## The Village Emergency Plan

In an emergency, you should first call the Emergency Services (999) and they will normally be able to provide whatever assistance is required. However, there may be times when such a large number of people are affected that the Emergency Services cannot help everyone quickly. The recent power cut after high winds was an inconvenience to all, but if (say) such a power cut came after a heavy snowfall then there could be people in our parish who found themselves in real difficulty through lack of heat, light, fresh food or medication. In this or any other emergency, it would be good to be prepared.

Oxfordshire County Council has asked communities to develop plans to deal with emergency situations such as extreme weather, essential services cut off or roads blocked. East Hendred Parish Council has formed an Emergency Group to develop a plan for the community to help itself in the case of an emergency. The group has a list of priorities and designated Snells Hall as the main reception centre if needed.

Following a system that has been successfully adopted elsewhere, we plan to draw up a list of people who would like someone to check up on them in the case of a general emergency to make sure they are all right. This is entirely voluntary and if you opt to be on the list then you will know in advance who will be contacting you – it will be someone you have met and who lives nearby.

#### Take Part!

The form distributed with this Bulletin is asking for names for two lists. One is for people to register if they would *like to be contacted* in an emergency situation; the other is for people who are willing and able to be the ones who *make the contact* and report back to the Emergency Group if support is needed so it can be arranged. When the forms are returned, people from the two groups will be paired up and can introduce themselves.

If you'd like to take part, please return the form. We hope the system is never needed, but we'd rather be prepared.

#### Parish Council News

## chair Borresontatives of source

Representatives of several local Parish Councils meet together on a regular basis. These include Chilton, Harwell and East Hendred Councils. All share a common interest in the Harwell Oxford site, as all three parish boundaries encompass part of the site. As a result all three Councils are significant players in the local Stakeholder Group (see separate article on page 5), and also Harwell and East Hendred have common interests in local cycle routes and the A417.

There are also planning applications that affect more than one parish. For example the recently approved housing development of over 100 houses at South Drive on the Harwell site is in the Harwell parish but borders the East Hendred one. Both Councils did communicate on their responses. All three parishes also share the same County Councillor.

The future of the A417 is also of common interest to Ardington, West

and East Hendred Councils and chairs of all these three meet from time to time. These partnerships are going to be increasingly important in addressing issues arising from the substantial planned growth of housing in the Wantage/Grove area, the build-up of jobs at Milton and the Harwell site and the problems from lack of existing local infrastructure to support these changes. In general similar concerns expressed by several Councils on current issues do carry more weight at the District and County level.

Elsewhere in the Bulletin there is an article on the preparation of an Emergency Plan for East Hendred. We hope it is not needed but there have been cases in the past with heavy snowfall or long electricity cuts that have led to the village having to look after itself and make provision to cope with any resultant problems. Early preparation will ensure that such local emergency responses are implemented as efficiently as possible.

The Parish Council welcomes two new councillors that have recently been appointed, Fiona Fanthome and Bill Watkin who will bring in their previous experience and be able to increasingly play their part in supporting Council activities. This edition of the Bulletin also includes a profile of the new Parish Councillor Fiona Fanthome which can be found on page 4.

Regular attendants at St. Mary's, Fiona and husband Ewan wish to bring their two boys up with a Catholic faith and the lovely, welcoming congregation at St. Mary's played a key part in their setting down roots here in the Hendreds.

Fiona loves the village and could see the amount of work that people put into keeping things as they are. ## **East Hendred Parish Path Warden**

Public sector budget cuts mean that Oxfordshire is no longer able to do as much as it would like or even as much as it has done in the past on footpath maintenance, and so is calling on volunteer Parish Path Wardens to help. Our new Parish Path warden is Anne Pappenheim, who walks most of East Hendred's footpaths regularly with her dog. From now on, she'll be looking at them rather more closely. Mark Sumner, OCC Field Officer for the area including East Hendred, says that if the volunteers can keep vegetation cut back along paths and particularly around stiles and gates, and report any dangers or obstructions, it will help his team prioritise its workload and get rid of some of the lower priority work that they now have difficulty in dealing with.

Any member of the public can report a problem with a footpath on the interactive online map, but since Anne's being trained in using the map and prioritising issues, it's

probably better if you report problems to her first. Urgent problems are those that are immediately dangerous – eg a rotten bridge, broken stile, or hung up tree that may fall. Other high priority issues include new encroachment onto a path that cannot be easily cleared with secateurs, and seasonal matters such as a path that needs mowing. The urgency assigned by the Field Officer will depend on potential danger and also such things as how well-used the path is and whether it is a strategic route such as a route to school.

As well as passing on urgent issues, Anne will be reporting on the state of our parish paths twice a year, in February and March, to the Field Officer and to the Parish Council. If you spot a problem with a right of way in the parish, please contact Anne on 01235 835014.

## Harwell Oxford: Your stakeholder group

Some people have little knowledge or even interest in the nuclear work that is carried out at Harwell or to give it its correct name Harwell Oxford. Part of the Harwell site is in East Hendred parish.

The Harwell Oxford Campus has evolved over the years from what was once UKAEA Harwell, a well-known nuclear research establishment, into a world-class centre for science, technology and innovation. Much of the site is now occupied by a number of different science and technology organisations, including the Science and Technology Facilities Council and the Diamond Light Source; the latest arrival being the European Space Agency . However nuclear work is still carried out by an organisation called Research Sites Restoration Limited (RSRL). RSRL, which is owned and operated by the Babcock International group, has been tasked with decommissioning its sites at Harwell and Winfrith, on behalf of the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority (NDA), which is a Government funded organisation with responsibility for decommissioning nuclear waste sites across the country.

## **Upgrade to Featherbed Lane**

The County Council are planning to upgrade Featherbed lane, to take traffic on the A417 north before reaching Rowstock. This upgrade was highlighted in the Vale District Council's draft Local Plan to 2029.

We now gather that funding is available for this upgrade earlier than expected and we await the plans as to what is to be done. This will include straightening the "dog-leg" and possibly mini-roundabouts at the junctions on the A417 and the A4130, although the latter has not been confirmed yet. Although the upgrade will benefit users travelling north it will not help the problem of access from our village to the A417. The Council is keeping pressure on the County Council to fully recognise this problem and we understand that a study is underway at the moment on ways in which the A417 from Wantage to The NDA funds Site Stakeholder Groups (SSG) at all the sites it controls and they describe the purpose of an SSG as a standing forum for communications between the NDA, site operators and the local community. It has the overarching aim of ensuring that decisions taken by the NDA or operators that affect NDA sites are informed by the local community's views. Members of the Site Stakeholder Group are from local Councils, and related organisations with interests in activities on the site. East Hendred has had a representative on the group for many years; the current Council representative is John Sharp (chair of the Council) who regularly attends meetings. There are three public meetings each year which are held locally at which RSRL describes its recent work and what it proposes to do in the coming months.

There are also presentations from other organisations, such as the Environment Agency, Office for Nuclear Regulation and the Nuclear Decommissioning Authority. Anyone is welcome to attend and the next meeting is on 6th December at the Electron Building, Fermi Avenue, Harwell Oxford.

Rowstock can be improved. At a recent meeting of Parish Councillors with the Vale District Council the point was made that a proper cycle track would help to prevent cyclists on the A417 holding up lines of traffic as there is not room to pass at peak times.

At a separate meeting with Goodmans (the commercial management organisation for the Harwell Oxford site) the Parish Council was informed that there are other funds available to develop cycleways. Priority will be given to upgrading the Winnaway (track from Harwell site to Harwell village), however the second priority is an improved cycle way from Wantage to the Harwell site, passing close to East Hendred, which could help with the congestion on the A417. Various possible routes are at an early stage of being considered.

## **Changes to the Planning System**

This May the Government introduced measures to increase the scope of development that can be undertaken as so called "Permitted Development". For a period of 3 years householders can build larger single story rear extensions. The length of the extension has doubled from 4m to 8m for detached houses and from 3m to 6m for all other houses. However a homeowner wishing to build a larger single-story rear extension must go through a notification process which includes preparing detailed plans and listing all adjacent properties which will be informed by the District Council to see if they have any objections. Adjoining neighbours have a limited period of 21 days to raise any objections, which will be taken into account by the Local Planning Authority in making its decision on the planned extension. However this relaxation does not apply in Conservation Areas or in Areas Of Outstanding Natural Beauty which excludes most of East Hendred.

There are other changes to which apply to changing offices to residential accommodation, changes of use of agricultural buildings etc. Details of these are on the Vale District Council web site www.whitehorsedc.gov.uk

## **Parish Council Finance**

The Council is preparing its budget for 2014/15, as a request for its annual precept has to be made by the January meeting. Last year the Council precepted for a sum of £25,250, all of which is spent locally. Our main cost is the maintenance of the village, including the costs of the Lengthman (40% of the total).

We also budget for grants to village organisations and would welcome forward information from any organisation planning large grant requests in the coming year. Parish Council grants often help to unlock access to larger funding from other bodies.

## **Change to Village Bus Services**

Thames Travel is revising its network from the 8th December. The new timetable is available to download from <u>www.hendred.org</u> and is posted on the village noticeboard. The main changes are as follows:

- Monday-Saturday: Hourly service 32 renumbered X1, extended from Abingdon to Oxford and will terminate in Wantage instead of Grove. It will also serve Drayton instead of Culham, and continues to serve the Harwell Campus and Didcot.
- Sunday: Two-hourly service 32A renumbered X1 and will operate from Grove via the Hendreds and Didcot to Abingdon instead of Oxford.
- Daily: Two-hourly bus services in the evening, with the last bus in both directions after 2200.

Rowstock will also benefit from the extension of the X32 to Wantage on Mondays to Saturdays, increasing the frequency to half-hourly. The X32 will not stop between Rowstock and West Hendred.

The Parish Council knows that the new timetable will make it much more difficult to travel to the Health Centre in Wantage. There will also be one fewer bus each way in the morning peak. The parish council is surveying users of the affected buses to see whether it is necessary to campaign for a revision to the timetable and Jacqui Francis has organised a petition protesting about the loss of the bus to Grove. Since Thames Travel started operating the route commercially in 2011, without any subsidy or contract from the County Council, it has become difficult to achieve any changes, but we will do what we can. The parish council has long campaigned for evening bus services and it is pleasing that this improvement has occurred. Hopefully, it will encourage people from Wantage or the Harwell campus to enjoy a car-free evening out in our village pubs. As always, these improvements will only remain if they are used.

## Message from our County Councillor

Life has been tough at County Hall as Government cutbacks to the Local Authority Grant meant tough decisions had to be made. However, compared to other Councils we have found many innovative solutions that will hopefully minimise the impact.

The good news is that local Bus Services are transformed. The former 32 bus has been re-designated as Route X1. The X1 will provide a second means of access into Oxford with additional later evening services. This has been a result of extensive negotiations with the Bus Companies by local Councillors, but more work still needs to be done.

One of the County Council's prime responsibilities is care of the elderly with an anticipated rise of 30% in demand in the next few years. More that 400 children from troubled and dangerous backgrounds are also in the care of our authority. Many of these children would be better served by foster care or adoption. If anyone has ever considered fostering or adopting a child, do let me know. I can put you in touch with the appropriate department.

Local planning for infastructure is another important aspect, especially with the number of planning permissions being issued by the Vale of White Horse District Council. I am determined that developers should pay appropriately for improvements to our Highways and that additional funding is sought from the government. Funding has already been found for changes to the Chilton and Milton intersections on the A34 and I am keen to ensure that the Harwell Bypass is established as quickly as possible. Improvements to the A417 are also vital and I am discussing various alternatives with Council Officers.

I look forward to serving you all in 2014.

We would like to remind residents that the Snells Hall car park is not a public car park, but the private property of the Community Centre and Hirers using the Hall get priority at all times. By arrangement, the car park is used by a large number of parents taking and fetching pupils to and from the schools, and extra cars parked during the day lead to overflow and a potentially dangerous situation. Please do not park in the hall car park unless you are attending an event there.

## The Green Column: How's your thermal image?

The most effective way to reduce energy bills (and also make your home more comfortable) is to reduce waste of heat.

There are several well-known ways of improving the insulation of houses, such as wall cavity insulation, double glazing and loft insulation.

There are less-publicised, cheaper and effective measures one can take, such as adjusting existing windows to stop air leakage, improving door seals and using heavily lined curtains. Thermal imaging – that is, taking photographs of the outside of a house that show the relative temperatures of different parts of the building, can be a great help to identify where heat is being lost.

Hendreds Environment Group has arranged to borrow a thermal imaging camera from Vale of White Horse District Council in January and we would like to offer to take thermal images of your house to help you decide if there are measures you would like to take to improve its heat insulation.

We are looking for twenty households to take part. Unless you would prefer otherwise images will be taken from public viewpoints on the road or footpath. You don't need to be in at the time, and only external images will be taken.

All participants will receive a report with the images taken. You will also have the opportunity to come along to an informal information evening in February to compare notes with other participants and find out what you can do to save energy at home.


