Remembrance Sunday - Lest we forget



A large gathering watched the procession to the War Memorial for the Act of Remembrance led by the Rev. Nikolaj Christensen of St Augustine's and Father Matthew Topham of St Mary's Catholic Church. Brian Thomas of Wantage Silver Band attended to play the bugle and the exhortation was read by Chris Harrison. The names of the fallen were read by Pip Couchman and Becky Turner. Wreaths were laid by David Chennell for the village, Archie Crockett for the Scout movement, Sally Povolotsky for the Council, Sylvia May for the Kohima Association, Dair Farrar-Hockley for comrades who fell in the Falkland Islands and Martin Realey for comrades who fell in Afghanistan.

East Hendred Heritage Trust provided refreshments after the service in the Museum where the exhibition on St Mary's Road was on display.

Remembrance is essentially about war; and about those who suffer its repercussions. You will know that a former resident of the village was Baron Penney, who was treated harshly in later life for his connection to the Hiroshima and Nagasaki bombings in 1945, which finally brought the Second World War to a blessed close. So it is interesting to read this week that the government have commissioned a new medal which recognises all those who participated in our nuclear testing programme in the 50s and 60s. Lord Penney would undoubtedly have been one of the medal's recipients.

War is, by definition, ugly: we may win or lose by what Baldrick would have called "a cunning plan". That plan and the decision to expedite it may be deemed, with hindsight, to have been repugnant - or clumsy, at the least - but it had to be made.

During Remembrancetide, many of us will be holding in our thoughts those who gave their lives in the course of sundry wars and campaigns in order to preserve the values and ways of life established in our country. We do need to spare a moment, too, for those who have to make the profoundly uncomfortable decisions.

Message from our County Councillor - Cllr Sally Povolotsky

Happy December and can I firstly wish you and your family a warm festive season. The lead up to Christmas can bring joy to many, but it's not such a happy time for some. If you're struggling, please come to the HEG Community Hub on Mondays at Snells Hall, 9-5pm, there will always be a friendly greeting, a cup of tea and chat.

I write this as I prepare to participate in the Annual Remembrance service, and as always a huge thanks to those who organise this event, we have to continue to remember those who laid down their lives for our freedoms, at a time when the world feels so suffocating and oppression rises. This year, I'll be wearing the chain of office as Chair of the Vale of White Horse District Council.

There is much movement at County Hall, the Liberal Democrats now run a minority administration, after the Labour Party walked away post the lowest Ofsted inspection on SEND services. These services are for our children with special educational needs or disabilities which was a portfolio Labour held. I've been a lonely voice for over a year expressing concerns shown as true after the damning report. We now must ensure that no stone is unturned and that large infrastructure projects the council is committed to proceed.

Locally, there's a concern about the Relief to Rowstock scheme, now renamed the Steventon/Milton Interchange project. The purpose of this project is to create designated safe spaces for pedestrians and cyclists and a dedicated bus lane. This is phase 1 which is funded already from various developer contributions and I've arranged an officer briefing to the concerned parish councils and formal representatives. On the HIF1 scheme, to which East Hendred Parish Council is objecting, this goes before the inspector in February 2024 after the Secretary of State called in the County Council's objections. This scheme is a road which runs from Great Western Park/the new Valley Park to Culham with some elevated sections. My personal view on these schemes is we have to start to look at

creating space for new modes of transport and accessible modes, and we have to think about next generations too - and as I've said before, we all have to reduce our personal reliance on the car, when I'm stood at Rowstock bus stop, nearly every car passing me is single occupant! This isn't an anti-motorist stance as some see me nor as a whole lefty snowflake push, but about sustainable transport for this century in light of rising global temperature and increasing climate-related weather patterns.

I've got a new hat on at County Hall. Sadly I've had to step off the AONB board as the county rep since all meetings are now in person and a struggle to attend. I have been replaced by Cllr Hannaby from Wantage. I am now public transport champion, as someone who's always been vocal about rural bus service demise and the lack of movement on Grove Station, I am hoping to use this role to highlight to the cabinet lead that there's more to Oxfordshire than Oxford City!

SESRO (the reservoir) - please read what you can, it's clear that Thames Water think this is a done deal, that we will have a 'megavoir' built with construction starting before the end of this decade. I led a protest in November at one of the Thames Water PR events in East Hanney. Again I repeat to Thames Water, fix your leaks and transfer water, and I am calling, amongst others, for a Public Inquiry. The consultation and data going to the Secretary of State is based on a scheme half the size of what's now being pushed forward. Please, please write to the MP and ask him why he's not turning up or voicing OUR collective concerns as residents.

Meanwhile I continue to help with personal casework and listen to residents in between volunteering where I can at local service level, and my email and phone is always on - so get in touch (see page 15).

Message from our District Councillor - CIIr Sarah James

Are you in a property without mains gas?

You may be eligible for an energy efficiency upgrade for your home, such as insulation, solar panels or a heat pump, funded by the Home Upgrade Grant Phase 2 (HUG2). These upgrades can help to reduce energy bills and make homes easier to keep warm. The grants are available to homeowners and landlords whose properties are not heated by gas boilers, with a household income of less than £39,000 and with a low energy rating (D-G). Reservoir plans

Following a consultation on their Water Resources Management Plan where they proposed building a 1 million cubic metre bunded reservoir, Thames Water have concluded that they will instead now plan for a 1.5 million cubic metre reservoir. The consultation received widespread opposition in responses from our local area. It is opposed by East Hendred Parish Council, Vale of White Horse District Council and Oxfordshire County Council. There are strong concerns that there seem to be no plans to produce safety, flooding and ecological assessments before a decision to go ahead or not is made. As your local District Councillor I have not seen evidence yet to convince

me that the proposed reservoir is not more about growing Thames Water's asset base and profits than any flexible and sustainable way of meeting the future water needs of our region.

At the time of writing this, Vale of White Horse District Council expects to receive a planning application from Thames Water to carry out trial work connected to the reservoir. This will be for a clay compaction trial at land to the South of Hanney Road, within Steventon Parish. The results of these trials will form part of the evidence base Thames Water is likely to submit for the construction of the proposed reservoir. Opposition groups are also interested in the results of this trial. This planning application is likely to go to the planning committee in January.

The turn-out for the Remembrance service at the newly cleaned War memorial was good despite the poor weather, which is encouraging. When the names of those who fell in action are read out, the tragedy of war feels more intense bacause so many died in 1918 which was the last year of WW1.

In the last *Bulletin* we reported that our Clerk was taking up the clerk's role for Wantage Town Council and we needed to find a replacement. The post was advertised and a candidate was selected who unfortunately withdrew at the last stage. We have since appointed Hannah Champ who lives in the village and is married to one of our new Councillors as our new Clerk. We look forward to working with her; Julia our previous

clerk will continue to manage the finances until the end of the financial year to enable the new Clerk to find her feet.

Our congratulations go to Sally and Frances and all their regular helpers for the increasingly successful Monday HEG Community Larder in Snells Hall with the aim of reducing food waste. It involves a mammoth effort each week bringing in the produce delivered by SOFEA (local base is in Didcot) and then stacking any remaining produce away at the end of each session. The day long "Warm space" also runs on Mondays providing an opportunity to meet up for coffee, tea or a hot meal/snack in a warm environment which will be increasingly appreciated as the weather gets colder.

As also noted in the last *Bulletin* the Council had decided to close the Mill Lane playpark due to concerns about the safety of the equipment. An order has recently been placed with Wicksteeds for new equipment including a multi-play unit. We hope this will be installed by the Spring of next year and the Jubilee Playpark can be re-opened. Some remedial work has been undertaken at the Penney playpark where the equipment is now over 20 years old. It is planned to replace one piece of equipment at this playpark in the next year.

Planning Update

Since the last *Bulletin* there have been few significant local applications requiring the Council's close attention.

The Council has been commenting on the so-called Relief to Rowstock scheme which is aimed at improving the stretch of road from the Steventon traffic lights to the Milton interchange. It is difficult to see how this will reduce Rowstock's traffic which is claimed as one of its objectives. It is mentioned in the County Councillor's report on page 2. There is also what is called the HIF1 scheme which is a very expensive new road to run from Great Western Park and the new Valley Park to Culham, including the building of several roundabouts and a new bridge. Our Parish Council is objecting to it on the basis of cost and need. This was surprisingly objected to by the County Council's committee and now goes before the inspector next February after the Secretary of State called in the County Council's objections. A representative from our Council is planning to speak at the inquiry.

One of the Harwell Campus applications in our parish has been temporarily withdrawn at the request of the Planning Authority due to the delay while highways modelling issues are concluded. Access to the A34 is one of the highway issues that this modelling is addressing, given the increase in the number of new cars associated with these large office developments.

Members of the Council have met with representatives of Thames Water about a forthcoming planning application for a test to establish the compaction characteristics of the clay subsoil at the reservoir site near Steventon. Although this will be a small scale test it will

provide useful data relevant to the construction of the new reservoir. We and other local Councils are opposed to the planned reservoir.

Our Council has been alerted that South Oxfordshire and Vale of White Horse District Councils are preparing to launch a round of consultation early next year to develop their new Joint Local Plan to 2041. A Local Plan looks ahead fifteen years and plans how much development is needed in an area, like new homes, jobs, roads and schools, and where they should go. The next public consultation will ask for people's thoughts on proposed approaches across various policy areas, from reducing carbon emissions and nature recovery, to protecting and enhancing local heritage, meeting community infrastructure and transport needs, affordable housing, jobs and economic opportunities, and more. New policy areas which previous local plans haven't covered include policies to protect valued landscapes, tranquil places and dark skies. Given the importance of the Local Plan our Council will seriously review the above issues with respect to their inclusion on the next Local Plan. It may be useful to hold a public meeting to seek views from local parishioners on these topics.

The Government has recently renamed Areas of Outstanding Natural Beauty as "National Landscapes" and the area in which most of East Hendred lies is now known as the North Wessex Downs National Landscape. The renaming is a first step in giving higher priority to these areas. Because of their size and scope, the 46 UK National Landscapes are ideally positioned to address the environmental issues that the UK is facing.

The idea of having lines painted to stop cars parking in front of the drop kerb on White Road is not being taken forward because the limited space available means that the traffic visibility would not be adequate.

A suggestion to paint the bus stop opposite The Plough has been carried out.

A new defibrillator was suggested to serve the northern part of the village. It is felt that the defibrillator at Ludbridge Close serves this purpose.

As has often been mentioned previously, a request was made to car owners who have their own driveways to use them, to reduce the pressure on the limited on-street parking spaces available.

We are proud to introduce ourselves as The Hendreds Year 6 reporters and this is hopefully the first of many articles in the *Bulletin*. Each article will give you a snapshot of our school life.

So far in the Autumn term, we have had multiple exciting opportunities to learn outside the classroom. We visited Bhaktivedanta Manor, a Hindu Temple near Watford, as part of our Religion and World Views topic. Blue Plaque for Roy Jenkins OM and Dame Jennifer Jenkins

On Saturday 16th September a Blue Plaque was unveiled in honour of Lord Jenkins of Hillhead and Dame Jennifer Jenkins at St Amand's House, where they lived from 1965. Roy Jenkins died in 2003 and Dame Jennifer continued to live here until her death in 2017.

Roy Jenkins had been a Labour Home Secretary and Chancellor of the Exchequer and was a founder of the Liberal Democrat Party and later President of the European Commission. Dame Jennifer served as Chair of the National Trust and of the Consumers' Association.

The unveiling was attended by about 80 people. Lord Oakeshott, Liberal Democrat spokesperson in the House of Lords, gave a speech and John Sharp, Chair of the Parish Council, spoke on behalf of our community.

The Faceless Clock

Hidden inside the tower of St Augustine's church is a rare piece of history, a 16th century faceless clock. Built by John Seymour of Wantage in 1525 and similar in design to the Salisbury cathedral clock, this clock has rung out over East Hendred and the local area for nearly 500 years. The only way to tell the time was to listen and count the strikes of the tenor bell, and the other bells for the quarter and half hour strikes, as this was before external clock faces were added. In the 18th century a carillon was added – think giant music box mechanism – that plays a tune every three hours. Being relatively primitive in design the clock has

suffered faults along the way. It was last repaired in the 1960's and some of that repair team still live in the village. A few years before covid a major fault developed, and the clock has sadly not worked since.

Eighteen months ago, a project was launched by the Parochial Church Council (PCC) of St Augustine's to fully assess the works needed to restore this truly amazing clock and chiming mechanism to working condition. All avenues were explored and much advice sought. The need to preserve was paramount but with the addition of nighttime silencing and an auto-wind mechanism. The good news is that full approval has been received from the Oxford Diocese and with many generous donations from the local community, the work will start on the clock in early January 2024 with a target finish date of Easter and the striking mechanism not long afterwards. Many challenges exist including building a temporary workshop and erecting scaffolding inside the tower.

During the works the tower will be open for visitors to catch up on progress on the understanding that you buy the team a coffee.

Happy 5th Birthday Bowling Alley Allotment Association

BAAA supports plot-holders at the Bowling Alley Allotments, a site where growing has taken place for about 150 years. Cultivating vegetables, fruits and flowers, this ground must have produced many tons of food for village families, working in harmony with nature as well as battling pests and weather conditions. Besides villagers and their families, the Scouts and HEG now also have plots that are enjoyed by their members.

Although the allotments have featured in village life for many years, BAAA only came into existence 5 years ago. During this time the bounty of the plots has been shared through the annual *Hendred Apple Day* where local apples are pressed into tasty juice in the autumn outside Hendred Stores, and *Posies, Punnets & Plants* which offers cut flowers and surplus crops and plants throughout the summer. BAAA also runs open-to-all workshops for those who'd like to start growing vegetables or develop skills such as Christmas wreath making.

All this activity has helped BAAA raise funds, which matched with grants from the Parish Council, Vale of the White Horse DC and Oxfordshire County Council, has enabled the installation of a large shed which is situated on the community plot. This will act as a facility for BAAA members and contain a tool library as well as other useful information and we hope will become a welcoming hub for wider community activities based around cultivation and associated activities, including responding to the climate change agenda.

Although the weather can make life difficult on the plots, and it can be heartbreaking when crops are shared with slugs, squirrels, deer, rabbits, caterpillars and other bugs, we're a resilient lot! Plot-holders are always willing to take time out from their work to chat to those passing by, to share growing tips and to encourage new growers. It's always a real joy to welcome new visitors to Bowling Alley or to hear recollections from older residents about the part that growing veg there played in their early family lives. No one forgets the joy of popping a pea pod to discover the sweet contents, of pulling a crisp carrot from the earth or the taste of the first new potatoes or ripe tomatoes!

If you'd like to join us by working a small raised bed on the community plot, taking part in a workshop, picking up a posy of cut flowers or surplus veg, selecting a few plants to grow at home, admiring the new shed, pressing your apples or just walking by to see what the changing seasons bring, we'd love to see you at the Bowling Alley plots.

P23/V1698/HH – 4 Croom Cottages, Wantage Rd, Rowstock. Single storey front extension. The Parish Council had no objection. Permission granted.
