East Hendred Heritage Trust would like to thank everyone who supported this year's Open Gardens event on 17th June – there was an enormous amount of effort put in by many people organising this wonderful day and by all the gardeners who generously agreed to open their gardens.

It was particularly pleasing that we were able to use Hendred House again for the refreshments and we are most grateful to Edward and Ali Eyston. There were 484 visitors and an amazing profit of £3,519 was made, over 50% more than previously. This is a major fundraising event to finance keeping the museum running.

Do come and visit this year's exhibition, "Up Street", it is very worthwhile and we'd love as many people as possible to see it. We would very much like to increase the numbers of local residents visiting and are aiming to run another Open Afternoon where lots of photos will be available to look at – do come and look for your relatives – it would also help us put a name or date to some of the photos. Watch out for posters advertising this.

The Trust generally needs £5,500 a year to keep going and be able to put on a different "Street Exhibition" each year. We are holding more fundraising events over

the next few months and would really appreciate all the support we can get.

There is a FOLK NIGHT arranged for Saturday 27th October at Snells Hall. Proceeds from the Folk Night will be split between East Hendred Heritage Trust and Yellow Submarine, an Oxfordshire charity for those with learning disabilities. There will be a Bar and Raffle at the event. There will also be a QUIZ NIGHT in October – look out for further information soon!

We are in the midst of an enormous project to put all photos onto a system whereby any member of the public will be able to view them. This is a painstaking job but we feel worthwhile for the village residents, past and present.

Thames Water's Draft Plan and Reservoir

Thames Water are working on a new draft version of their Water Resources Management Plan that shows how they intend to provide water to their area for the next 80 years. Demand has grown steadily, mainly because of population growth in London. The Thames is the major source of London's water and, because so much water flows down the river in rainy times (usually winter) and much less in dry periods, TW put forward the idea of a reservoir between Abingdon, Drayton and Steventon to capture river water when rain is plentiful and run it back into the river when flow is low. It is believed that the future will bring wetter winters and dryer summers as a result of climate change.

The draft Plan lists many sources of additional water, but the reservoir is the largest. It would be enormous – more than 4 square miles in extent, with walls up to 80 feet above ground level. It is planned to be larger than needed for TW's own area's needs, so that water could be sold to other water companies. It would take years to build and fill and would have a major impact on the area around Steventon and Drayton, both during building and when in operation. TW say that when complete and filled, the reservoir would be available for leisure activities.

When the reservoir was previously proposed, an organisation called Group Against Reservoir Development (GARD) was formed and, largely because of their and other pressure groups' efforts, a Public Enquiry was held and the reservoir proposal was rejected in 2011. GARD has been very active in opposing the reservoir proposal

and their activities have helped to get TW to revise several key aspects of their current draft Plan.

Although the basic concept of capturing surplus flow from the Thames for use rather than having it flow away unused is very attractive, there are some serious questions that have not been properly answered, for example:

- Leaks if TW met the most recent OFWAT requirement for leak reduction in its distribution network, would the reservoir still be needed?
- Population growth has TW over-estimated future demand by basing its projections on much higher numbers than those produced by the Office of National Statistics?

Many other issues, including possible local flooding as a result of building the reservoir in the Thames flood plain, have also been raised by GARD.

In commenting on the draft Plan in April 2018, East Hendred Parish Council expressed the view that plans for the reservoir should be kept on hold for 20 years until there is a better understanding of the results of climate change and the rate of population growth, rather than rejecting the proposal outright and losing the site.

A revised version of the draft Plan is due to be published in September and comments from the public will be sought.

If there comes a stage when there is no longer an appetite for Hendred BBHB, funds will be distributed to village causes.

The recent hot spell was welcome in some respects but the high daytime temperatures and hot nights made life more difficult for many. However we are now back to more temperate weather. The scorched grass is slowly returning to its normal green state, which emphasises the importance of water in life. Fortunately we did not experience a hose pipe ban as some areas did. Thames Water are making a case for the new reservoir to the south of Abingdon to ensure water supplies in their area several decades hence. This reservoir has grown substantially in size since it was last on the agenda. However there are serious concerns about the case made by Thames Water containing incorrect information. We understand that a second consultation will now happen. The article on the previous page highlights the issues.

There are still two vacancies on the Parish Council. This is an opportunity for villagers to get involved and help steer the many issues affecting this parish. Next May there will be elections for Parish Councils in the country together with most District Councils. It is hoped that we can fill the nine vacancies at this time.

Snells Hall is being improved this August, installing more efficient LED lighting (helped by grants from the Magnox Socio-economic Scheme and the Parish Council), a digital projector and large screen, funded by a bequest from John Stevenson, together with redecoration of the main hall. It is an important facility for the village and needs to be kept in good shape to benefit the users.

A revised booklet has been produced by the Parish Council for new residents, listing the many activities and facilities in the village. It is hoped this will prove useful and a copy is being delivered to each household in the parish.

Planning remains a continuing issue occupying a considerable part of the Parish Council's work load with new applications on almost every agenda. Lack of safety of the new highway works associated with the third phase of the Pye Homes development has still not been resolved. The Council is working to ensure that when all the 46 homes are occupied the occupants will have safe pedestrian access to all the village facilities which are south of the busy A417.

Planning update

The safety concerns that the Parish Council has about the almost-completed highway works associated with the Pye 3 development have still not been resolved. On these grounds the Council objected to the latest application by Pye for condition 8 which is concerned about the type of crossing and the removal of the planned bus stops. It was due to be heard at the Vale District Council Planning Committee meeting held on 1st August, when both the Chair (John Sharp) and Mark Beddow were due to speak. However, the first item on the agenda was the proposed demolition of the Steventon bridge which took almost two hours to resolve (they decided not to demolish it). We expect that the Pye application will now be heard at a later meeting.

As mentioned in the last *Bulletin* an application had been made to build 20 holiday units (in pairs) behind Mather House. The Vale Council has recently decided to reject this on grounds of being out of character and constituting a major development in the Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty (AONB). The Parish Council objected on similar grounds also including adding many additional traffic movements daily in a location close to the junction with the A417 where there is already congestion at busy times. It may go to appeal.

The inquiry of the Vale's Local Plan Part 2 began in July when in response to a question from the inspector

the Vale Council's reply indicated that the planned housing allocation for the period 2011 to 2031 for the area was almost 25,000 (which represents an oversupply of about 2000 houses). The main hearing will be in September when the application to build 1000 new dwellings at the north end of the Harwell Campus, which is in the AONB will be considered. If approved it will be the largest housing development in any AONB in the country. The Parish Council, the AONB Unit and the Campaign for Protection of Rural England (CPRE) are opposing this development. If approved approximately half of the houses would be in this parish, effectively doubling the size of the parish. One of the arguments for the development is that the Harwell Campus wants local housing for site workers, minimising travel requirements. However it is not clear that potential residents would work mainly at the Harwell campus. As noted in the last Bulletin only 10% of those living on the already-built Chilton Fields development actually work at Harwell.

Another issue that has recently been in the news is the Cambridge-Milton Keynes-Oxford corridor. Its aim is to deliver an express-way connecting the three main cities and 1 million new houses and 700,000 additional jobs in the area by 2050. For Oxfordshire the planned growth is 300,000 new dwellings by that date. The Parish Council is keeping a watching brief on this.

Dog barking problem in the village

Persistent barking by dogs causes unnecessary problems with neighbours. This has been particularly difficult during the hot spell with windows left open.

In law barking dogs can be a statutory noise problem. Under the Environmental Protection Act (1990) a dog owner can be taken to court if they do nothing to stop the nuisance. The Local District Council has advice on handling such problems. Please consider your neighbours and ensure that your dog does not cause offence by persistent barking.

The Green Column

Snells Wood - Join us to create a meadow

Hendreds Environment Group has been managing Snells Wood for conservation and community for nearly a decade. We have planted tens of hazel trees and our work parties have removed an invasion of Himalayan Balsam. Together with other community groups (especially 1st Cuckhamsley Cubs) we have helped to keep the walkway through the wood clear when the nettles go mad in summer, and kept some spaces and paths through the wood for forest school groups to use. Recently we've been talking to Hendred Estate, East Hendred Parish Council and forest school users about how HEG should manage this area over the next 5 years or so.

In an exciting new project, HEG plans to create a meadow in an open area beyond the trees. Most recently this location has been a nest of vigorous brambles (currently cut back), so this is no small task. We will need to introduce meadow grasses and flowers and actively intervene to give them an advantage over the brambles and nettles.

We need your help! Meadow habitats have all but disappeared (97% decline) since the early 20th century, impacting a whole food chain of insects and insect eaters such as birds that relied on them. Consequently, creating a meadow can create a local oasis for some of those species. But this is a tough site.

'Memories of Childhood'

How the DGA are rolling back the years thanks to a grant from the Magnox Socio-economic Scheme.

The Downs Golden Age Club have purchased a range of games and large print puzzle books for our members. Games include Giant Up 4 It (Connect 4), Tin Can Alley, Indoor skittles, Quoits, Ludo, Dominoes, Snakes & Ladders and puzzles include Sudoku, Word-search and Crosswords.

In a project we called 'Memories of Childhood', the DGA committee successfully applied for a grant available to local groups and organisations under the Magnox Socio-economic Scheme. The grant covered 50% of the overall cost of the games and puzzles with the other 50% being 'matched' funding from the DGA's own fund-raising efforts

The aim of the project is for the games and puzzles to be fun, stimulating, challenging (both mentally and physically - in a gentle way, we promise) and to encourage members to roll back the years and recall their memories from their childhoods. While such memories start with the last time these games were played or the puzzles solved they inevitably move to life as a child then and now, how mothers made a meal from scratch, bought food in a size they wanted and it was wrapped in greaseproof or brown paper not plastic and when re-cycling was altering hand-me-downs and 'make-do and mend'.

We have bought puzzles for single players or groups of varying levels of difficulty, games that can be played standing and seated for two or more and even teams to introduce some friendly rivalry too.

The DGA committee are most grateful to the panel of the Magnox Socio-economic Scheme for awarding us the grant and for appreciating our aims and the potential benefit our purchase will bring to our membership which currently totals almost eighty.

The programme for next year's monthly DGA meetings has yet to be published but is to include one afternoon dedicated to the Games and Puzzles. If you are unsure of when the 'Golden Age' starts let me tell you that you can join the DGA at **JUST 55**. Come and enjoy the fun.




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Parish Church of St Augustine's of Canterbury

News from St. Mary's

After a superb summer, I suspect we shall be more ready than usual for what the Americans call 'the fall', the autumn loss of leaves, the deepening of darkness, the onset of cold and wet. And we have invented customs and festivities to conceal the gathering gloom.

Superficially, these are simply compensations for the inconvenience of the winter months. Eating and drinking, partying, and evenings at the cinema or the theatre. More profoundly, they are remnants of former times, when life depended on conserving scarce supplies, getting together to generate social support, putting on entertainments to distract lonely and troubled souls.

Much of this rhythm remains in the cycle of the Church's Year. We still have feast days and fast days, days for eating meat and days for abstinence. The Sunday Mass has obvious links with eating and drinking

and partying and is a drama in which all play their part, often comforting the lonely and the troubled, as well as providing structure, meaning, and purpose to the week. More broadly, we face up to 'the fall' with a Harvest Thanksgiving – this year on the first Sunday in October at St Mary's – and, amidst the gathering gloom, celebrate All Saints and All Souls at the beginning of November.

At the beginning of December, Advent begins and we prepare for Christmas, which is previewed by school celebrations but otherwise does not begin until the afternoon of Christmas Eve.

As you ponder the year ahead – school terms, short breaks, holidays, sports, winter activities – I hope that near the top of your list will be God's invitation to us to share, week by week, in worship, in His name but for our own sake.

The 2018 Poppy Appeal

For two weeks starting Saturday, 27th October, collectors will be making their way around the village with their cans, raising funds for the Royal British Legion. All net Poppy Appeal income raised goes into The Royal British Legion Benevolent Fund and is made available to beneficiaries according to need, regardless of where they live. This includes beneficiaries who qualify overseas.

The significance of the poppy as a lasting memorial symbol to the fallen was first realised by the Canadian surgeon John McCrae in his poem In Flanders Fields. The poppy came to represent the immeasurable sacrifice made by his comrades and quickly became a lasting memorial to those who died in World War One. Inspired by McCrae's poem, an American War Secretary, Moina Michael, bought poppies to sell to her friends to raise money for servicemen in need after the First World War. It was adopted by the Royal British Legion in 1921 as a symbol for the Poppy Appeal in aid of those serving in the British Armed Forces. The symbol of the poppy today represents Remembrance of the past and hope for the future.

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
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Reporting Criminal and Anti-social Behaviour

P18/0609/FUL - Mather House, White Road. Construction of 20 holiday properties. The Parish Council objected to this application. Permission has been refused.
