to optimise the financial return from a site, and they sell well, but may not benefit the village. We shall be taking action to make the local planners aware that the village needs smaller houses. We are still trying to find a suitable site for more affordable housing, as the survey undertaken by ORCC indicated that the village need was for a total of 10-12 houses of this type, but only 4 have been built to date.

Of particular note is the very recently published Vale Draft Local Plan to cover the period up till 2029. The background to this is the National Planning Policy Framework which was introduced last year. This plan when finalised will set the criteria against which all local planning applications will be judged and hence is very important. The Councillors will be attending local exhibitions to apprise themselves of what is proposed, so that we can comment by the May deadline. These exhibitions are also open to villagers. Please attend one of them if you can, and let the Council have your feedback.

We welcome Martin Simmonds who joined the Parish Council in February to fill the advertised vacancy. Martin lives in the block of houses on the north side of the A417,works locally and has a particular interest in planning issues affecting the village.

We are grateful to Anne Pappenheim who has edited this Bulletin, in the absence of a new editor. We still need an editor to keep this long running newsletter in print – see box on front page.

## **New Local Plan**

The Vale District Council has recently issued a new draft Local Plan covering the period to 2029. This is one of the key planning policy documents designed to help guide decisions that will be made about developments in the district over the next 15 years. The draft issued is Part 1 concerned with Strategic Sites and Policies. There will be a number of public exhibitions in the area to enable residents to see the details proposed and discuss them with officers at the exhibition. The deadline for comments to be received is by the 9th May.

The Parish Council will review this document in detail and assess how it will affect this parish, which is considered as a "Larger village". An initial examination indicates that in terms of specific development or employment sites none is proposed for this village and future development will be limited to satisfying local needs and to supporting employment within local communities. A detailed response to the Vale Council will be made on this and other issues affecting East Hendred by the deadline.

A short presentation on this Plan and how it affects East Hendred will be given at the Parish Council's annual meeting on April 23rd.

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## What is a Parish Council?

Councillor Sarah James clears up some common confusion about what the term 'Parish Council' means.

Parish and Town Councils are the most local level of local government. 'Parish' refers to the civil parish, with a boundary set in much the same way as any other government boundary, like MPs' seats and local government wards. They are not connected to a parish church.

Parish or town councillors are elected every four years. The number of councillors varies considerably from a minimum of five, depending on how big the parish electorate is. East Hendred Parish Council has nine councillors.

If you are thinking, "But I don't remember voting for the parish council" that will be because the last election was uncontested. Eight councillors stood for the nine places, so no vote was held. This is not uncommon at parish council level. If, as happened in East Hendred, the council is short of councillors, either following an uncontested election or if a councillor resigns during the four-year term, the vacancy must be formally advertised and if enough voters request it a by-election will be held. If not, the Council itself advertises for and then co-opts a new councillor. Parish Council elections are only run every 4 years.

Parish councillors are unpaid volunteers, but parish councils do employ staff. As a minimum, they will employ a clerk. East Hendred Parish Council employs four part-time members of staff: a clerk, a finance officer, a village lengthman (grounds maintenance) and a litter picker. Some towns and more populated parishes will have several, full-time staff.

Parish councils have tax-raising powers and a small proportion of parishioners' council tax goes to their local parish or town council. It should tell you how much on the bill.

As a public body, the parish council must be open about its spending and decisions. Agendas for parish council meetings must be published at least three days before the meeting, so that the public can make an informed decision about whether or not they should attend. Minutes of each meeting must be agreed and signed off as an accurate record at the following meeting, and then published.

The East Hendred Parish Council noticeboards are by the phone box in East Hendred and by the bus stop lay-by west of the roundabout in Rowstock. We also publish agendas and minutes on our website at www.hendred.org.

Anyone is welcome to attend our meetings, which are at 8pm on the second Tuesday of each month, in the gallery at Snells Hall.

Contacts for all councillors and the clerk are at the back of this Bulletin. Parishioners are welcome to contact any of us. If in doubt, contact the clerk.

## **Additional Playground Equipment**

Certain Parish Councillors had so much fun testing Harwell playground's new zip wire that they thought East Hendred should have one too.

We are aware that while there is play equipment for primary school children in two playgrounds in the village, there isn't anything for older children. The lack of facilities for older children and teenagers was highlighted in the parish plan, and we are on the look-out for ways to address this in the parish.

With this in mind, the Parish Council is seeking grants from several sources to provide a zip wire facility in the Penney playground area.

We have just heard that our grant application to Oxfordshire County Council has been successful. If a second grant request is also successful it is hoped that the zip wire can be in place by the autumn.



## Store for Intermediate Level Waste

the background to the application for a new store for Intermediate Level waste in this parish, on the Harwell site. In short, it is necessary to store intermediate level waste from Harwell, Winfrith (Dorset) and Culham, and Research Sites Restoration Ltd (RSRL) wishes to do this at Harwell. The waste is likely to remain on site until at least 2050.

The Parish Council submitted its comments to the County Council and, although not objecting to the new store March 4th the chairman of the Parish of this waste store.

Previous bulletins have explained for Harwell waste (as the waste is Council (John Sharp) presented the already on site), did raise serious concerns about bringing in waste from the Winfrith site. We considered that the case for this had not been made, particularly as the draft Oxfordshire Minerals and Waste Core Strategy policy required a justification for bringing in waste from outside the County. We argued that were other sites where the Winfrith waste could be stored.

Parish Council's case. Several speakers from RSRL and the Nuclear Decommissioning Agency argued that the store was required for both Harwell and Winfrith waste. Following discussion by members of the Committee, a vote was taken and two voted to exclude the Winfrith waste whilst the remaining members voted to accept the new store and Winfrith waste. ## Annual Precept

Each year the Council reviews its expenditure and prepares a budget for the coming year. This is used as a basis for setting the village precept. The main items of Council expenditure are employee costs (lengthman, clerk etc), insurance, the Bulletin, playground maintenance and limited grants to village organisations.

The Council decided at the January meeting to set a local precept of £25,250 which represents a 2.5% increase on the previous year. All of this will be spent on local facilities and support services.

## Traffic Problems affecting this Parish

The traffic issues with the high density of traffic on the A417 are increasingly important. As part of a recent planning application for new houses to the north of the A417 the comment from the Council's Highways Department indicated that the A417 was "close to capacity" in the vicinity of our village. This was the argument they used to object to a proposed mini-roundabout at the top of White Road which was part of the planning application and could have improved access to the main road. New planned developments in Wantage, particularly the Crab Hill

Development of 1500 houses to the east, can only increase further the high density of traffic on this road at certain times of the day with increasingly difficult access problems for local motorists, cyclists and pedestrians.

Our County Councillor (lain Brown) is keeping us informed of potential improvements to the road but in our view these are unlikely to happen in the near future. We will continue to press for improvements to this road to alleviate the significant access problems, particularly at the morning and late afternoon rush hours.

## Proposed Development at South Drive, Harwell Campus

There is a current planning application for 120 houses to be built on the Harwell Campus site, in the Harwell parish but adjacent to the East Hendred parish. There are a number of large ex-RAF houses on this site at present (some boarded up); the plan it to demolish these and build 120 new houses in this vicinity, of which it is expected that 40% will be "affordable". The Parish Council has commented that the provision of this affordable housing is very welcome and may be able to benefit our parish, where we have an established need, confirmed by a survey.

It is noted in the Council comments that that the Icknield Way borders the northern boundary to the application

site. This is part of the cycle route from East Hendred to the Harwell site and the Council would hope that the surface can be upgraded as part of the development.

We have also registered concern on the likely effects of more traffic on the A4185 with residents accessing Didcot station, Milton Park, and other local employment sites. This increased traffic will also put more pressure on Rowstock roundabout which is already very busy at certain times of the day.

This development is part of a larger 400 house development planned in this general area and the Council has highlighted that it is important that any traffic mitigation measures take this larger development into account.

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## **Snells Hall Management Committee**

We are now able to proceed with renovating the Main Hall floor. This will involve sanding and sealing the surface the hall booking fees by the cost of living index this year. and painting the skirting board and beading. Richard Cleary, the contractor, will be working during the Easter weekend period from 27<sup>th</sup> March to 4<sup>th</sup> April, when the Hall has been kept free of bookings. The Hall Committee would like to thank East Hendred Entertains for providing a very welcome grant which will go towards meeting the cost of this project.

It has been decided to have a larger area of the Hall main car park repaired than previously envisaged. Inevitably this has increased the cost of the process considerably and several quotations are being sought before any work can be started.

The Committee has not yet decided whether to increase Three of the major items of expenditure, viz heating, insurance and fire equipment have been stabilized and there is a cushion of profit made in 2012 due to extra bookings and lower expenditure compared with 2011. Obviously it would be appreciated by our users if the fees were not increased during this period of general financial hardship. So watch this space!

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
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## The Green Column

#### **Snells Woodland News**

Hendreds Environment Group and volunteers look after the Snells Woodland between Penney Playpark and Fordy Lane. We have planted 50 hazel trees and our regular work parties have reduced hugely the presence of invasive Himalayan Balsam.

Spring Flowers: The snowdrops have been flowering for some weeks, and the wild garlic flowers are just getting going. The ground has been really boggy, under standing water a lot of the time. The boardwalk has proved its



usefulness this winter as a ground level path would have be unusable for months.



Sycamores Due for Coppicing: Three closely spaced sycamore stands are due for coppicing in the next year. Coppicing means cutting trees right

back almost to the ground, and then leaving them to regrow. Stands are multi-trunked trees, and result from coppicing. So these have almost certainly been coppiced in the past.

For a couple of thousand years this was how most British woodland was managed, the wood produced being used for making tools, fencing and utensils. It provides a much more varied habitat than unmanaged woodland, and one that our native woodland plants and animals are adapted to. These benefits for wildlife are the main reasons for reintroducing it here.

Litter Problem: In the last few months Snells Woodland has for the first time become the victim of repeated littering, mainly lots of blue soft-drink pots, and also a spate of disposable gloves. This litter is a hazard to wildlife and a repeat nuisance to clean up. We've collected well over a hundred drink cartons in the

woodland in the last few months. The photo shows just 1 week's litter. Please let us or one of our community police officers know if you see someone chucking litter in this area.

He is also very willing to help with extra jobs the Parish Council ask him to do on occasion. On snowy days, he salts the most essential paths in the village.

Think of Brian when your dog does his business - please clear up - it is not pleasant for him to have to deal with this. If you see any problems around the village, you can always mention them to Brian – he will alert a Parish Councillor to see what can be done.


So, if you see Brian working, a cheerful greeting or even the offer of a cup of tea would always be welcome!

## The History of Hendreds Pre-School 1963-2013



Did you know that Hendreds Pre-school celebrates its 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary this year? Back in 1963, a few mums thought it would be a great idea to start a playgroup where children could play with others and give parents a brief reprieve and after rigorous vetting it was agreed that a start could be made. Hendreds Playgroup opened its doors for the first time in the village hall that used to be in Cat Street and the children who were part of the first intake are now

#### celebrating their 53rd birthdays!

Children were from the local villages and one little boy was put on the bus in Ardington and a mum used to meet the bus at The Plough and later send him home on the return bus. One week he did not arrive and the mum meeting him was very concerned. As the family were not 'on the phone' she went to Ardington where it transpired that his mother had broken her leg and was not able to contact anyone to say her son wasn't coming. It is hard to imagine 21st contury mume being propared

hard to imagine 21<sup>st</sup> century mums being prepared to put their three-year-old on a bus alone!

The first Accident Book was a simple red school exercise book and the one book dates from 1968 – 1990! In 1984 a child tripped off the trampoline, hit her head and passed out! She was given a cuddle and mum was called. I imagine that it would be a very different scenario these days.

The pre-school was very nomadic in its early years and moved to Kings Manor barn and then found its way to the Roman Catholic Club Room. It moved to Snells Hall in 1974 after the hall's conversion. From late 1982 the pre-school was accommodated at Hendreds Primary School. This created a close relationship with the school who didn't even charge rent. In 1994 Maria Nedelkoff became supervisor. At the end of that year, the comfortable relationship had to come to an end as the school was expanding.


The pre-school needed a permanent home and the committee decided to raise £30,000 to purchase a Portacabin. While this money was being raised, they moved to the old West Hendred Village Hall which was dilapidated and damp. Numbers at preschool dwindled as parents felt it was inconvenient to travel to West Hendred. The list of woes continued with lack of storage and parents not paying their fees. A particularly low moment must have been when the supervisor reported that mice were at large!

Parents were fundraising hard to finance the Portacabin; however at the end of 1995 the committee heard that Snells Hall had to become accessible to the disabled and they were applying for a grant to ensure the building complied. It seemed an ideal opportunity to combine financial resources and work together and build an annexe for the pre-school. Parents continued to bake cakes, sell raffle tickets, hold barn dances and write 'begging letters' to raise funds. Architect Bogdan Nedelkoff spent long hours at the drawing board and then was out with a shovel as well. Other parents worked hard to finish

the building for the grand opening on 21<sup>st</sup> March 1998. Finally the village children had their own space and a new era at pre-school began.

## 'The Secret History of St Mary's Road' at Champs Chapel

Working with Jane Parker, an architect and specialist in historic landscapes, EHHT has developed a five year rolling exhibition programme of village history based on the Museum's Interpretation Plan themes of people, places, trades and occupations and religion.

Using the Museum's collections of photographs, maps and artifacts relating to village life over the last 150 years, the exhibition programme will make evident the social history of the village street by street. Each year for five years, a particular zone of the village will be chosen for researching change of land use, identifying trades and occupations, and religious institutions as well people and families historically associated with the specific zone. By comparing the Museum's collection of historic photographs with photographs taken now, and relating the photographs to maps and oral accounts from residents old and young, the exhibits will tell the story of the streets in such a way that the transformation and endurance from the old ways of life to the new will be revealed. The findings will be displayed in the annual exhibition.

The vision of the project is to use the research and the exhibitions as a vehicle for the following:

 to increase awareness of the village heritage amongst residents, many of whom are now new to the village and area, by revealing the social history of the village in a new and stimulating way and showing how it relates to their own lives.

- to create an interactive exhibition with a programme of events that could be used by the two schools in the village to demonstrate how life has changed in the village over the last 150 years.
- to digitalise and catalogue the Museum's significant collection of photographs of the village spanning nearly 100 years.
- to compile an oral record about the social history of the village to back up the photographic/artifact material the Museum possesses, capturing memories and stories from current occupants in the village, as well as those far and wide no longer resident
- to present the museum's collection of artifacts from working and domestic life
- to depict the change in the built environment of the village, from the stone, clunch, thatch, cob, timber frames and weather boarding to the higher tech building methods of newer buildings.

In addition, by cataloguing the collection in such a way as to make it readily accessible online to all users (regular and casual visitors, residents, schools, churches, the many ex-evacuees), the Museum will be creating a living resource which can then be used for a wide range of thematic, educational or artistic endeavours.
