County Council & Village News

Message from our local County Councillor

Before I get on to what's worrying me, I want to say a big thank you - to newcomers to the village, Frances and Mike, for their support with the community larder and kitchen, to Louise Low for taking the reins for Hendred Owls WI, the Sports Club committee and users for letting us start the community larder and, of course, Snells Hall Committee for their support as we outgrew the room in the Pavilion, letting us use areas of Snells Hall.

I welcome Mark Francis back to the village, the unsung hero of many local fixes at the County Council. There are other unsung heroes here, all amazing, and they make me proud to live in, represent and be a part of this village!

In May 2022, in addition to my County Council role, I won the District Council seat in Steventon & Hanneys. was voted onto cabinet and am the cabinet member for Climate Emergency & Environment. We have much to do around climate sequestering, waste reduction, improving air pollution and our open spaces. We need nature to be front and centre and biodiversity to increase. Do follow me on Facebook for information on how you can get involved. I want to see how we can work with villages on waste reduction trials! Being one of the best districts to recycle isn't solving the issue, reducing the waste is what we need as a solution. More info soon through HEG and my social media communications.

Meanwhile we need to drive less, make our streets safer for walkers and cyclists and travel differently. We need 1 in 4 journeys by 2025 to be by foot, bike, or public transport. I'm working with officers to link up travel routes for a more joined up approach to our transport network because, frankly, we have inherited a patchwork quilt of convoluted, un-linked schemes and systems. I am constantly the voice of criticism and pushing for a holistic travel and Didcot area transport master plan! We are still trying to make the lcknield Way a better surface, and there have been several meetings of late about that.

I recently attended the county Bus Summit and was the voice for rural bus services. It was painful to hear so

much focus on Oxford city, but there were a few of us "country folk" ensuring that we are not forgotten given that this county is 80% rural! It isn't hard - would you drive less if there were better bus services?

When I stood for elections I promised change, I'm trying, but the biggest change you can make is in your own life as we don't have time for top-down direction. This is about our kids and the next generation and what we leave for them. So let's all work together.

On that note the County Council have launched a new website here -

Parish Council News





The recent hot weather has turned gardens in the village brown and although some rain has fallen the ground is still very dry. A hose-pipe ban is now in place. Water has become a hot topic. The drought situation will place increasing emphasis on constructing the Abingdon reservoir which is just north of this village. The Council is keeping a close watch on the progress of the case for the reservoir and like the County and Vale Councils we are opposed to it, believing that alternatives are more acceptable.

The Annual Parish Meeting had useful discussion sessions with about 40 members of the public and

produced a list of priority actions. The noticeboard by the shop will be revamped to include useful community information (like that on the front page of this *Bulletin*), and there are plans to extend the readership of the weekly 'What's On' email and to revamp the village website. Medium-term activities include lowering the village speed limit to 20mph and upgrading the Mill Lane playpark, which is the Council's main Platinum Jubilee project. New multi-play equipment serving an extended age group is planned, paid for by grants and existing Council funds – though contributions from the broader village community would, of course, be gratefully received.

We are sad to hear of Stan Francis's recent death. He was a valuable member of the Parish Council for many years (see below).

Planning Update

After a number of iterations, we understand that the Vale Council will shortly give approval for the redevelopment of the Plough site which is welcome news. Given the sensitive nature of this site, with a number of listed buildings and being at the centre of the village Conservation Area, members of the Parish Council have met with the Vale Planning Officer and commented on these planning iterations, with some success. In addition, most of the issues raised by the Vale Conservation Officer have now also been addressed.

The application includes a change of use to a dwelling for both the Plough Inn and the barn (Oak Room), together with a new clubhouse and a new dwelling in the corner of the site, to the west.

The Parish Council has been very concerned about the demise of the Morlands Bowling Club and the lack of a successor at this stage. It is hoped that new clubs for bowling or for example croquet can be established.

As noted in the last *Bulletin* the Parish Council decided to object to the application for a new property on the Colt Corner site in Horn Lane, replacing the existing wooden bungalow. The objection was on the grounds of the proposed new access to the site off Horn Lane, the orientation of the house and other issues. Horn Lane is narrow at this point and the site already has a vehicular access on a lane to the west of the site. We have recently learnt that the application has been withdrawn and a revised application is expected soon.

Building work has started behind Mather House at the entrance to the village. There is approval to build ten specialist accommodation units for older people, together with a communal meeting area in Mather House. It is not clear how these will be allocated once built.

Several councillors contributed to the Vale District's consultation of the forthcoming Local Plan covering the period to 2041. There will be a further consultation stage after the current round of comments has been addressed.

Stan Francis

We were saddened to hear of the recent death of Stan Francis who was a well-known, respected and life-long resident of the village. Stan was born on 30th December 1928. His grandfather came to East Hendred in 1910 as chauffeur to John Joseph Eyston and his mother was from the village. Stan was given the task of ringing the old school bell when the extension to Snells Hall was opened in 1999, and reflected that he had had the same duty when he was a pupil at the old school fifty years earlier.

Stan was a long-serving Parish Councillor, joining the Council in the 1960's and retiring in 2007, after nine years as its Deputy Chair. He was active on many working groups and an allotment holder. He brought a valuable depth of knowledge of the village to the Council when dealing with planning applications and many other matters.

With his wife Jackie, Stan was a very keen ballroom dancer, loved amateur dramatics, was a regular attendee at St. Augustine's church and very involved with the Heritage Trust. He loved Hendred and loved living here. We offer our condolences to his son Mark and his family.

We are delighted to announce the appointment of the Rev Dr Nikolaj Christensen as our new Rector. Nikolaj is currently serving his curacy in the Parish of Iffley in Oxford. His Institution as Rector of Wantage Downs will take place on 20 October, conditional upon DBS and other legal checks being completed. St Mary's Catholic Church, East Hendred

Though the Church Year doesn't begin until Advent Sunday, 27th November, there is a general feeling that September, with children and students returning to their studies after a long, hot summer, is really the new year. Everything, it seems, moves on to a new stage. At St Mary's we shall be very happy to see things continuing to settle down after the upheaval of the last couple of years.

On Sundays at 9.15am in term-time Children's Church is held in the Parish Rooms. Pre-school children and Keystage One children have their own simple service and activities before joining the rest of the 9.30am congregation for Mass. As well as our 9.30am Mass, our 6pm Mass goes from strength to strength. It suits the not so old and the not so young, those involved in Sunday sport earlier in the day or needing a lie-in. Harvest Thanksgiving will be on Sunday 25th September.

An exciting new development at St Mary's is the refurbishing of St Mary's Parish Rooms. Originally the stables for the Presbytery, the St Mary's Parish Rooms have always been very much 'outbuildings' and gradually became unfit for use. Thanks to the East Hendred Consolidated Catholic Charities (EHCCC), the Parish Rooms now have new insulation, new flooring, new kitchen, new loo, and the main room has been enlarged. A heat pump and air-conditioning make for a very comfortable space. The Parish Rooms will not suit every purpose: parking is on the road and the accommodation is adjacent to private houses. But we can see many uses for the space: for groups, for parties, for parents and toddlers, for meetings. We have been asked by the EHCCC to make the room available for a modest rent for local use and anyone interested should contact office@hendredcatholicparish.org.uk

East Hendred has long prided itself on good relations between the churches and their schools. St Mary's Catholic Church looks forward to welcoming the Rev Dr Nikolaj Christensen and his family as they prepare to settle into the Church of England Rectory in East Hendred.

Strange Times

Hil penned our piece for the Summer Bulletin. Enthusiastic as ever she said: For me, each seed carries a tiny miracle

within it' explaining that 'By the time of Hendred Open Gardens in June, a whole range of seeds will have done their stuff and lots of strong, healthy crops will be growing away on our plots.' In most years that would have been the case but inevitably the lack of rain has limited this vear's delights. Seed germination has been patchy with those plants that made it out of the ground struggling to make headway. Some simply succumbed to pests while others made a dash for the line, maturing weeks ahead of time. Without doubt the early harvest that we saw in the fields surrounding the village was also a feature on the allotments too. Blooms on the cutting bed slowed right down sadly resulting in a pause to the ever-popular Posies and Punnets on a Saturday morning. Meanwhile many beds that should have been producing summer vegetables in September were cleared in August leaving just the winter crops to soldier on in the dry heat. Fingers

crossed the kale, sprouts, winter cabbages and squash have sunk their roots deep enough to see them through.

The shortened season means that minds turned to autumn tasks and winter works a little earlier than usual. A date has been set for Hendred Apple Day - fingers crossed the crop holds on long enough for the now annual fest of pressing and juicing local apples and pears outside Hendred Stores. Saturday 15th October - put a note in your diary! In the meantime we await the outcome of a couple of grant applications in the hope of securing match funding so we can replace the existing dilapidated shed with something larger that we hope will provide a base for a number of community activities and workshops. The end of September also sees renewal of the annual plot tenancies which often results in a little bit of a shuffle - some plotholders upsize, others downsize, others move on and there are always new people using the raised beds on the Community Plot at the entrance to the allotment site. Hendred Environment Group (HEG)

Let's be frank, there can be no doubts now about the climate emergency we are facing after the extreme weather in July and now into August. As I pen this, drought orders have started and more being mentioned on the news, harvest is well underway and my blackberries are ripe. The bee hive we host has been collected already (less than 9 weeks) and the whole growing season is way ahead of itself! The devastation of this spring/summer to habitats and our natural world are as yet unknown. Groups like HEG are key to local civic action like the A417 verge wildflower planting (big thank you to all volunteers who helped and to Julian Gold for the initial mow and seeding). The experimental verge did ok this season, with signage coming and a plan to capture seed, we hope for even more colour next year! Once again thanks to the village scout group for all their help and several DoE volunteers. We still need help so please do email HEG.

What is clear is we need adaption and resilience. I am constantly the voice at County Hall making sure plans and contingency are in place, and to ensure we hit carbon reduction targets. We need to do more and fast.

We are pretty much on our own, there's no urgency, major funding or critical and strong guidance coming from central government that addresses the fact we are heading towards potentially a 3+ degree rise in global temperatures. In fact again, as I write this we have no idea who the new Prime Minister might be, but neither of the final two candidates have been strong on the emergency we face.

I know everything at the moment can feel overwhelming but we can't sugar coat this any longer. We need to face facts head on. So please connect with Hendred Environment Group (HEG), and more info from me coming soon about what we can all do together.

What's key to a better society is creating safer, healthier and sustainable communities, reaching out and helping each other. Now some may criticise this approach but we are not sustainable, we devour the earth's resources and we are hitting a crisis where no government is coming to our rescue. So I'll just keep upsetting the apple cart and just being me, because I am damn sure that the remainder of my term representing you in local government won't be about forwarding emails and sitting on my backside! 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
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East & West Hendred Cricket Club
