Our County Councillor, Sally Povolotsky, is also Vice Chair of Hendreds Environment Group and is pleased to announce the launch of the HEG Community Larder.

Community Larders are not Food Banks. Food banks do a fantastic and very necessary job supporting people who are experiencing food poverty, but you have to been means tested and referred to use them. Community Larders are open to everyone who wants to prevent food waste or to save money, by using food that would otherwise go to landfill. The food comes from supermarkets that no longer want to sell it for many different reasons, only one of which is because it's near its best before date! The parent organisation SOFEA sends generous quantities each week so

there's no need to worry that by taking some you are depriving someone more needy

The weekly subscription is £3.50 for a single person, £7 for a family, entitling you to around 14 or 28 items, plus as much fruit and veg as you would like to take! (There's also a one-time £10 joining fee.) It's quick and easy to join, all done by direct debit, managed by SOFEA.

Our Community Larder is also a place to stop for a chat and ask advice – about anything. When the weather improves we plan to serve refreshments, too.

Message from our local County Councillor

Dear Residents,

As I type this I am preparing to go to full council tomorrow for our budget meeting. We are at the end of a ten-year period during which central government-funded spending power for English local authorities has more than halved, falling by 52%. Faced with declining budgets, Council officers have been driven to find continual savings. In some areas, efforts to increase efficiency may have become counterproductive. We are concerned, for example, by the levels of outsourcing and the regular use of contract/agency staff. We have been struck by how stretched many services are and are worried they risk failing to deliver the standards expected by council taxpayers.

While funding has fallen, there has been no reduction in demand for our services. In our services for individual residents, such as children's and adults' social care and support for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities (SEND), there has been huge increase in demand, increased complexity and rising cost. For example:

- the number of new adult social care cases has risen 62% each year since 2016 (from 12,500 to 21,500), and for adults aged 18-64 by 280% (from 2400 to 6780)
- following legislation changes in 2014, since 2016 the number of children and young people in Oxfordshire with an Education, Health and Care Plan has risen by 91% (nationally it's closer to 60%)
- the average older person required 12.3 hours of personal home care per week in 2021 (it was 10.6 hours in 2017)
- the cost of a care home bed for an older person rose 29% between 2017-2021 and 80% for an adult with learning disability
- the Competition and Markets Authority reported on children's social care on 22nd October, with its Chief Executive, Andrea Coscelli, stating: "We are concerned this is a failing system, with children not being placed in the right homes while providers are being allowed to charge high prices and make big profits."

We have approached the budget process with a three key principles in mind:

 A relentless focus on high quality services for the residents of Oxfordshire

- 2. Opportunities to make investments now that will save the council cost in the future
- Effective ways to deliver our priorities, in particular addressing climate change and reducing inequality

The previous administration left some significant capital underfunding. In some areas, the sums provisioned for projects were inadequate. This includes the Housing Infrastructure Funding scheme locally which has huge gaps in funding despite being sold as a "government funded scheme". More generally, over the coming years, we face a major challenge to shift the capital budget so that investments are made with an eye to the future not a nod to the past, and ensure major capital investments are consistent with our carbon reduction commitments. Travel and transport infrastructure is a key area. The estimated cost of maintaining Oxford's highways over the next five years (from 2022-23 to 2026-27) is £228m. Yet we are set to receive only £70m from national government. Previous borrowing of £32m is scheduled for the next two years, but the total funding gap is currently £125m. As we look to maintain our roads, we will have to confront some difficult choices.

Rises in council tax will affect us all, and we are looking to ensure we can protect and have packages in place for the most vulnerable in our communities. I would rather be open and transparent with you all around the challenges we face, but those challenges now extend to increased national insurance, fuel and food prices. I've been shocked at my own utilities and bills and want you all to know we are tackling some major issues head on.

What does this mean to the village? We are pushing ahead with projects like reducing street lighting's carbon and energy bills, we are patching roads where possible, I am working with officers on several schemes to relieve traffic around Rowstock, and now the Greensands site has passed on appeal, we need to ensure the least impact to the villages and the natural environment.

There's a huge amount going on around the Steventon reservoir (known as SESRO), so please do raise your concerns on the latest rounds of consultations on the link: https://wrse.uk.engagementhq.com/about-our-consultation

But there are also good things going on, like the Community Larder scheme (see front page). I keep working for you and our wonderful villages and trying to make your voices heard and questions answered.

The future is looking more positive with the government about to relax all Covid requirements. It will be a real opportunity for the village to come together for the Queen's Jubilee celebrations in early June. Plans for a special weekend are well in hand which is encouraging.

The recent storms have caused damage in many locations, but the village appears to have not suffered any major damage, apart from power cuts and Allins Lane being closed. A notice to villagers from the Parish Council emergency group was sent offering help to those who might need it.

The Parish Council has been low on numbers recently with three vacancies. Three new councillors were elected at the February Council meeting. We warmly welcome them:

Sarah James: Sarah was a Councillor in the past but then decided to resign so that she could complete her Master's degree. She is welcomed back to the Council. Sarah is very active in the environmental field including being chair of the Hendreds Environment Group. Penny Wall: Penny and her husband moved into the village fairly recently. She is retired and previously has had experience as a school governor, member of a Parochial Church Council and also as a volunteer for an organisation involved in befriending older people. She is a very effective member of the DGA committee.

Jonathan Shortis: Jonathan has recently retired having held senior positions in several large companies. He has lived in the village for many years, married to Catherine who is one of our current Councillors. We look forward to benefiting from his management experience on the Council.

There is increasing support for reducing the speed limit to 20 miles per hour in cities, towns and villages, to reduce numbers and severity of accidents, encourage the use of roads by cyclists and make crossing the road safer for pedestrians. The Parish Council has registered interest in possible funding from Oxfordshire County Council to implement a 20mph limit in the village. Local opinion will be sought before a decision is made but if you have views on this, please contact our Parish Clerk (contact details on page 15).

The Community Larder project is good news, reducing food waste and providing help for people struggling with rising costs. See page 1 for more information.

Planning Update

The application for development of the former Esso Research centre into a distribution centre was strongly opposed, particularly by the Rowstock Residents Association (whose online petition against the development attracted more than 1100 signatures) due to the increased traffic much of which would travel via Rowstock. Oxfordshire Highways Department did object initially and then changed their position. The Parish Council objected strongly to this application on several grounds. Despite the planning officer recommending approval, the Vale's planning committee recently refused planning permission unanimously which is encouraging.

Since the last *Bulletin* the revised Plough application has not progressed as the Conservation Officer still has concerns that need to be addressed, including reduction of the impact of the scheme on the character of the group of listed buildings and the Conservation Area. The Parish Council welcomed the revision but still had some concerns about parking and the size of the new clubhouse. The Bowling Club is also concerned about the space available in the new clubhouse.

A new application has been listed for the Harwell Science campus which is in our parish for a new science and research facility linked to the Mary Lyons Centre. This is part of the delivery of the Medical Research Council's strategy and will complement the activities undertaken at the existing MRC Harwell site. The proposed building is to accommodate laboratory and office spaces with supporting facilities.

The District Council is planning a revised Design Guide jointly with South Oxfordshire Council and is consulting on this, with a deadline of 15th March. The District Council publishes a Design Guide as a Supplementary Planning Document which is to help developers and designers in proposing new housing schemes and other features to be appropriate to the location.

The Parish Council has requested that the revision includes particular features relevant to our village and similar Springline villages. The North Wessex Downs Area of Outstanding Natural Beauty also has some guidance, and we are asking that this is also referenced in the update. The design of some recent housing developments planned for this village are more suited to an urban location and would benefit from use of the Design Guide.

Vale Community Impact is the new trading name for Wantage Independent Advice Centre and we help and support people in the villages in The Vale.

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
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Thinking about solar panels?

With the need to reduce our carbon footprint, coupled with rising energy prices, now is a great time to find out more about solar panels and if they could work for you. Whilst doing some of my own research into solar panels for our house in the Hendreds, I came across a community based solar panel initiative called Solar Streets https://www.solarstreets.net that I thought may be of interest to our community.

What is the Solar Streets Scheme?

This initiative is a community partnership between IDDEA (a UK company focused on solar panel installation www.iddea.co.uk) and the local council. Importantly, Sustainable Wantage is launching the initiative on 7th April and would welcome the Hendreds within their OX12 cluster. Their website will be www.solarstreets.co.uk/wantageplus

Solar Streets brings discounted Solar PV systems to local residents; the installer IDDEA makes multiple installations in one area and passes on the savings. You will still get an individual quote based on your property and

energy needs and can include the option of battery storage. As with any major purchase anyone looking into Solar PV should also seek alternative quotes. Solar Streets makes a donation of £50 for each household and £100 for each business that buys a system – in Wantage this will go into a fund managed by Sustainable Wantage that will be used to support local energy-saving projects. Solar Streets started in 2019 in Frome, Somerset and by the end of 2021 had been adopted in 23 towns including nearby Faringdon, Didcot and Wallingford. Feedback has been positive. There is a good introduction to the initiative on the Didcot solar streets website

Glyphosate: Friend or Foe?

Glyphosate, marketed as Roundup, is the most commonly used herbicide in the world. Its main use is for killing unwanted plants (weeds or previous crops) before planting but can also be sprayed on crops that have been genetically modified to tolerate glyphosate while they are growing to kill weeds. It has very low toxicity to insects, animals and humans and is very effective as a weed killer, which has led to its widespread use. It is also sprayed on food crops (such as wheat) in order to kill the plants, so that they start to dry out, or desiccate, and can be harvested sooner, requiring less artificial drying.

The effect on consumers of any residue of glyphosate that may be in the harvested crop is not fully known. Apart from direct effects on our bodies, it is possible that glyphosate remaining in the food affects the microorganisms in our gut that play an essential part in our digestive processes. Glyphosate is suspected of injuring certain insects, such as bees, even if it is not lethal to them. There are also concerns about the long-term effect of its anti-bacterial properties on the essential microorganisms in the soil – glyphosate has actually been registered as an antibiotic. Some countries (such as Austria and Luxembourg) have banned its use and others (such as Germany) are banning it in the near future.

Glyphosate should be used with caution – low toxicity does not mean harmlessness. Sensible caution means that spray should not be inhaled, and personal protection equipment should be used to avoid skin contact. Any risks are different for farm or council workers in PPE and amateur gardeners in shorts and flipflops!

Despite the possible risks, like those mentioned above, using glyphosate away from food plants, for instance to kill weeds on pavements, and taking precautions, does not seem to carry any significant risk. However, it is not a harmless miracle cure for unwanted plants and like any potentially dangerous substance, it should be treated with caution.

St Mary's Catholic Church, East Hendred

I don't know whether you managed a 'Dry January', or a new diet and lost a kilo or two. A few weeks of fasting and abstinence can be very helpful and, for this purpose, the Church prescribes not the month of January but the season of Lent. Lent starts this year on Ash Wednesday, 2nd March, and lasts until Easter, in the middle of April. For me, that's six weeks mostly without dark chocolate – Lindt 70%, since you ask – and my daily bottle of Becks Blue. Mostly? Well, Sundays are different and so are feast days.

Fasting and abstinence helps us with a problem most of us have: keeping our bodies disciplined. But, along with this, the Church asks us to attend to the spiritual side of things. Coming to Mass, praying, bible reading are the usual ways. But what about those who feel they don't belong? People who doubt the existence of God. People who dislike formal religion. People who are out of sorts with the Church. Everybody finds their own way and we try to help that, at St Mary's, not only by making everybody welcome but also by having the Church open most of the week. Between 9am and sundown St Mary's is usually open for private prayer, candle lighting, or quiet reflection. And it is available 24/7 on https://www.churchservices.tv/easthendred

As well as 'fasting' (getting on with our bodies) and 'prayer' (getting on with God), there is 'almsgiving' (getting on with others). Lent is an opportunity to reflect on how we can help, whether its offering others a helping hand or working to tackle climate change, giving to a charity or supporting the local food banks. These three areas – 'fasting', 'prayer', and 'almsgiving' are at the centre of the teaching of Jesus of Nazareth (Matthew 6), whom everyone recognises to have been a very fine teacher and whom Christians worship as the Son of God, fully human and fully divine.

Have a good Lent – a bespoke one!

The Gardening Group

Making Space for Wildlife in Gardens

I gave some ideas for making space for wildlife in last Spring's *Bulletin*. Last season I experimented by leaving areas of my grass uncut (and welcomed not having to mow as much). I cut a small area in June, having allowed insects to enjoy daisies and clover, another area in August and a third in September. I did not get round to the final area, so it will be interesting to see what happens to it this year. I think I will cut half of it once early in the season and leave the rest. The area cut in September still looks untidy so I will not cut at that time this year. Even with a small area of grass, do consider not cutting some until June. If you visit my garden during Hendreds Open Gardens on 12 June you will be able to see the results of my experiments.

Online there are many ideas to provide homes for insects, other invertebrates, frogs, toads and small mammals. I recently read that invertebrates benefit from a pile of leaves left for at least two years; and that home-made compost containers are better for wildlife than bins. (The disadvantage is that the compost does not rot as quickly.)

Early last year HEG promoted a great idea from Sarah Lunt. She filled an old wooden fruit box with branches from her Christmas tree and added pine cones, other twigs and sticks, leaves etc. You could use one as a mini-compost bin this year then add bits from your Christmas tree for next year. There are plenty of cones and sticks on walks in Ardington wood. However, even a small pile of leaves or a brick left in a corner will be welcomed by wildlife.

In my view a weed is either something I have too much of, or something I do not like. Do not assume that any plant that appears without you planting or sowing it is a weed. A plant with attractive leaves and small daisy-like flowers has found a home in the crack between my house and a path. Because it was making it difficult to get my wheelie bins past it, I started to reduce it in January. However, I noticed it was about to come into flower so I decided to leave it for a couple of months.

Good websites include www.wildaboutgardens.org.uk and www.naturehood.uk – do have a look and even if your garden is small, take at least one step to make more room for wildlife. Finally, the Gardening Group will be starting to meet again soon. Look out for announcements in What's On in The Hendreds if you would like to join us.

The Post Office in Hendred Stores

We are extremely lucky to have the Post Office in the shop, especially with the ongoing bank closures. We therefore thought it would be helpful to summarise the services which we currently offer. Whenever the shop is open so is the Post Office; 6am to 5pm Monday to Friday, 7am to 1pm Saturday and 7am to 11am Sunday. You can both withdraw cash and pay it into your account, just as at any ATM, for all major banks, plus you can pay cheques in.

We are part of a trial with DPD whereby they will drop parcels here for you to collect, and soon you will be able to leave parcels here for them to pick up. Likewise, a similar service will soon start with Amazon.

As travel opens up remember the currency services. We always have Euros, and can order in most other currencies with a minimum of 24 hours' notice. Or you can order online to have currency delivered to the Post Office for you to collect at a time that suits you.

One4All gift cards can be loaded with any amount from £15 upwards, and can be used in a wide variety of stores from coffee shops, to clothing, jewellery and various restaurants, and they can also be used to buy some items online.

We hold several different card designs including birthdays, weddings, newborns, congratulations or just generic ones. As well as mobile phone top ups, you can also buy vouchers for Amazon, Google Play, Netflix, Nintendo, Sony, Playstation and Xbox from the Post Office, ideal for yourself or to gift to somebody else. And we sell fishing licences.

Finally, don't forget you can also do electronic bill payments and top up gas and electricity keys and cards. All this plus the usual services of postage and stamps. Please continue to use us so we can keep offering these services and more. Nickie and Steve
